March brings us to a crucial focal point of our Rotary calendar – Water, Sanitation, and Hygiene Month. We here in the United States take clean water for granted. There are 2.5 billion people in the world that lack access to improved sanitation and 748 million people that don't have clean drinking water. Nearly 1400 children die each day from diseases caused by lack of sanitation and unsafe water. This theme, fundamental to human health and dignity, underscores the profound impact of access to clean water, proper sanitation, and hygiene practices on communities

worldwide. As we delve into this month, let us renew our commitment to initiatives that ensure everyone, everywhere, has access to these basic human needs.

The importance of water, sanitation, and hygiene (WASH) extends beyond the immediate health benefits. It catalyzes development, enabling education by reducing disease and allowing children, especially girls, to attend school. It empowers women and girls by reducing the time spent collecting water and fosters economic growth by improving community health and productivity. Here are several initiatives we can undertake as Rotarians to make a tangible difference in the realm of water, sanitation, and hygiene:

- Clean Water Projects: Implement community-based projects to provide clean and safe drinking water. This could involve installing water purification systems, rainwater harvesting structures, or digging wells.
- Implementation: Work with local communities to assess their needs, engage experts for sustainable solutions, and collaborate with international partners for resources and funding. Consider adopting solar-powered water systems in areas lacking electricity.

Our water, sanitation, and hygiene efforts can transform lives by preventing disease, promoting dignity, and providing new opportunities for education and economic development. Each project brings us closer to achieving Rotary's goal of providing clean water and sanitation for all and building more robust, resilient communities.

This March, let us pledge to champion water, sanitation, and hygiene. I encourage every club and every Rotarian in our district to initiate or participate in a WASH project. Whether by providing clean water, building sanitation facilities, or educating communities on hygiene practices, your actions will ripple through generations, fostering healthier lives and brighter futures.

Here in District 7120 as we move through Water, Sanitation, and Hygiene Month, let the spirit of service and collaboration guide us. Together, we can achieve remarkable strides in ensuring that access to clean water, proper sanitation, and hygiene is a reality for all. Let's harness our collective energy, expertise, and compassion to make a lasting difference in the world.

Submit your online poster registration form by April 2, 2025. You will be asked for your club's name, contact information, project title and a short description. Posters should include:



Become a Peace Builder and plant a Peace Pole to inspire peace within and between all people

- 1.Link with a group of people in your community.
- 2. Find a location to put a Peace Pole.
- 3. Get permission to plant a Peace pole on the site.
- 4. Decide what to write on each side of the peace pole.

We strongly suggest one side say "May Peace Prevail on Earth" in English. The other three sides may say the same in other languages or be variations on the theme such as "May Peace Prevail in Our Community"

Be sure to include your Rotary Club logo on the Peace Pole.

5. Order your Peace Pole – see the district website for ordering options

Get the QR Code Decal to put on your Peace Pole to link to the world map.

- 6. Enjoy creating a community ceremony to plant your Peace Pole.
- 7.**Invite** children, teens, adults, seniors, Rotary members, other civic groups, schools, and clergy to your Peace Pole dedication ceremony to celebrate peace with you.
- 8. Invite the media to attend to tell the story and take photos.

Peace Pole Ordering

Peace Poles can be a variety of sizes and materials. Below are a few options for obtaining a Peace Pole for your community.

- A standard peace pole will have graphics on each of the four sides of an 8-foot post. The post and sleeve will be buried in the ground ~ 2 ½ ft. of post and six inches of sleeve will then be secured with concrete. Another option instead of using cement is to dig a two feet hole and put gravel in the bottom and pack the dirt back in and around it.
- **Option One: Order from the Local Community** using a vinyl sleeve over a pressure treated wooden post (*Estimated cost: \$110*)
- Order a white composite vinyl post sleeve from **Lowe's (Item #1)** and have it sent to **Fuse Graphics in Spencerport** (191 S Union St. Spencerport, NY 14559, Attn: Harry Sotomayor).

EAC Spring Trash Olympics

Spring is upon us. As outlined in the February Grapevine, the Environmental Action Committee (EAC) is sponsoring a Trash Olympics (rules published below). Here are more details:

Waste Management has agreed to sponsor the competition with cash prize to be awarded to clubs as follow: \$250 for the winner, \$150 for second, \$100 for third. There will also be plaques for First Place, the most unusual and ugliest items collected.

The Olympics will run from now to June 30th. One club has already submitted an entry. Clubs that do multiple project will have their entries combined for first place. A reminder; eligible projects include: watershed clean ups, adopt a highway projects, village/town clean-ups, can and bottle drives, compost collection, and battery turn-ins with each battery counting as a trash bag.

To be considered for a prize, club presidents need to submit the following to their AGs. (1) A picture of your trash haul and a (2) a copy of the attached form (3) pictures of the ugliest and most unusual items collected if your club wants to participate in that portion of the competition. https://docs.google.com/forms/d/11MAkFmcoKbiQVmgdQWVI8O7Y13y194HC3jGq_MlQGdE/edit.

As we approach Spring, the EAC is proposing an activity that can add some fun to environmental projects. We are sponsoring a SpoGomi-type event. SpoGomi is a Japanese invented sport that is roughly translated as "competitive trash picking". The pure Japanese rules are too restrictive for our district's purposes, but we thought the competition aspect would be a fun activity that would encourage additional community involvement.

Some of the normal Spring clean-up activities that would lend themselves to the competition are:

- Spring community clean-up projects
- Adopt a Highway programs
- Watershed clean-ups

- Can and bottle drives
- Community compost material drives

The rules for the Trash Olympics are simple:

- Once the activity is finished for the day/week the club will take a picture of the participants with their haul The number of bags collected will be divided by the number of participants. Items too big to be counted as a bag (examples: a club with 20 participants collecting 60 bags would have a score of 3.0, a club of 10 participants collecting 10 bags would have a score of 1.0)
- The club with the highest average wins. If other community organizations participate, their members should be included in the total participating. Prizes will be awarded to the most unusual item, and the grossest item.
- Most Clubs use industrial trash bags. This would make scoring easier.
- The dates of the competition would be April 1st to June 30th. Clubs may begin earlier than April, but must be finished by June 30th.
- Clubs that do trash pickups and can and bottle drives can send two or more pictures, one for each event. The total will be tabulated.
- A monthly scorecard will appear in the May and June issues of the Grapevine, with the winner announced in the July issue with the DG presenting the trophy in July.
- Clubs are encouraged to conduct multiple events, the total of which will count toward the competition.

The committee is seeking donors for other prizes. The total prizes and reporting procedures will be published in the March Grapevine. Clubs already planning non-trash of bottle drive events are encouraged to do so (examples are butterfly gardens or tree planting).

7 Stress-Management Tips for Caregivers

If you've ever taken care of a chronically ill spouse or elderly parent, you know how stressful and exhausting it can be. If you're living through the experience right now, you might be feeling overwhelmed or even at a breaking point—even if you love the person you're caring for very much. caregiver burnout is real.

Providing this type of care can place a great deal of pressure on a person, and caregivers are often surprised by the amount of burnout they experience. Here are just some of the ways to heal and lessen the effects.

Many caregivers have trouble taking care of their own needs as they provide so much care for the needs of others. Whether you feel guilty for taking time out for yourself, or if you just feel like you don't have the time to take, consider this perspective: If you don't take care of yourself, you won't have anything left to give.

How Caregivers Can Lessen Stress and Overwhelm

The following steps can help you to minimize some of the stress you're feeling, so you can feel less overwhelmed by the caregiver role.

- 1. Stay connected. It's important to maintain relationships with other people, not just the person you're caring for or your immediate family. Others, especially those who are in a similar position, can provide support and information, as well as valuable opportunities to step out of the caregiver role for a while. Aim to find a mix of social support from online support groups, friends with whom you may have lost touch as you've gotten busier, and new friends you may meet in the community. Even walking a dog around your neighborhood provides some of the health benefits of pets and can help you stay more connected to your neighbors and community.
- 2. Accept help. If help is offered by friends, neighbors, and others, don't be afraid to accept it. Many people don't know what to do to help, but are sincere in their (Continued on page 23)

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load, so don't feel guilty about it. If you're not getting many offers of support, you may want to ask family members if they might be able to offer some. Also, there may be resources offered in your community, so some research in that area may yield some useful results. Sometimes even a little help can go a long way.

- 3. Find time alone. It may be difficult for you to find time alone, especially if you're the sole provider of care, but don't forget that you need to give to yourself in order to have the ability to give to others. However, taking an hour or two for journaling in a coffee shop, seeing a movie by yourself, getting exercise with a long walk, or going to a nearby park and immersing yourself in a good book are all excellent, restorative options that can help you to stave off burnout.
- 4. Maintain a hobby. It's also important to keep up some interests outside of your role as a caregiver. Maintaining a hobby is a way to keep yourself feeling fresh and vital, and possibly to stay connected with others in another role. Here is a list of stress-relieving hobbies to consider, some of which can be maintained at home with your loved one, along with some that will take you outside and connect you with others.
- 5. Stay informed. While sometimes looking conditions up on the internet yield questionable or even unsettling results, it's still often a good idea to research as much as you can about your loved one's condition, so that you'll know what to expect. To be sure that you're getting accurate information, talk to your doctor about good resources for information and support.
- 6. Stay spiritually grounded. Studies show that religion and spirituality can help immensely with stress relief, health, and life satisfaction, so if you have are religious or have spiritual leanings, now is a good time to rely on them, and gain strength from your faith as well as your spiritual community.
- 7. Take care of yourself. The main idea here is to take good care of yourselfphysically, mentally, and emotionally-so that you'll be able to handle the challenges of caregiving, and continue to provide care for others. Selfcare encompasses many ideas, including getting enough sleep, eating a quality diet, and other strategies to keep yourself feeling well. Also, if you experience persistent feelings of fatigue, resentment, or burnout, don't be afraid to talk to a professional and get some extra support.

Core Prevention Strategies

<u>CDC recommends</u> that all people use core prevention strategies to protect themselves and others from **COVID-19**:

- Stay up to date with COVID-19 vaccines.
- Although vaccinated people sometimes get infected with the virus that causes COVID-19, staying up
 to date on COVID-19 vaccines significantly lowers the risk of getting very sick, being hospitalized, or
 dying from COVID-19.
- Practice good hygiene (practices that improve cleanliness)
- Take steps for cleaner air

When you are sick:

- Use <u>precautions to prevent spread</u>, including staying home and away from others (including people you live with who are not sick) if you have respiratory symptoms.
- Learn when you can go back to your normal activities.

Seek health care promptly for <u>testing</u> and/or <u>treatment</u> if you have <u>risk factors for severe illness</u>. Treatment may help lower your risk of severe illness, but it needs to be started within a few days of when your symptoms begin. **Order your free COVID-19 tests at the end of September.**

U.S. households will be eligible to order 4 free COVID-19 tests at COVIDTests.gov. The COVID-19 tests will detect current COVID-19 variants and can be used through the end of the year. Visit COVIDTests.gov

Additional Prevention Strategies

In addition, there are other prevention strategies that you can choose to further protect yourself and others.

Wearing a mask and putting distance between yourself and others can help lower the risk of COVID-19 transmission.

Testing for COVID-19 can help you decide what to do next, like getting treatment to reduce your risk of severe illness and taking steps to lower your chances of spreading COVID-19 to others.


What to watch out for

Using these prevention strategies can be especially helpful when:

- Respiratory viruses, such as COVID-19, flu, and RSV, are causing a lot of illness in your community
- You or those around you have <u>risk factors</u> for severe illness
- You or those around you were recently exposed to a respiratory virus, are sick, or are recovering

POLIO:

- 1. A resident of Rockland County, who had not traveled overseas, contracted Polio in 2022 and the Polio Virus has been detected in sewage samples in Rockland, Orange, Sullivan, and Nassau Counties, and in New York City. Fortunately, there have been no other cases in the US.
- 2. Polio is a paralyzing and potentially deadly disease. The IPV (Salk) Polio Vaccine is safe and effective. It has been used for decades, is required for school entry in NY, and is available to anyone over 2 months old. Protect yourselves and your family. If you had the full Polio Vaccine series as a child, you do not need a booster at this time.
- 3. There were 12 cases of Wild Polio Virus Type 1 worldwide in 2023, 6 in Afghanistan and 6 in Pakistan. To date, there have been 34 cases of WPV1 in 2024, 18 in Afghanistan and 16 in Pakistan.
- 4. There were 517 cases in 26 countries of circulating Vaccine Derived Polio Viruses (cVDPV) worldwide in 2023. To date in 2024, there have been 122 cases in 17 countries of cVDPV. This includes 1 case in the occupied Palestinian territory (Gaza) on July 25, 2024.
- I am available to provide club programs on Rotary's PolioPlus Campaign, as well as other programs on The Rotary Foundation.

Rotary has been working to eradicate polio for more than 35 years. Our goal of ridding the world of this disease is closer than ever.

As a founding partner of the <u>Global Polio Eradication Initiative</u>, we've reduced polio cases by 99.9 percent since our first project to vaccinate children in the Philippines in 1979.

Rotary members have contributed more than \$2.1 billion and countless volunteer hours to protect nearly 3 billion children in 122 countries from this paralyzing disease. Rotary's advocacy efforts have played a role in decisions by governments to contribute more than \$10 billion to the effort.

Today, polio remains endemic only in Afghanistan and Pakistan. But it's crucial to continue working to keep other countries polio-free. If all eradication efforts stopped today, within 10 years, polio could paralyze as many as 200,000 children each year.

By the numbers:

\$3 average cost to fully protect a child against polio 430 million children in total vaccinated in 39 countries in 2017

\$100 million cost to conduct polio surveillance worldwide

After a day of interviews with the committee vetting candidates for 2025-26 Rotary International president, Mário César Martins de Camargo returned to his hotel and waited. And waited. "It's an elimination process," he says. "The anxiety level reaches sky high." When he got a call asking him to return to Rotary headquarters in Evanston, his first thought was that he'd made some sort of mistake. As he walked the few blocks to the building, he mentally reviewed everything he'd said. When he finally realized why he'd been called back, it was an emotional moment, he says. "The nominating committee stands up and applauds you, and you are invited to say your first words as president. Mine were, 'Are you guys sure?"

They were, of course. De Camargo's Rotary résumé goes back decades. A member of the Rotary Club of Santo André, Brazil, since 1980, he served as his club's Rotary Youth Exchange officer

the following year at age 24 and as its president in 1992-93. He was governor of District 4420 (part of Brazil's São Paulo state) in 1999-2000, Rotary Foundation trustee in 2015-19, and Rotary International director in 2019-21. De Camargo and his wife, Denise da Silva de Camargo, also a Rotarian, are Major Donors and Benefactors of The Rotary Foundation.

UNITE FOR GOOD

The RI President's message for 2025-26, **Unite for Good**,

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The RI president-elect speaks about the power of Rotary's members

Rotary International President-elect Mário César Martins de Camargo asked members to *Unite for Good* by embracing growth, service, and connection as he outlined a plan to expand "the best-qualified team of volunteers on the planet."

"Rotary's greatest asset is not our history, our projects, or even our unmatched global reach. It is our members," de Camargo said at the organization's International Assembly in Orlando, Florida, USA, on 10 February. He noted praise from one of Rotary's partners about "the extraordinary dedication" of Rotary members. "That recognition from an outsider deepened my understanding: Rotary's greatest gift to the world is its people."

De Camargo, a member of the Rotary Club of Santo André, São Paulo, Brazil, emphasized the importance of seeking out new perspectives and strengthening Rotary's service to communities around the globe. He outlined three "essential pillars" for growth: innovation, continuity, and partnership.

Innovating while also building a consistent legacy

Noting how quickly the world changes, de Camargo urged members to innovate.

"Technology, social expectations, and economic conditions evolve constantly, and Rotary must evolve with them," he said. "Innovation is how we adapt to this changing world."

One important way to do this, de Camargo said, is by embracing and promoting a variety of club models. Satellite clubs, cause-based clubs, enterprise clubs, and passport clubs offer people different ways to experience Rotary. Noting that his wife helped charter a satellite club with nearly 50 members, he said, "Future Rotary members are out there. We must meet them where they are."

De Camargo also emphasized the importance of leadership continuity and said he observed its benefits during his extensive travels in the past 18 months. Districts thrive, he said, when governors build on their predecessors' efforts, ensuring that programs and strategies continue without interruption.

He cited an effort to build wells in Nigeria, an initiative in Pakistan that helped people affected by devastating floods to find a better future, and a Rotary grant-funded program in India where children get lifesaving care.

"Continuity is not about uniformity; it's about alignment," de Camargo said. "When district leaders work together, envisioning Rotary beyond their 'governor year,' they set the stage for long-term success."
