If so, please consider submitting an Application. Else, look around your Club, your Rotary Area and our Rotary District. Who have you noticed with the skills needed to lead our District into the next decade of the twenty-first Century? Who would you like to see leading District 7120, in a few years? Reach out, ask a few questions, some people, very qualified people, only need a little "push" to consider accepting the rewarding challenge of helping lead a Rotary District to discover and demonstrate its potential for "Service Above Self".

To assist you in your effort, here is the **Procedure and Requirements** for a Rotary District Governor...

District 7120 District Governor 2021-2022 Nominating Procedure & Requirements

A candidate should **NOT** contact any member of the Nominating Committee*, as this would be construed to be electioneering which is forbidden. If any Prospective Candidate has any questions they should contact the District Governor-Elect (Dave Hannan, davidthannan@icloud.com) or District Governor-Nominee (Linda Kohl, lkohl58@aol.com).

Important information for the prospective Candidate:

A Nominee for District Governor must meet the following minimum qualifications:

- Must have served a full term as a Club President and been a Rotarian for seven years;
- Must be physically fit and able to withstand at least two rigorous years;
- Must be willing to devote the required time and be able to perform as hereinafter set forth;
- Should have at least one year working at the District Level in a leadership position;

- Should have a good working knowledge of Rotary;
- Must not be a member of the sitting Nominating Committee;
- Must have the support of his/her club.

The Candidate <u>must</u> complete an application for consideration as District Governor.

- The application must be signed by the Candidate and the Secretary of the Rotarian's Club.
- The application must be returned to the Chair of the District Nominating Committee by the due date on the Application (October 16, 2018).

After receipt of a complete application, the chair of the District Nominating Committee will contact the Candidate to schedule a personal interview.

- The Candidate will be contacted for an interview time.
- The spouse or partner of the Candidate is strongly encouraged to attend this interview.





WHAT IS THE ROTARY LEADERSHIP INSTITUTE?

The Rotary Leadership Institute (RLI) is a multi-district, grassroots leadership development program.

The mission of The Rotary Leadership Institute is to provide an educational opportunity for current, potential, and aspiring Rotary leaders. Courses foster Rotary knowledge and leadership skills. It is hoped that these courses will also motivate the participants to be enthusiastic, creative and dedicated Rotarians. Course methods will reflect the most innovative and participatory methods possible. Methods will include discussion groups, role-playing, problem solving workshops, group planning exercises, etc. Lectures are limited and no PowerPoint presentations are used.

The Institute offers a leadership course in three full day parts (Parts I, II, III), plus a Graduate course for 2018 (Engaging Members and Managing Volunteers) for those who have completed all three of the previous parts. The courses are designed to provide Rotary knowledge and to develop leadership skills for voluntary organizations. Some examples of course sessions include; Insights into Leadership, where we explore the characteristics of leadership, Ethics and Vocational Service where we discuss "doing good in your local community and around the world. Strengthen your club by promoting and leading planning and analysis; Attracting Members; Club Communication; Team Building. Effective Leadership Strategies; International Service; and Public Image & Public Relations, identifying opportunities to promote the image of your club and Rotary to the benefit of your community and world.

Attending the Rotary Leadership Institute allows participants to assess their own experience and growth in Rotary and can help improve the path for others to follow.

I hope to see you at the D7120 Rotary Leadership Institute scheduled for November 3 at the Palmyra-Macedon High School 151 Hyde Parkway, Palmyra, NY. (Note location change from past years).





They were 26 Rotary clubs represented at the seminar. Thank you to all that attended and gave up a Saturday morning to be there and share literacy ideas.


Illiteracy traps adults and their families in poverty!!!

You don't have to travel to Philadelphia to take part in Rotary's World Polio Day event on 24 October. You can watch a livestream of the proceedings from your computer or smartphone starting at 18:30 Philadelphia time (UTC-4). A recording will be available shortly after the event on <u>endpolio.org</u>.

Rotary will also stream the event in French, German, Italian, Japanese, Korean, Portuguese, and Spanish.

This year's event will be livestreamed from the <u>College of Physicians of Philadelphia</u>, known as the birthplace of American medicine. It is one of the oldest professional medical organizations in the United States.

Global health experts and Rotary's celebrity polio ambassadors will discuss our remarkable progress toward a polio-free world. Patience Asiimwe, the protagonist of Rotary's upcoming virtual reality film "Two Drops of Patience," will introduce the movie. A sneak peek from Rotary's documentary "Drop to Zero" will also be featured. Jeffrey Kluger, senior editor for Time magazine, will discuss his experience traveling to Nigeria with Rotary to report on polio eradication. And we'll celebrate the 30th anniversary of the founding of the Global Polio Eradication Initiative.

Local Organizations Step Up for Literacy in the Schools

Prior to the Board of Education meeting on September 19, 2018, representatives of the Rotary Club of Corning, The First Presbyterian Church of Corning, and First Heritage Federal Credit Union presented the Corning-Painted Post Area School District with a big check symbolizing \$39,000 in combined donations made to date in support of a kindergarten through second grade literacy initiative.

Since the 2015-16 school year, Rotary has donated \$24,000, First Presbyterian Church has donated \$9,000, and First Heritage has donated \$6,000 to the program, which has helped support reading at Winfield Street Elementary School and more recently, William E. Severn Elementary School.

In the program, the organizations \overline{a} dopt a grade level. Each student in the class receives one book each month during the school year, helping to develop a love for reading along with skills in speech, communication, logical thinking, language, as well as improved concentration and focus. Volunteers from the sponsoring organizations also read to students in the classroom and participate in special events and reading celebrations at the schools.

The books are from the We Both Read series, which encourages parents to read to their children. Studies show that when parents engage in the reading process, children are more successful at reading on their own, so each book has a parent page and a child page. The books are also leveled reading, which helps children reading at both lower and higher reading levels.



The initiative is having an impact. It is widely accepted that the ability to read proficiently by the third grade greatly impacts a person's ability to graduate high school and achieve further successes in life. The percentage of students in the adopted cohort at Winfield School meeting the NWEA-established Norm Score and their NWEAprojected growth target from fall to winter 2017 far exceeded established reading standards. David L. Sidle, 84, of Alpine, passed away peacefully surrounded by his children on Friday, September 28, 2018. He was born in








