



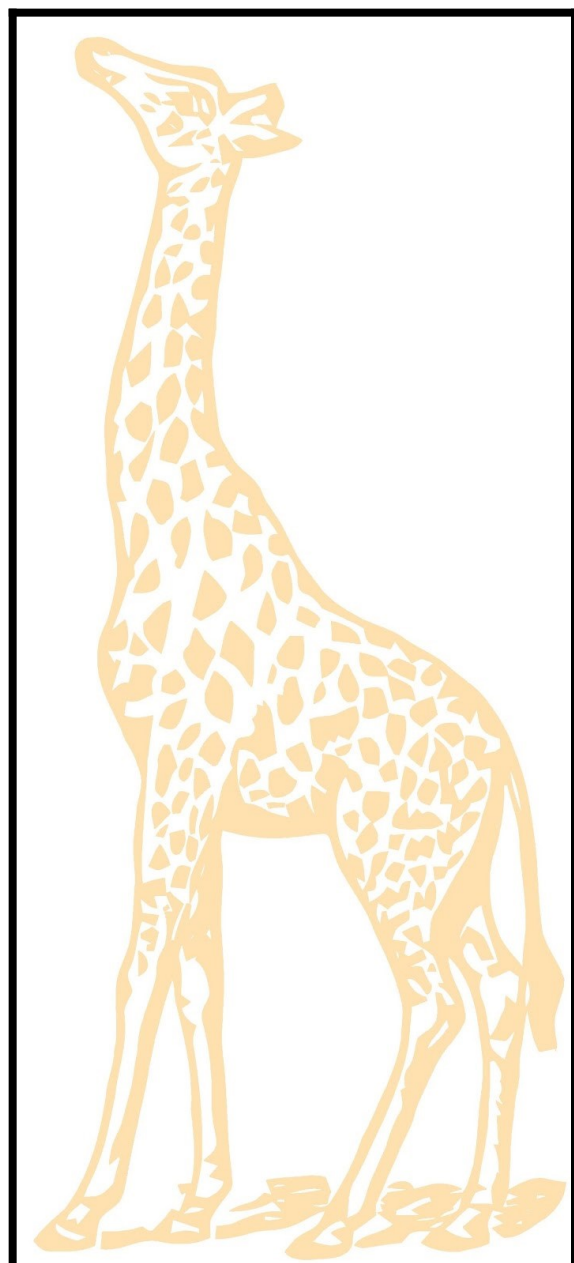

OVERVIEW

In May 2019 four hundred men and women are expected to assemble at the Rotary District 7120 Conference to exchange ideas and learn about the continuing efforts to address the needs of communities locally and worldwide. The conference's main focus will be to bring awareness to clubs' efforts and celebrate Rotary's accomplishments.

Rotary connects 1.2 million members from more than 200 countries and geographical areas. Its work impacts lives at the local and international levels.

Your participation will show the community that you stand with Rotary in its commitment to solving challenges and problems faced by communities worldwide. From literacy and peace to water and health, Rotarians are always working to better our world.

OVERCOMING CHALLENGES & PROBLEMS

Polio

In 1985 there were approximately 1,000 new cases of polio each day in 125 countries. Since that time it has been Rotary's mission to eradicate this disease.

- 2.5 billion children have been vaccinated against polio.
- It is estimated that vaccination programs have prevented 17 million new cases. In 2018 only 29 cases of polio were reported worldwide.
- Each vaccination only costs approximately 60 cents.

Clean Water, Sanitation, and Preventable Disease

In 1990 approximately 32,000 children died worldwide each day due to malnutrition, poor health care, and inadequate sanitation. Due in part to the efforts of Rotary, that number has fallen to 16,000 each day.

Literacy

Currently, more than 775 million people over the age of 15 are illiterate. Rotary helps build schools, provides educational materials and teacher training, and participates in adult literacy initiatives.

- Each day thousands of Rotarians spread their love of reading to children through volunteer and outreach programs.
- Rotary members in the United States partnered with ProLiteracy Detroit helping 500 adults raise their reading levels by three grades.

The project includes: consulting with local residents, community advocates, employees, and the students' parents to assess the priorities of each school and community.

In Rotary District 7120 clubs work in their local communities to further the mission of Rotary International. Below are just a few of the initiatives they support:

- Dictionaries to third graders at their schools
- Local food pantries, community gardens, soup kitchens, etc. to provide nutritional meals for children, homeless, and seniors
- Scholarships to graduating seniors to support their continued education
- Adopt-a-Highway cleanup
- Community park cleanups/renovations
- Project Care Shopping for the Elderly
- Rotary Youth Exchange (inbound and outbound students)

The program invites Governors Elect from countries around the Rotary world to be hosted prior to their attending the International Assembly in San Diego, CA for their training to become District Governor of their home districts. These DGE visitors will be in our district from January 10 to January 18, 2020 to experience a week of D7120 Rotary hospitality.

Currently we have 13 future District Governors registered and here is your opportunity to host a DGE from Australia (4), Finland (1), India (1), Lesotho (1), Pakistan (1), Sweden (2), Uganda (1), Whales (1), or Zambia (1). The first hosting period is from January 4th to January 8th followed by the second period from January 8th to January 12th. On Tuesday afternoon January 14th, all hosts and guests gather at the Finger Lakes Community College in Canandaigua for the changeover lunch after which our guests move on to their 2nd host.

Our visiting DGE's make great speakers for your club and provide your club members an opportunity to exchange Rotary ideas with someone from another country. Also, many hosts have had the opportunity to visit their guests in their home countries.

GPEI News: This year is off to an intense start to maintain global momentum and resources for eradication. In January, the WHO Executive Board recommitted to supporting global efforts, and the incoming and outgoing Chairs of the Polio Oversight Board travelled to Afghanistan and Pakistan to witness and support the work of those countries. Health workers on the front lines vaccinated hard-to-reach children, drivers transported vaccines to warehouses, and surveillance officers worked to quickly and effectively track down the virus.

A year after Hurricane Maria tore through Puerto Rico, local Rotary members continue to rebuild homes and lives

Eladio Montalvo faced a stark choice: risk drowning in his one-story home or climb through a window into the house next door. It was under construction but had a second floor where he could escape the rising floodwaters. He boosted his dog through and scrambled in after him. The two huddled inside an upstairs bathroom for 22 hours while Hurricane Maria raged over Puerto Rico. With 155 mph winds and torrential rains, Maria was the strongest hurricane to hit the island in more than 80 years.

After the storm, Montalvo went out to see what was left of the home he had lived in since 1958. The walls were standing, but the water inside had risen chest-high. Everything was destroyed. Without any family nearby, he had nowhere to go. Hemoved into his car.

“But after the storm came the calm,” he says. “Good people came.”

Faustino Rivera pats Montalvo affectionately on the shoulder. It’s September 2018, a year since Hurricane Maria, and Rivera and several other members of the Rotary Club of Mayagüez have stopped by to visit. Montalvo lives in a fishing town called El Maní outside the city of Mayagüez on the island’s west coast. He invites his guests inside to see the progress he has made adding a shower to his bathroom. There’s a pile of tiles that he plans to lay soon, and he has started painting the walls a light shade of blue. The home is neatly but sparsely furnished: a bed, a TV, and a few plastic bins, including one labeled *camisas* that has shirts and shorts tucked inside.

“He’s become my friend,” says Rotarian Orlando Carlo, who checks in on Montalvo almost every week.

Opioid addiction affects millions of Americans and their families. There is no demographic that has not been touched by the opioid epidemic, as it impacts people of all ages, genders, orientations, ethnicities, classes, and professions.

Every day, more than 130 people in the United States die after overdosing on opioids. The misuse of and addiction to opioids—including prescription pain relievers, heroin, and synthetic opioids such as fentanyl—is a serious national crisis that affects public health as well as social and economic welfare.

The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention estimates that the total "economic burden" of prescription opioid misuse alone in the United States is \$78.5 billion a year, including the costs of healthcare, lost productivity, addiction treatment, and criminal justice involvement. The Nation is in the midst of an unprecedented opioid epidemic.

Prevention and access to treatment for opioid addiction and overdose reversal drugs are critical to fighting this epidemic.

The Spencerport Rotary along with the Monroe County Sheriff's Department are producing a 30 second commercial on *opioid prevention and education* and will target all ages in the Monroe County Community (Young kids to seniors with the average age being 35). The Monroe County Sheriff's Department will be the voice on the commercial which will be written in collaboration with Rotary, Sheriff's Department and I Heart radio. The cost of airing this commercial will be \$1,350 per week which includes the cost to produce the commercial. The commercial would be broadcasted on 7 different radio stations during prime listening hours (morning and evening commute) Monday through Friday.

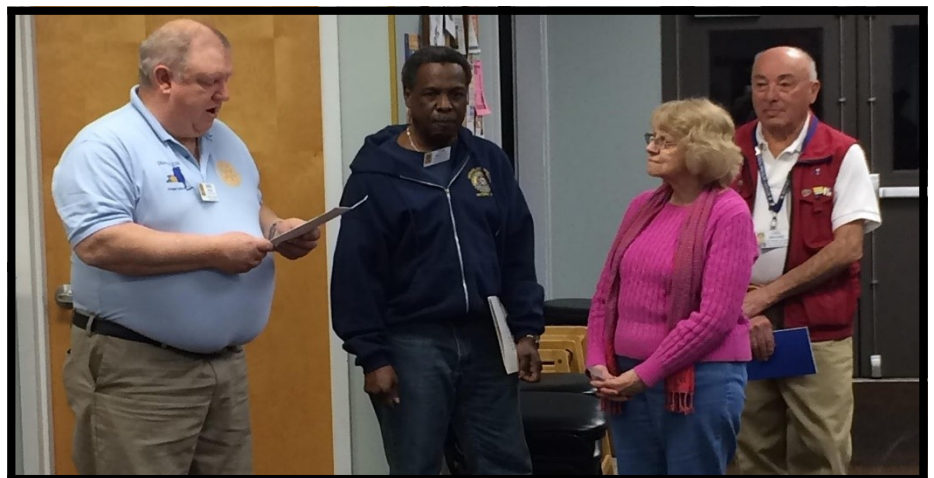

Avon Rotary News

By the 1950s Avon's rich heritage had brought it harness racing, churches, a library, a fire department and the original Tom Wahl restaurant. But although the town had doctors it didn't have an ambulance. Fortunately it did have a civic-minded resident with a critical connection: Ted Coyne.

When a funeral home unsuccessfully shopped around a no-longer-needed hearse it turned to the Avon Rotary, where Ted was a member. He saw a potential use for it and persuaded Rotary to get the hearse and convert it into the community's first ambulance.

So began Ted Coyne's association with the rescue service, and after nearly 60 years with it and about to turn 93, he has decided to step down.

His leadership, contributions and advice were critical during those years but in the beginning "we didn't know what we're doing but it couldn't get in worse shape. You start from there," Ted said. "So we painted the old hearse white and put a red cross on it. We called it the White Ghost."

For the next six decades Ted shepherded the service through the purchases of several ambulances, found housing for the vehicles, became a charter member of the board of directors, welcomed participation from the Avon Lions club, raised money and donated materials and untold hours of his time, all of it unpaid.

When a vacant church became available the directors bought it and with a lot of voluntary help and donations it was converted into a large new home for two ambulances and a crew, complete with a bedroom, living room and kitchen.

"We got it done," Ted said, "and we've been up here for six or seven years, maybe more." Currently two big-box ambulances and a "fly car" that does not transport patients are housed there.

As to why he felt it was time to retire from the board, Ted said simply "my term was up on Jan. 1. I said to have a guy 92 years old on the board and coming up for another four-year term is a little bit crazy."

In honor of his 60-plus years of commitment the Lions and Rotary installed a plaque on the ambulance offices. It reads: "This building is dedicated to Ted Coyne for his tireless dedication to the Avon Rotary-Lions Ambulance Service. August 19, 2012."

Ted is still an active club member. Past President Tom Vonglis said "Ted is certainly one of those people who is extremely invested in the community he lives in. His service on the ambulance board for over 50 years is a testament to his character and commitment. I truly appreciate all that he has done and given in so many ways. He is a great example of the Rotary motto of 'Service Above Self.'"

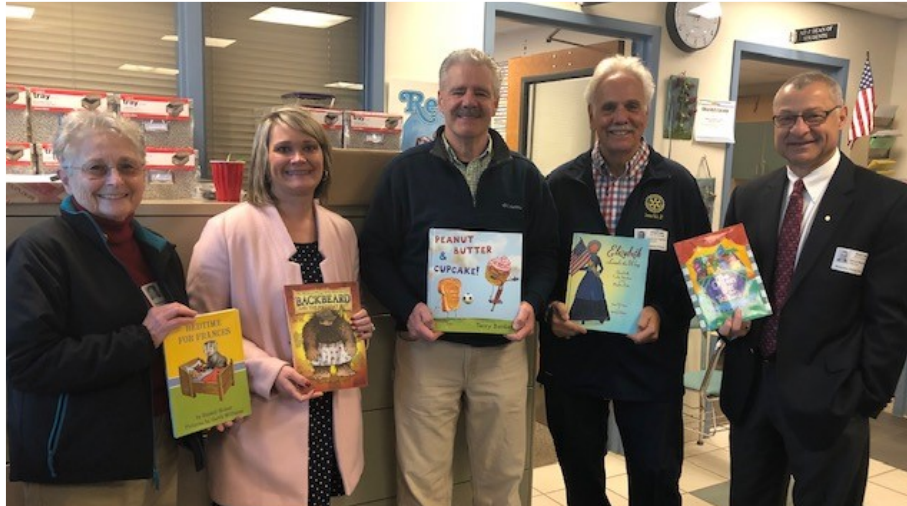

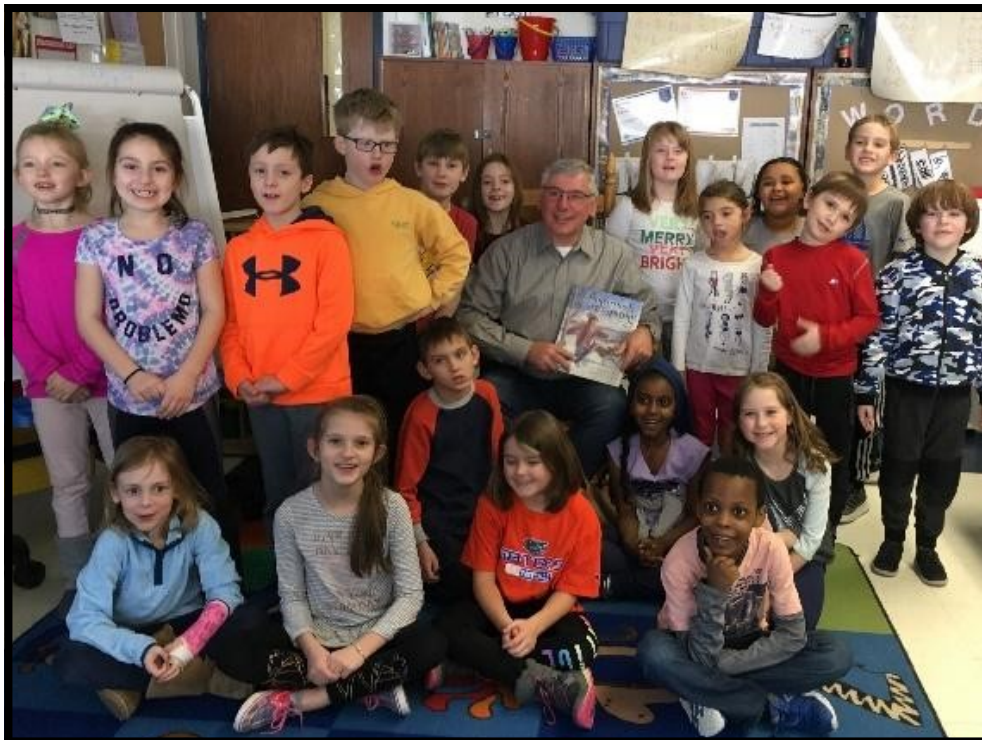

GEM Village will educate and train families and prevent malnutrition. Prenatal care as well as maternity care will also be offered. The Therapy center will be where children are worked with and encouraged daily by licensed therapists to reach their full potential.

The General Medical Center is where general medical needs will be met and out-reach to educate and train families in how to best care for their children and help them to thrive.

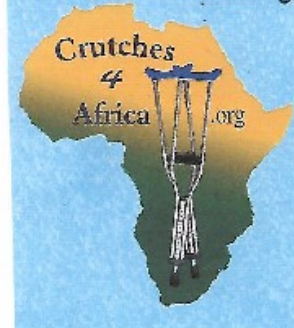

A. Have Your Club Commit to the Project

1. Review the overall project, present it to your club or board of directors and encourage them to consider participating in it.
2. Contact me, Rich Comins of the Webster Rotary Club (richecomins@gmail.com) or (585-899-9336), to let me know if your club would like to be a partner in this project.

B. Promotion Processes

1. Create a public service announcement to promote this project or modify the one available from Rich Comins of the Webster Rotary Club to meet your needs.
2. Contact your local radio station to run the public service announcement. Ask if they would be one of the partners in this project and donate the radio time.
3. Ask one of the ministers in your community to contact the rest of the ministers and find out if they have any of the items we are collecting in storage and if they would like to donate some of them. Also ask if they would be willing to announce this initiative to the members of the congregation, hopefully at church services.
4. Put posters in store windows announcing the project and the day for a community drop off of mobility devices.

C. Funding Aspects of the Project

1. Getting the forty foot cargo container to Africa is estimated to cost \$3.00 per "unit" or \$10,000. That represents about 3,333 items or units. If any club wishes we would appreciate any monetary donation made to the Crutches 4 Africa Foundation. C4A foundation is a 501c3 organization. Checks can be sent to the C4A Foundation at 384 Franklin ST Denver, Colorado 80209 We will put the word out to all clubs in the district asking for their support by requesting they consider contributing toward this part of the project as well.

D. Collection Process in Your Community

1. Find several members of your club to identify a few pickup trucks, vans, box trucks and/or trailers to carry the donated devices and get a commitment to use them the morning of the "Community Drop-Off".
2. Ask a few club members to help on collection day.
 - a. The devices should be sorted if possible or at least segregated on the trucks.
 - b. The crutches should be tied together with their mates with ribbon or yarn.
 - c. Any donated items that are not reasonably clean and in good condition should be rejected. The condition of the donated items should be covered in the PSA as well as on all posters. The donor should be thanked politely and if they insist on leaving the item(s) anyway, gladly accept it for another purpose or disposal.
 - d. We recommend your team of volunteers has some wipes available to wipe off basic surface dust.
3. All collections should be completed with enough time to get the donated items to the District Central Collection Point by the assigned time.

E. Transportation to the District Central Collection Point

1. WE have a 40' sea container donated for a period of 4 months. This container is located at the Webster Recreation Center 1350 Chiyoda Drive , Webster, N.Y.. If anyone is planning to attend the District Assembly in Ontario N.Y. in April if you bring the Items you have collected we will have a trailer there to transfer them to the container, or we can arrange to meet you at the container before or after the assembly.
2. If you collect more after the Assembly please let me know so that I can arrange for pick-up before the 15th of May so that we can get them into the container before the 25th of May. We will follow packing instructions we are given by those who have done this process before. We do anticipate most items will be shrink wrapped with other items.

We look forward to having you and your club members join us on this great collaborative project!
