



1. Each club President-Elect and Foundation Chair, or their representatives, are required to complete a district-sponsored Grant Management Seminar (GMS) or the My.Rotary.Org Learning Center online course.
2. Club president and president-elect must sign a Club Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) per The Rotary Foundation.
3. Club president and president-elect must sign the District 7120 Addendum to the Club MOU, which is available on District 7120 website.
4. Each club must adopt the document retention and financial management policies required by the MOU.
5. Additionally, clubs must have donated \$35 average per capita in the 2024-2025 Rotary year in order to qualify for grants in 2026-2027.

Hard to believe half this Rotary year is over. I know your Interact clubs have already accomplished a lot this first half year and will do many great things in the Winter/Spring. We are progressing at getting Interact Advisors contact information to Rotary International and have nearly half the Active Interact clubs shown with Interact Advisors. We still have many active Interact Clubs that have been terminated by RI for not letting them know who your Interact Advisor is and their contact information. The RI status report is accessible in number 4c below (Please check your club for status). It is important for Interact clubs to show Active with RI both, so they receive current information and liability insurance for their service projects and fundraisers. They also should not use the Rotary name "Interact" without being an Active Chartered club. I believe more than half of the 58 terminated Interact clubs are still active running clubs.

1. **District Learning Assembly:** Saturday, April 11th at Waterloo High School. There will be three Interact sessions, one for current Interact Advisors, and we will cover Interact Advisor roles and how to access Interact related training in the Rotary Learning Center. The other two to go over general questions anyone may have and to talk about Interact in general. Hopefully some sharing on accomplishments. We would love to have Interact student members join you and share as that would add value to the session. They could attend the first session as well, as there is training in the learning center for them. More information to come with future newsletters.
2. **Interact Elections:** Time to think about next year's elections for Interact Officers. Please have your next Interact year's team transition with the current team of Officers and Committee Chairs for smooth transition and greatest success.
3. **RYLA 2026:** Consider sending one of your next Interact years Officers to RYLA (Hopefully President-Elect) This will give them a great base to lead your Interact club in the next Rotary/Interact year. Literacy Corner

With the start of the new year comes the challenge to propose a new topic for the district literacy committee to share with the clubs and their communities. We will be tackling the very important but perhaps seldom considered topic of **financial literacy**.

Learning how to use money wisely can begin as early as pre-school. By age 3, kids can grasp money concepts and by age 7, many of their money habits are already set.

* Systemic barriers to teaching personal finance in schools stem from outdated curriculum priorities, emphasis on standardized testing and insufficient funding allocated to personal finance education. These factors hinder the effective delivery of essential financial literacy skills to students.

We will be exploring the essentials of financial literacy simply stated as earning, spending, saving and giving.

While our goal may be to aid our educators in improving the financial skills of our students from pre-school to college, we may just pick up some better habits ourselves.

INFECTIOUS DISEASE UPDATE:
COVID-19, INFLUENZA, RSV, and POLIO

IT'S TIME TO GET YOUR UPDATED 2025-2026 COVID-19 and INFLUENZA VACCINES, EVEN IF YOU WERE PREVIOUSLY VACCINATED and EVEN IF YOU WERE PREVIOUSLY SICK WITH THESE VIRUSES! THEY CAN BE GIVEN SIMULTANEOUSLY.

INFLUENZA: IT'S NOT TOO LATE! Although there is an Influenza strain this year that is not completely covered by the vaccine, you will still get some protection from the vaccine. The New York State Department of Health recommends that everyone aged 6 months or older get a seasonal flu vaccine. (The seasonal influenza virus is not approved for use in children younger than 6 months old, but their risk of flu complications is higher than for any other child age group. The best way to protect children younger than 6 months against seasonal influenza is to make sure members of their household and their caregivers are vaccinated. The same can be said for households in which anyone has a chronic disease, especially lung disease such as asthma or emphysema. Get vaccinated to protect yourself and your loved ones! COVID-19: COVID-19 vaccines are safe and effective. The governor has issued an executive order to assure the vaccine is available. Everyone over age 65 and anyone else who has chronic disease should get this vaccine. Others may benefit as well by reducing their risk of illness during the winter months. RSV (RESPIRATORY SYNCYTIAL VIRUS): RSV is a highly contagious virus that usually causes mild, cold-like symptoms but can be serious, especially in infants and older adults. In adults it can cause pneumonia, infections of the bronchioles (bronchiolitis), and can exacerbate underlying chronic lung disease. RSV Vaccination is recommended for adults age 60 and older and for pregnant women. Each year in the U.S., RSV leads to approximately 60,000-120,000 hospitalizations and 6,000-10,000 deaths among adults 65 years of age and older. The governor's executive order also applies to the RSV Vaccine. RSV does NOT need a second vaccine. See [Respiratory Syncytial Virus \(RSV\) Infection](#) for more information.

To protect against respiratory viruses, the Department of Health recommends commonsense precautions, including:

- Staying up to date on all vaccines, including the RSV vaccine (if eligible).
- Washing hands often with soap and hot water for least 20 seconds.
- Not coughing or sneezing into hands.
- Staying home when sick or symptomatic.
- Those wishing to further protect themselves from respiratory viruses such as RSV disease may consider wearing a well-fitting, high-quality mask when in public indoor spaces.

POLIO:


1. A resident of Rockland County, who had not traveled overseas, contracted Polio in 2022 and the Polio Virus has been detected in sewage samples in Rockland, Orange, Sullivan, and Nassau Counties, and in New York City. Fortunately, there have been no other cases in the US.

2. Polio is a paralyzing and potentially deadly disease. The IPV (Salk) Polio Vaccine is safe and effective. It has been used for decades, is required for school entry in NY, and is available to anyone over 2 months old. Protect yourselves and your family. If you had the full Polio Vaccine series as a child, you do not need a booster at this time.

3. There were 99 cases of Wild Polio Virus Type 1 worldwide in 2024, 25 in Afghanistan and 74 in Pakistan. To date, there have been 39 cases of WPV1 reported in 2025, 9 in Afghanistan and 30 in Pakistan.

4. There were 463 cases in 21 countries of circulating Vaccine Derived Polio Viruses (cVDPV) worldwide in 2024. To date in 2025, there have been 202 cases in 19 countries of cVDPV reported.

5. I am available to provide club programs on Rotary's PolioPlus Campaign, as well as other programs on The Rotary Foundation.





Busy Holiday Season for Perry Rotary Club

Perry Rotary Club looked at a new way to host meetings, something members unable to make it to Thursday lunch meetings regularly have enjoyed early morning coffee and confections at local businesses and most recently bowling at Perry Bowling Center. It turns out there are many keggers in the club beginning with President Maureen Orban, a junior league champion at one time. Competition was humorous and keen after which used trophies of sorts were presented to high-point-makers.

Our giving nature came through in the annual December auction of donated items, from handicrafts and home décor, to trays of Christmas cookies, Bills gear, and more. Over \$2,000 was raised and will be split between Perry and Warsaw community food pantries. Local philanthropist-Rotarian Sam Gullo and his wife Cherie added to that. Years ago, they established a foundation that provides scholarships, support of civic non-profits, events and community investment. In December their substantial donation also went to the food pantries. Rotarians Dr. Butch and Betsy DeGroff donated squash grown on their farm to Dansville for its community Thanksgiving dinner that fed 750 people! Two Serventi foundations contributed substantially to local projects in memory of deceased Rotarians Lewis (and wife, Clelia) Serventi and the late Mike Serventi from his wife Gail. WNY Crop Management Services, where the late Rotarian Bob Scott worked, received a memorial gift through Perry Rotary where family and friends contributed to the designated recipient.

On January 8, PDG Julie Carney, talked to Perry Rotary Club about New Generations Service Exchange (NGSE). Julie first joined Avon Rotary Club in 2009 inspired by her children's experiences through Avon CSD Interact. The Paul Harris +4 Rotarian is now director of the North American New Generations Service Exchange serving the U.S., Canada and Mexico. Only 14 Rotary districts in the U.S. have NGSE programs though they have been popular in Europe for years. It is "customizable" for young professionals 18-30 years old seeking experiences in their fields of interest/careers over an 8-week-6 month stay. The young professionals are connected to host clubs that can find families and business owners interested in having them. The NGSE's have a few things in common: they want to make the world a better place, travel and learn more. NGSE has less rigidity than Rotary's other youth programs. It shows how Rotary can continue to be a part of their lives after high school so Julie and fellow volunteers are reaching out to former Interactors, Rotaractors, exchangers and RYLA alumni about NGSE. Julie told of Hugo from Brazil, who with his father has a landscaping business and wanted to learn about sustainable farming. She connected him to Cornell University. Brazil's NGSE director connected Julie with a young woman who was placed in Avon CSD to learn about counseling and, like another young woman from Italy who shadowed a second-grade classroom in Victor, took back to their homelands the many mental health and support services American students enjoy. 
