Over the past year, I had the pleasure of traveling throughout District 7120 and visiting all 60 of the clubs, forming new friendships through fellowship. Most Past District Governors told me the journey would be worthwhile, and they were right it exceeded my hopes. As your District Governor, it was a privilege to share Rotary International President Arezzo's message, Unite for Good, with members across the district and to celebrate those moments with him at the Eastern Cities Dinner.

As we near the finish line of the Rotary year, our district has much to celebrate. Membership has grown by more than 130 new members. Our District has welcomed two New Clubs, FLX Satellite Club associated with Newark Rotary and the exciting New Americans Rotoract Club in Northwest Rochester. We are also

remarkably close to chartering a new club in the Hornell- Canisteo Area. Rotary Annual giving to The Rotary Foundation has reached a new high of over \$232,000, and our clubs' contributions to End Polio Now Fund exceeds \$57,900. 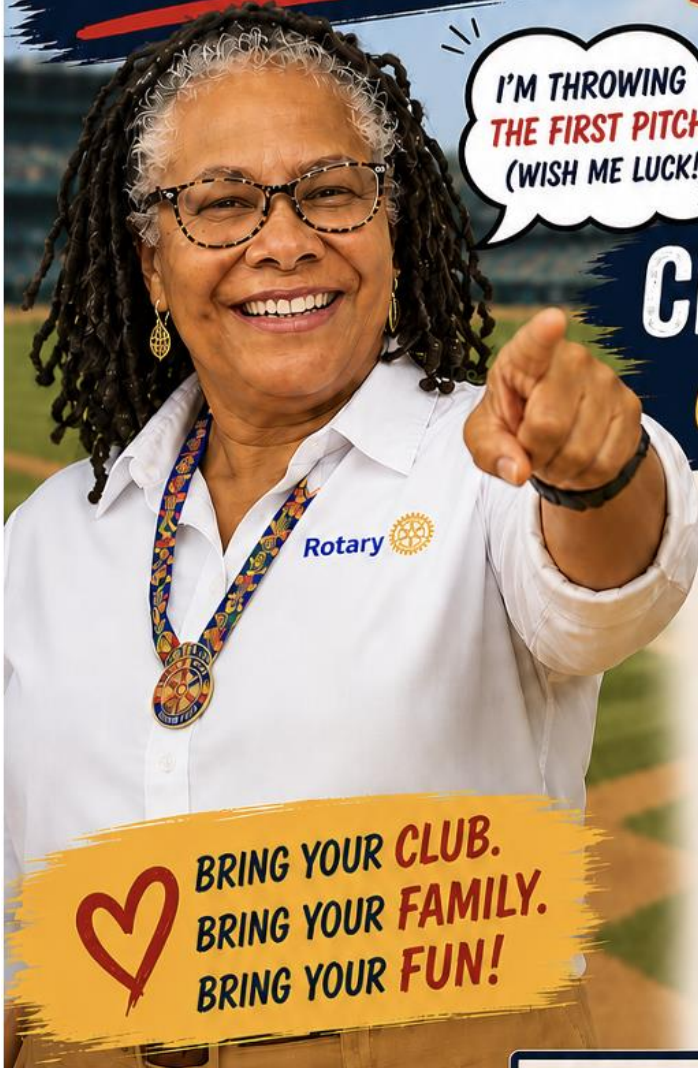

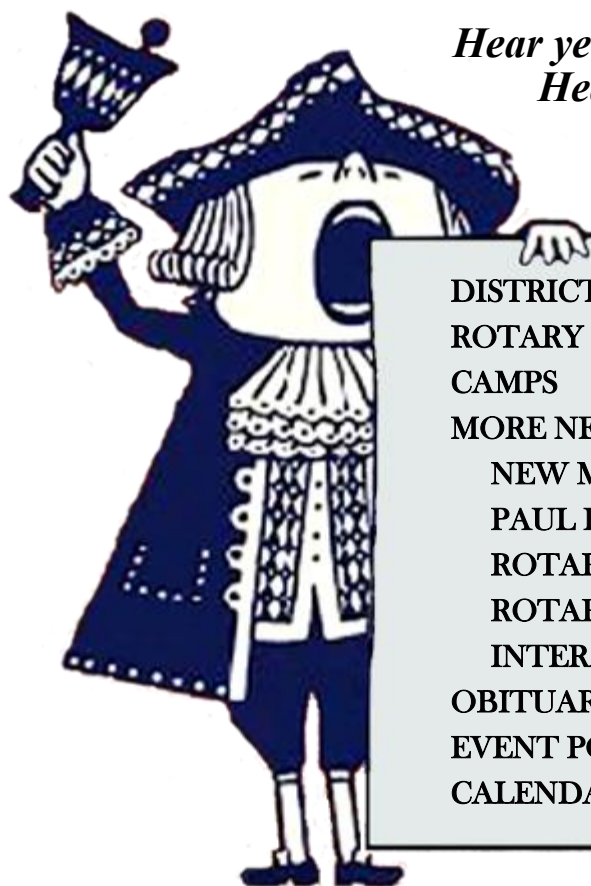

Human Trafficking Is in Your Area

Human trafficking is a serious violation of human rights that occurs in all 50 states, the District of Columbia, and U.S. territories. Although frequently misunderstood as a crime involving the movement of people across borders, human trafficking is largely a regional and local issue, often occurring within the victims' own hometowns or residences.

Estimates suggest that hundreds of thousands of individuals are experiencing human trafficking in the United States at any given time, with some data indicating as many as 1.1 million people enslaved. Despite these high numbers, the crime is consistently underreported due to its covert nature, low community awareness, and the trauma-induced fear that often prevents victims from self-identifying or seeking help.

The District 7120 End Human Trafficking Committee has tools available for Rotary clubs to help fight human trafficking in their area. The committee is available to come to clubs to do a presentation on human trafficking and how Rotary clubs can bring awareness to their community.

The committee has a model for Rotary clubs to have an end human trafficking community event to bring schools districts, local law enforcement and students & parents to discuss how to safely navigate social media. The committee can come moderate the event and assist in helping clubs set up the event. Rotarians Take Action in Support of Mt. Morris Remote Area Medical



Event

In 2023, Livingston County was designated as a Health Professional Shortage Area (HPSA) for dental care, indicating a severe scarcity of dental professionals. As a result, many residents, especially those with low incomes or disabilities, experience long wait times or must travel significant distances to obtain dental care. With the 2024 closure of a dental clinic on the Livingston County campus, 2,000 patients left without a dental home.

To help address these challenges, the Rotary Clubs in District 7120 will be partnering with the New York State Dental Foundation, a 501(c)(3) organization that expands access to dental care for vulnerable New Yorkers, to host a free health clinic in partnership with Remote Area Medical (RAM®). The mission of RAM® is to prevent pain and alleviate suffering by providing free healthcare to those without access.

Approximately 200 individuals will be served with free medical, dental, and vision care at Mt. Morris Central School District on the weekend of **October 3-4, 2026**. To prepare for this massive effort, the New York State Dental Foundation must secure 200 volunteers and raise \$50,000.

This effort is driven by a simple but powerful goal: to bring quality, compassionate healthcare to members of our community who need it most.

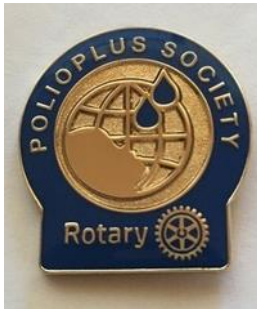

Our wish is to have at least one member of the PolioPlus Society from every club.

Rotary has been working to eradicate polio for more than 35 years. Our goal of ridding the world of this disease is closer than ever.

As a founding partner of the [Global Polio Eradication Initiative](#), we've reduced polio cases by 99.9 percent since our first project to vaccinate children in the Philippines in 1979.

Rotary members have contributed more than \$2.1 billion and countless volunteer hours to protect nearly 3 billion children in 122 countries from this paralyzing disease. Rotary's advocacy efforts have played a role in decisions by governments to contribute more than \$10 billion to the effort.

Today, polio remains endemic only in Afghanistan and Pakistan. But it's crucial to continue working to keep other countries polio-free. If all eradication efforts stopped today, within 10 years, polio could paralyze as many as 200,000 children each year.

By the numbers:

- \$3 average cost to fully protect a child against polio
- 430 million children in total vaccinated in 39 countries in 2017
- \$100 million cost to conduct polio surveillance worldwide

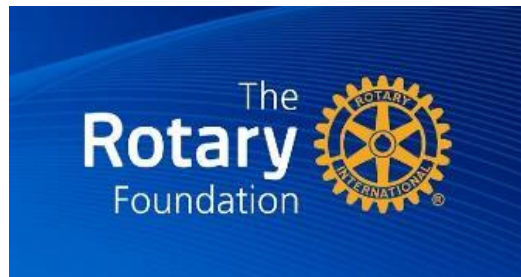

In early May, the V-F Rotary Club hosted Inv. Robert Leunig of the NYSP Collision Reconstruction Unit (CRU), a part of the Forensic Unit at Troop E Headquarters in Farmington. Investigator Leunig is a ten-year veteran of the State Police. He discussed the structure and duties of his unit.

A (2012) graduate of SUNY Geneseo, he began a career as a mathematics teacher in a school district (Northport) on Long Island. In 2016 he made a career change when he was appointed as a Trooper in the NYSP. After joining the State Police, he was attracted to the CRU. A position in the CRU requires a strong mathematical background. He eventually was promoted to the Bureau of Criminal Investigation and assigned to Troop E CRU .

Troop E CRU, based at Troop E Headquarters in Farmington, covers a ten-county area that matches most of the counties in D-7120. It is part of the Forensic Unit. It serves state police investigations and local police agencies, and/or prosecutors, when requested. It is part of the NYSP chain of forensic support facilities that include the State Police Laboratory in Albany and the satellite lab in Olean.

Inv. Leuning noted that CRU personnel, because of their advanced training in evidence gathering, may also be used for gathering crime scene evidence by the Troop E Forensic unit. He also noted the impact the use of drones has had on the field of evidence gathering.

As part of his presentation, he utilized a Power-point format to demonstrate how the use of a drone and advanced forensic capabilities were utilized in a Rochester area fatal collision (I-490) to establish what occurred.

This was the second of three programs presented annually by the club in conjunction with National Police Memorial Day, established by President John F. Kennedy in 1963.

Honeoye Lake Rotary Club

The Honeoye Lake Rotary Club has a history of giving to the community through its service projects. Each year our club partially funds Honeoye community projects through grant monies that are received from our Rotary District 7120. In past years the Club has sponsored and constructed several amenities at Sandy Bottom Park including the enclosed bathhouse/pavilion, adapted picnic tables, the inclined ramp, the playgrounds, and some maintenance. The club was also involved with the construction of the tennis courts at Honeoye Central School on Allens Hill Road.

More recently and with the above projects in place it was decided in the 2017-2018 Rotary year, to apply for a District Grant that focused on literacy. Literacy and education are an integral part of the mission of Rotary worldwide. Originally, we focused on providing ebooks and audio books to our local population through the three local libraries, but along the way we developed a proposal that would work for the entire OWWL library system (Ontario, Wayne Wyoming and Livingston County libraries). Our goal in securing and implementing this grant will be in place for gears to come.

The following year Rotary turned its attention back to Sandy Bottom Park & Nature Trails that is contiguous to Honeoye Lake. There were several staged components to this project as developed by the local *Parks & Recreation Committee* and the *Friends of Sandy Bottom Park*. Improving the nature trails was a primary focus along with cutting down the diseased Ash trees that are scattered throughout the park. Through Rotary grant funds two new kiosks were built existing kiosks repaired, a variety of signage (directional informational educational etc.) was installed and a new pamphlet was published that will be available at each of the kiosks and other locations. Cleaning-up the lagoon was also on the agenda.

In Rotary year, 2022-2023, Rotary concentrated its efforts on Honeoye's senior citizens. Prior to the 2018 elections, our local senior citizens raised the issue that they felt there was a void of events/activities and learning experiences for individuals in the senior cohort. Surveys were conducted by the Recreation Director to establish the wants and needs of our seniors. This program operated under the auspices of the Town's Recreation Department. Honeoye Rotary applied for a district grant to provide monthly lunches, activities, arts/ crafts, programs and speakers for the seniors. Meetings were held in Richmond's Town Hall which is a newer building and is ADA compliant, Bristol Town Park and Sandy Bottom Beach. Lunches were catered by local nearby restaurants. Rotarians attended some of the monthly meetings and assisted seniors with making crafts and serving lunches. During three different years {2020-2021, 2023 -2024, and 2025-2026), the Honeoye Lake Rotary returned to our pre-eminent literacy program. The *Gift-Book-A-Month* project, began seven years ago at Honeoye Elementary School with only the pre-kindergarten class.

Its success planted the seed for our club to grow this initiative and it has been supported by the Honeoye Central School superintendent and elementary school librarian; both are Rotarians. The purpose is to assure that Honeoye students are fully literate throughout their lifetimes and have a personal library at their home. Each month approximately 250 students in the elementary school (Grade Pk - 5) receive a free book of their personal choice that is age/reading level appropriate. Book distributions usually occur the third week of the month. Each book is stamped with a message that Books Are a Special Gift from the Honeoye Lake Rotary Club. Each student inscribes her/his name in their book their books are then date-stamped and bimonthly each student also receives a free children's bookmark. Two years ago we began gifting each elementary teacher a set of 10 books of their choice for their classroom libraries to further encourage reading/writing and literacy.

In collaboration with the *Main Street Enhancement Committee (2024-2025)*, Honeoye Lake Rotary Club secured a District Grant to provide an information and local map kiosk. It had been identified that there was a need for greater availability of information about Honeoye. It is located on Main Street at Honeoye Commons and was installed by Rotarians.

During summer 2026, the Honeoye Lake Rotary Club will be participating in the Strawberry Festival on 28 June. On 11 July, the club will be participating in the Junk in the Trunk Sale. Donations are welcome. The Honeoye Lake Rotary Club co-sponsors the *Performances at the Gazebo* with the Honeoye Public Library. The Club's 41st annual golf tournament will be held on Monday, 27 July at Lima Country Club. This yearly event allows us to raise money for the many community service projects our Rotary club conducts throughout the year.
