To assist you in your effort, here is the **Procedure and List of Requirements** for a Rotary District Governor:

A candidate should <u>NOT</u> contact any member of the Nominating Committee, as this would be construed as electioneering, which is forbidden. Important information for prospective candidates:

A Nominee for District Governor must complete an application for consideration as District Governor and meet the following minimum qualifications:

- Must have served a full term as a club president and been a Rotarian for seven years;
- Must be physically fit and able to withstand at least two rigorous years;
- Must be willing to devote the required time and be able to perform as hereinafter set forth;
- Should have at least one year working at the district level in a leadership position;
- Should have a good working knowledge of Rotary;
- Must not be a member of the sitting Nominating Committee;
- Must have the support of his/her club.
- The application must be signed by the candidate and the secretary of the Rotarian's club.
- The application must be returned to the Chair of the District Nominating Committee by the due date on the Application (October 14, 2025).

After receiving a complete application, the chair of the District Nominating Committee will contact the candidate to schedule a personal interview.

- The candidate will be contacted for an interview time.
- The spouse or partner of the candidate is strongly encouraged to attend this interview.



- Ceremonies: Clubs may host ceremonies to showcase their certificates and celebrate their accomplishments.
- Mentoring: Interactors can connect with Rotarians to learn about their professions and experiences.
- Sharing and Connecting: Clubs share their projects and successes on social media using the hashtag #WorldInteractWeek and connect with other Interactors worldwide

Literacy Corner



Why Early Childhood Literacy Is So Important

The first five years of life offer a critical window for learning, with rapid brain development that does not occur at any other time. During the early years, children acquire the ability to think, speak, learn, and reason. Young children's ability to use language and understand the meaning of spoken and written words is related to later achievement in reading, writing, and spelling. If children miss the opportunity to acquire foundational language skills, they are set up for immediate struggles with literacy as soon as they arrive at school. Research shows that children who enter kindergarten with poor literacy skills start behind in school and tend to stay behind, leading to poor academic achievement, high dropout rates, and often a lifetime of struggle.

90% of brain development happens by age 5, therefore making reading a priority in early childhood yields the greatest return on investment

88% of students who are not reading at grade level by the end of first grade may never have a chance to catch up to grade level without extraordinary and costly interventions

New York State's achievement gap is one of the widest in the nation, and that gap begins before children ever get to school. More than **one-third** of our children enter kindergarten lacking the pre-literacy skills crucial to school success, skills that develop from being exposed to reading and to books.

By fourth grade, more than **60%** of these children will not meet the standard for reading proficiency. Studies show that when children start school behind, they are more likely to continue to fall behind, with academic success becoming harder to attain as they get older.

- 24 % of New York Children live in poverty. For Hispanic children the rate is 34%.
- For the first time ever, nearly one-fifth of America's children <u>speak a language other than English</u> at home.
- About **1** in **2** poor American children start kindergarten without the language skills they need to learn to read.
- 61% of low-income families (nationally) have no children's books in their home.
- **43**% of people with the lowest literacy skills live in poverty: **17**% receive food stamps, and **70**% have no job or a part-time job

Low literacy's effects cost the U.S. **\$225 billion** or more each year in non-productivity in the workforce, crime, and loss of tax revenue due to unemployment.



Each of the following categories will be rated on a 0 to 5 point basis unless otherwise noted.

- 1. **Writing Style:** creative, witty, informative, to and for the members.
- 2. **Layout and Presentation:** attractive, eye-catching openings, neat, easy to read format, and reader-friendly.
- 3. **Graphics**, photos, and color: use of these items to enhance the story or to illustrate.
- 4. **Program Report:** Does your club have a weekly program/guest speaker? A report with or without a picture will be a bonus to your overall score for the competition.
- 5. **Club News:** Upcoming events, fundraisers, projects, results of events, attendance, make-ups, trips, special recognition's, etc.

MENTAL HEALTH WELLNESS:

UNDERSTANDING AND MANAGING ANXIETY:

Anxiety is a feeling of being in distress, worried, or having fear. It is a fundamental response to a threat or unexpected change. It is a sort of built in alarm system that produces fight or flight response when needed.

For some, anxiety produces physical symptoms of tenseness, shakiness, sometimes nausea and chest tightness. Many people present in Emergency Rooms due to these symptoms and fear of a heart attack. Sometimes symptoms are caused by another medical condition or medications and should be discussed with a medical physician,

Anxiety becomes a mental illness or disorder when symptoms are more than once per week and persist for 6 months or more. Some symptoms of restlessness, difficulty concentrating, mind going blank, irritability, frequent fatigue, muscle tenseness and sleep disturbances are frequent. When these symptoms persist a mental health intervention may be needed and medication can be considered.

Many people benefit from mental health therapy and other counseling to learn to recognize their symptoms and try to lessen or alleviate them. Some try to see what is causing their symptoms and learn to see those triggers in a different way. Often when anxious, people hold their breath, so learning breathing techniques can help. Others learn ways to distract their anxiety. Grounding techniques that help to focus on colors or objects in a room help especially when having to speak in public or be in a crowded public place. Others draw from their faith beliefs to decrease worry and fear.

There is a large spectrum of anxiety issues from basic adjustment to something new or unknown to daily or weekly symptoms. Some have more serious symptoms that lead to Obsessive Compulsive Disorders and other have trauma related anxiety that lead to Post Traumatic Stress Disorder.

Positive, hopeful thinking is helpful to relieve anxiety, In Rotary we focus on "Service Above Self". Often thinking about or caring for others in a positive way distracts our own negative feelings.

Anxiety and stress are part of life. Staying busy and focused on the positive parts of our life keep anxiety in control. Like most other things in life, it is best to reach out for support from others and seek professional care if needed.

INFECTIOUS DISEASE UPDATE: COVID-19, INFLUENZA, RSV, and POLIO September 10, 2025 PDG DAVID HANNAN

IT'S TIME TO GET YOUR UPDATED 2025-2026 COVID-19 and INFLUENZA VACCINES, EVEN IF YOU WERE PREVIOUSLY VACCINATED and EVEN IF YOU WERE PREVIOUSLY SICK WITH THESE VIRUSES! THEY CAN BE GIVEN SIMULTANEOUSLY.

INFLUENZA: The New York State Department of Health recommends that everyone aged 6 months or older get a seasonal flu vaccine. (The seasonal influenza virus is not approved for use in children younger than 6 months old, but their risk of flu complications is higher than for any other child age group. The best way to protect children younger than 6 months against seasonal influenza is to make sure members of their household and their caregivers are vaccinated. The same can be said for households in which anyone has a chronic disease, especially lung disease such as asthma or emphysema. Get vaccinated to protect yourself and your loved ones! See Flu (Influenza) for more information.

COVID-19: COVID-19 vaccines are safe and effective. The governor has issued an executive order to assure the vaccine is available. Everyone over age 65 and anyone else who has chronic disease should get this vaccine. Others may benefit as well by reducing their risk of illness during the winter months. See Governor Kathy Hochul for more information.

RSV (RESPIRATORY SYNCITIAL VIRUS): RSV is a highly contagious virus that usually causes mild, cold-like symptoms but can be serious, especially in infants and older adults. In adults it can cause pneumonia, infections of the bronchioles (bronchiolitis), and can exacerbate underlying chronic lung disease. RSV Vaccination is recommended for adults age 60 and older and for pregnant women. Each year in the U.S., RSV leads to approximately 60,000-120,000 hospitalizations and 6,000-10,000 deaths among adults 65 years of age and older. The governor's executive order also applies to the RSV Vaccine. RSV does NOT need a second vaccine. See Respiratory Syncytial Virus (RSV) Infection for more information.

To protect against respiratory viruses, the Department of Health recommends commonsense precautions, including:

- Staying up to date on all vaccines, including the RSV vaccine (if eligible).
- Washing hands often with soap and hot water for least 20 seconds.
- Not coughing or sneezing into hands.
- Staying home when sick or symptomatic.
- Those wishing to further protect themselves from respiratory viruses such as RSV disease may consider wearing a well-fitting, high-quality mask when in public indoor spaces.

POLIO:

- 1. A resident of Rockland County, who had not traveled overseas, contracted Polio in 2022 and the Polio Virus has been detected in sewage samples in Rockland, Orange, Sullivan, and Nassau Counties, and in New York City. Fortunately, there have been no other cases in the US.
- 2. Polio is a paralyzing and potentially deadly disease. The IPV (Salk) Polio Vaccine is safe and effective. It has been used for decades, is required for school entry in NY, and is available to anyone over 2 months old. Protect yourselves and your family. If you had the full Polio Vaccine series as a child, you do not need a booster at this time.
- 3. There were 99 cases of Wild Polio Virus Type 1 worldwide in 2024, 25 in Afghanistan and 74 in Pakistan. To date, there have been 28 cases of WPV1 in 2025, 4 in Afghanistan and 24 in Pakistan.
- 4. There were 463 cases in 21 countries of circulating Vaccine Derived Polio Viruses (cVDPV) worldwide in 2024. To date in 2025, there have been 142 cases in 16 countries of cVDPV.
- 5. I am available to provide club programs on Rotary's PolioPlus Campaign, as well as other programs on The Rotary Foundation.



Rotary has been working to eradicate polio for more than 35 years. Our goal of ridding the world of this disease is closer than ever.

As a founding partner of the **Global Polio Eradication Initiative**, we've reduced polio cases by 99.9 percent since our first project to vaccinate children in the Philippines in 1979.

Rotary members have contributed more than \$2.1 billion and countless volunteer hours to protect nearly 3 billion children in 122 countries from this paralyzing disease. Rotary's advocacy efforts have played a role in decisions by governments to contribute more than \$10 billion to the effort.

Today, polio remains endemic only in Afghanistan and Pakistan. But it's crucial to continue working to keep other countries polio-free. If all eradication efforts stopped today, within 10 years, polio could paralyze as many as 200,000 children each year.

By the numbers:

\$3 average cost to fully protect a child against polio 430 million children in total vaccinated in 39 countries in 2017

\$100 million cost to conduct polio surveillance worldwide



RYE offers the chance of a lifetime. Experiences that stay with you and change your perspective on the world. Visiting another country with new customs, language, and people to meet can be intimidating. District 7120 is one of the most prepared exchange districts. Opening applications begin on July 15th and close on November 1st. This is just the start! Soon, you will attend an interview, an overnight camp, where you can learn more about RYE, and we can learn more about you. This is where RYE decides whether or not you are a good fit for the program and where we match you to a country where we believe you will succeed. This overnight will also be filled with fun bonding games and activities with past exchange students (Rotex, like me!) and current RYE applicants. Once you are accepted into the program, you are an outbound and you will find out which country you will be going to. You will be responsible for completing homework. This homework prepares you by learning your language, country customs, and what it means to be an ambassador for District 7120 and the USA. These homework assignments are spread between monthly orientation camps, where you get to have fun with other inbounds and outbounds, showcase your progress in your language, and learn about how to have a great exchange. I personally had a wonderful time at these orientation camps, and on my exchange, I got to meet so many people and make lifelong connections!

Opportunities for Clubs:

RYE also provides opportunities for Clubs in District 7120. Does your club want to experience and learn about another culture, and give someone an unforgettable experience in your community? Exchange is a two-way street, meaning that to send Outbounds from our District, we must receive the same amount of Inbounds. This helps us in our goal of cultural exchange. Any interested Local Rotary Clubs can contact us with the information below! If you are currently a club that is hosting, we have created seasonal activity guides for families, clubs, and exchange students

Opportunities for Students:

If you are between the ages of 15 -18, you are eligible to sign up for our program. If you have ever wanted to travel, experience another culture, or learn another language, exchange is for you! This is no small experience. We encourage above-average students who demonstrate leadership in their schools and communities, who possess qualities such as flexibility and a willingness to try new things, and who see themselves as cultural ambassadors of the USA. If this sounds like you, great! I personally can say that I would have regretted not taking this wonderful opportunity. I learned so much about myself and the world around me. I met so many new, wonderful people and lifelong friends during my exchange. I am honored to have been a part of this wonderful experience and organization. Below is a list of countries with which we exchange. You are not guaranteed a specific country; however, you are required to make a list of your top 5 countries. We will use your list and interview process to inform our decision on which country you will spend your year abroad. Opportunities for Parents:

Being a host parent can be a life-changing experience. Not only will you learn about a new culture, but you will also gain a new family member with whom you can share your culture and family traditions! Our district tries to get each Inbound 3 different families to get a full, well-rounded experience. Each host family is typically responsible for the Inbound Student for around three months before they change host families. Each host family is responsible for room and board, which allows you to share your daily life with an inbound student. This is a great experience if you are choosing to send your child on an exchange; however, it is not a prerequisite, and any family can host once approved by the program. I personally grew very close with all of my host families and am still in contact with them, as are many other past exchange students. You really create a larger family, and it gives you an excuse to travel to see your host child! Currently, my family is hosting an exchange student from Belgium. While I was away on exchange, my parents hosted a student from Japan. Both have been a wonderful experience, and it is so special to have a new person in our family. It really makes you think of our area and our way of life in a new way!

On Thursday, September 4 the Bath Rotary Club unveiled its Peace Pole, located in the Bath Village Community Park at the corner of East Washington Street and Liberty Street. About forty five people were in attendance including several Bath Rotarians and other community members as well as the following guests: Pete Vogt, Rotary District 7120 Governor Nominee from the Dansville Rotary Club; Kelly Fitzpatrick, Steuben County Legislature Chair, who is herself a Bath Rotarian; Karen Causer, Village of Bath Board Trustee; Greg Lynn Weaver, representative from the Bath Peace Weavers. This community project was planned and executed by Bath Rotarians Lillian Fazi,

Nancy Latour, and Jane Russell. The pole is a seven-foot-tall pressure treated wooden post with a vinyl sleeve, provided by Goody's Graphics and Signs. The phrase "May Peace Prevail on Earth" is printed on the four sides in English, German, Seneca, and Spanish. These languages were suggested and approved by the Bath Village Board. On one of the sides of the Peace Pole the Bath Rotary Club logo is printed, and on another side the QR code linking it to the more than 200,000 Peace Poles in over 180 countries throughout the world is printed.

The Bath Rotary Club provided the funds for the Peace Pole. The Bath Village Highway Department dug the hole, erected the pole, and placed mulch around the base. The village donated its time to do this and will put up lighting in the park to showcase the Peace Pole.

During the unveiling ceremony the song "We Are the World" was played. Due to rain beginning to fall after the unveiling, the rest of the ceremony was moved inside to the Great Hall of St. Thomas' Episcopal Church. At that time Fazi, Latour, and Russell delivered remarks regarding a Peace Pole, including the facts that Peace Poles are intended: to inspire unity among people of all backgrounds and cultures; to serve as a silent prayer for peace; to reflect Rotary's focus on peacebuilding and conflict prevention; to remind everyone to take care of Fellow Rotarians, family members, neighbors, and all people of the world; to build stories creating hope and actions for peace; to support peace in service; to understand that peace will take more than one lifetime to achieve but never to be discouraged by the pathways it takes to achieve peace.

The idea for Peace Poles, an internationally-recognized symbol of the hopes and dreams of the entire human family, standing vigil in silent prayer for peace on earth, began with Mr. Masahisa Goi after World War II and the dropping of the atomic bomb. Mr. Goi came to understand that words, thoughts, and intentions carry energy strong enough to influence the destiny of all living






Corning Rotary Club
