
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

- Keep the governor informed about clubs, and suggest ways to enhance Rotary development and resolve difficulties.
- Ensure appropriate financial stewardship of club funds by club leaders.
- Serve as a two-way communication link between clubs and District committees
- Promote the implementation of the Club Leadership Plan, including the Assistant Governor's club.
- Encourage clubs to implement the governor's requests and recommendations
- Share "best practices" from their designated clubs with each other, and with other Rotary clubs.
- Monitor and motivate clubs to achieve club goals relating to membership development and retention, and support for The Rotary Foundation.
- Assist clubs in researching and implementing effective community and international service projects.
- Assist clubs in completing the activities which will lead to the Presidential Citation for the club, and the submission of the certification form to the governor by 1st April each year.
- Identify and develop leaders capable of serving Rotary beyond the club level.
- Promote attendance at the District Conference and the International Convention.

Become a Peace Builder and plant a Peace Pole to inspire peace within and between all people

- 1.Link with a group of people in your community.
- 2. Find a location to put a Peace Pole.
- 3.**Get permission** to plant a Peace pole on the site.
- 4. Decide what to write on each side of the peace pole.

We strongly suggest one side say "May Peace Prevail on Earth" in English. The other three sides may say the same in other languages or be variations on the theme such as "May Peace Prevail in Our Community"

Be sure to include your Rotary Club logo on the Peace Pole.

5. Order your Peace Pole – see the district website for ordering options

Get the QR Code Decal to put on your Peace Pole to link to the world map.

- 6. Enjoy creating a community ceremony to plant your Peace Pole.
- 7.**Invite** children, teens, adults, seniors, Rotary members, other civic groups, schools, and clergy to your Peace Pole dedication ceremony to celebrate peace with you.
- 8. Invite the media to attend to tell the story and take photos.

Peace Pole Ordering

Peace Poles can be a variety of sizes and materials. Below are a few options for obtaining a Peace Pole for your community.

- A standard peace pole will have graphics on each of the four sides of an 8-foot post. The post and sleeve will be buried in the ground ~ 2 ½ ft. of post and six inches of sleeve will then be secured with concrete. Another option instead of using cement is to dig a two feet hole and put gravel in the bottom and pack the dirt back in and around it.
- **Option One: Order from the Local Community** using a vinyl sleeve over a pressure treated wooden post *(Estimated cost: \$110)*
- Order a white composite vinyl post sleeve from **Lowe's (Item #1)** and have it sent to **Fuse Graphics in Spencerport** (191 S Union St. Spencerport, NY 14559, Attn: Harry Sotomayor).





Literacy Corner

Literacy Skills of U.S. Adults



Adult literacy is a critical issue that affects millions of individuals, impacting their ability to participate fully in society and the economy.

The Numbers Don't Lie

This fact sheet highlights the issue of adult skills in the United States, where 59 million adults read at or below the lowest levels.

Only a small percentage of those in need receive services, and many programs have waiting lists due to high demand.

Low literacy levels are associated with lower earnings, higher poverty rates, and increased health care costs. The importance of adult education as a solution is emphasized.

The most recent study of literacy skills among U.S. adults is the Survey of Adult Skills conducted through the Program for the International Assessment of Adult Competencies (PIAAC), a project of the Organization for Economic Cooperation and Development (OECD). According to the OECD PIAAC website, "the Survey measures adults' proficiency in key information-processing skills—literacy, and problem solving—and gathers information and data on how adults use their skills at home, at work and in the wider community."

What the 2017 survey data shows

The Survey reports literacy on a six-level scale, from Below Level 1 to Level 5. Overall, as of 2017, 19 percent of U.S. adults ages 16 to 65 scored at Level 1 or Below Level 1, and 33 percent scored at Level 2.

Those at Level 1 have a basic sight vocabulary and can read short texts on familiar topics to locate a single piece of information.

Those at Level 2 can read paragraph-length texts, compare information from the text with what is already known, and draw straightforward inferences

Race/ethnicity: In 2017, 36 percent of Black respondents and 31 percent of Hispanic respondents scored at Level 1 or below in literacy, versus 12 percent of White respondents

Nativity: In 2017, 33 percent of those born outside the United States scored at Level 1 or below in literacy, versus 16 percent of those born within the United States

Self-reported health status: In 2017, 31 percent of those reporting fair or poor health scored at Level 1 or below in literacy, versus 13 percent of those reporting excellent or very good health.

Rotary has been working to eradicate polio for more than 35 years. Our goal of ridding the world of this disease is closer than ever.

As a founding partner of the <u>Global Polio Eradication Initiative</u>, we've reduced polio cases by 99.9 percent since our first project to vaccinate children in the Philippines in 1979.

Rotary members have contributed more than \$2.1 billion and countless volunteer hours to protect nearly 3 billion children in 122 countries from this paralyzing disease. Rotary's advocacy efforts have played a role in decisions by governments to contribute more than \$10 billion to the effort.

Today, polio remains endemic only in Afghanistan and Pakistan. But it's crucial to continue working to keep other countries polio-free. If all eradication efforts stopped today, within 10 years, polio could paralyze as many as 200,000 children each year.

By the numbers:

\$3 average cost to fully protect a child against polio 430 million children in total vaccinated in 39 countries in 2017

\$100 million cost to conduct polio surveillance worldwide




Geneva Rotary Club

Investigator Joseph Tobias of the Ontario County Sheriff's Department was scheduled to receive the club's service Above Self Award, as well as a Paul Harris Fellow bestowment. Both Investigator Tobias and Ontario County Sheriff David Cirencione were responding to the FLCC emergency and were not able to participate in the awards presentation.




Chemung County Sunrise Rotary






