OVERVIEW

In May 2019 four hundred men and women are expected to assemble at the Rotary District 7120 Conference to exchange ideas and learn about the continuing efforts to address the needs of communities locally and worldwide. The conference's main focus will be to bring awareness to clubs' efforts and celebrate Rotary's accomplishments.

Rotary connects 1.2 million members from more than 200 countries and geographical areas. Its work impacts lives at the local and international levels.

OVERCOMING CHALLENGES & PROBLEMS

Polio

In 1985 there were approximately 1,000 new cases of polio each day in 125 countries. Since that time it has been Rotary's mission to eradicate this disease.

- 2.5 billion children have been vaccinated against polio.
- It is estimated that vaccination programs have prevented 17 million new cases. Since the beginning of 2018 only 13 cases of polio have been reported worldwide.
- Each vaccination only costs approximately 60 cents.

Clean Water, Sanitation, and Preventable Disease

In 1990 approximately 32,000 children died worldwide each day due to malnutrition, poor health care, and inadequate sanitation. Due in part to the efforts of Rotary, that number has fallen to 16,000 each day.

Literacy

Currently, more than 775 million people over the age of 15 are illiterate. Rotary helps build schools, provides educational materials and teacher training, and participates in adult literacy initiatives.

- Each day thousands of Rotarians spread their love of reading to children through volunteer and outreach programs.
- Rotary members in the United States partnered with ProLiteracy Detroit helping 500 adults raise their reading levels by three grades.

The schools will have classroom water filters, hand washing stations, toilets, septic tanks, and drainage systems. The project includes: consulting with local residents, community advocates, employees, and the students' parents to assess the priorities of each school and community.

In Rotary District 7120 clubs work in their local communities to further the mission of Rotary International. Below are just a few of the initiatives they support:

- Local food pantries, community gardens, soup kitchens, etc. to provide nutritional meals for children, homeless, and seniors
- Scholarships to graduating seniors to support their continued education
- Adopt-a-Highway cleanup
- Community park cleanups/renovations
- Project Care Shopping for the Elderly
- Rotary Youth Exchange (inbound and outbound students)

Now, the challenge for all of us, especially the Club Presidents and/or Club Membership Chairs, is to work hard to maintain that net gain or even increase the number. This means that we must work doubly hard to retain our current members or to ensure that there are new members to replace those who may leave.

How could we do this? Here are a few ideas which I am sure you all know but it would be great to mention them here again:

1. Get those **Satisfaction Surveys** completed to see how the members feels about our club- what do they love about your club? Are there things that they would like to see changed? How would they like to be engaged? Other thoughts and ideas from them.
2. **Strategic Planning – It really works!** If you feel you need help on how to start your Club Strategic Planning, call Governor Mike who will talk to you how you may proceed
3. Encourage **every Club member identify a potential member**, submit the name to your Club Membership Committee who will review the submissions and may designate one or more members to make the contact. Or, **form Teams** who will come up with name(s) of potential members.
4. **Hold a contest and reward** those who would bring potential members to your club meeting, club service projects or social event within a specific period of time. Give gift card at a local store or restaurant, etc.
5. Have several names collected? Then, **hold a Rotary Open House or After Business Hour Rotary Social Time** for Rotary information sharing. Serve snacks and beverages. Have a Rotarian and/or a non-Rotarian share how Rotary has positively changed their life.
6. Talk about Membership Attraction at your Club Meetings. **Make it Front-and-Center during your club meetings** to get club members excited and informed.
7. Call any of the Rotary Clubs that have shown net gains. See above list.
8. Visit Rotary.org/learn or Rotary.org/membership. You will find best membership development practices.

Corning Rotary Announces Scholarship Applications Now Available




INTERNATIONAL ROTARY GOVERNORS HOSTED BY STATE POLICE

GEM Village will educate and train families and prevent malnutrition. Prenatal care as well as maternity care will also be offered. A significant reason children are born with special needs is due to unsafe deliveries.

The Therapy center will be where children are worked with and encouraged daily by licensed therapists to reach their full potential.


For each of us, the thirty years melted away in a moment.



Heartfelt Message For All (taken from the February Avon Rotary Newsletter)

As I was thinking about this month's newsletter and what area of inspiration to draw from as I put pen to paper, I was hit with the news of the untimely passing of two members of our Rotary family, Steve Robertson of Lima Rotary and Liz Green from Avon Central School. So, it is with a heavy heart that I write to you this month.

I had the pleasure of meeting Steve, who was Lima Rotary's Past President, a few weeks ago in Inlet as he is an avid Snowmobiler. Laurie was wearing her Rotary pull-over while at one of our stops and Steve immediately connected with that. We had a great weekend with our new friend whom we quickly realized was a kind, genuine, gentle soul. We only spent about 8 hours with Steve over that weekend, but the connection we made with him was instant. I have learned that he had this type of impact on everyone that was lucky enough to meet him – he was just that kind of person.

As I was trying to digest the news of Steve's passing, I learned last night about Liz Green's passing. This one is especially tough to us all as she impacted the lives of so many in our community. Liz had been working closely with a few of us on this year's Grant and recurring project for Stone's Community Resources. Her kindness, love for children and passion to help those in need was evident in every interaction with her. She had an energy about her that was contagious and inspiring, which always made me reflect on how I can be better. Every time I talked with Liz, she would share her immense gratitude for what Rotary was doing for the kids in Avon not recognizing that she was the reason we are able to do what we're doing. She was so selfless and did not look for praise or recognition, but rather was driven by the desire to help those that couldn't always help themselves. It's this kind of attitude that made her a Rotarian in my mind as she lived our motto day in and day out. There is no way to make sense of these tragedies and losing people so young with so much left to give. The only thing we can do is live our lives in a way that honors their legacy and

continues to keep their memory alive. These events also remind us that life is short and we need to live each day to its fullest, which gave me a different perspective on this month's Rotary theme of 'Peace and Conflict Resolution'. Normally, we view this on the global scale in terms of war or other large conflicts, but we can look at this topic through the lens of our own lives. Are we doing everything we can to create peace and unity in our communities, families, groups that we belong to, etc.? What else can we do to live a life that makes other people want to be better the way that Liz and Steve did? It doesn't take a lot to make someone's day – it could just be a warm smile, giving a compliment, or holding the door. You never know what people are going through in a given day, so if we all look for an opportunity to make someone's day a little bit brighter, it will have an endless ripple effect.


The program is a nine-week program for students who are reading below their grade level. The students were identified by the school as needing additional assistance and the student resides in a household where there is limited income.




