



About Our District

GRAPEVINE

From the time that Rotary was founded in Chicago, February 23, 1905, until 1915 there was but one big district. In July, 1915, the first districts were established and District 2, consisting of all of New York and New Jersey, came into being. Both Rochester and Elmira were members of this district.

In the Rotary years 1918-1919, with increased numbers of clubs, new districts were established, and District 4 came into being. it included Western New York (that portion west of the 75th Meridian) and part of eastern Ontario (that portion east of the western line of Pennsylvania continuing due north) and Western Quebec (that portion west of the 68th Meridian). Canandaigua, Corning, Geneva, Hornell and Wellsville all were members of District 4.

District 28 was formed during the Rotary year 1922-23. It included New York, (that portion east of the eastern boundaries of Orleans, Genesee and Steuben counties and west of the eastern boundaries of Broome, Chenango, Oswego, Herkimer and Hamilton counties and north of the northern boundaries of Fulton and Warren Counties.) In Quebec, (that portion between Meridian 77deg 30 and the 69th Meridian.) In Ontario, (that portion east of Meridian 77deg30.) District 28 included in New York State: Auburn, Binghamton, Canandaigua, Corning, Cortland, Elmira, Endicott, Fulton, Geneva, Ithaca, Ogdensburg, Oneida, Oneonta, Owego, Penn Yan, Rochester, Rome, Seneca Falls, Syracuse, Utica, Watertown, Watkins-Montour and Waverly. IN ONTARIO-Brockville, Kingston, Ottaawa, Renfrew, Smiths Falls. IN QUEBEC-Hull, Montreal, Quebec, Sherbrooke, Three Rivers.

Effective June 1,1938, District 171 was formed to included in New York State (that portion east of the eastern boundaries of the counties of Orleans, Genesee and Cattaraugus; and south of the northern, east of the western, and north of the southern boundaries of Wyoming County and west of the western boundaries of Tioga, Tompkins, and Cayuga Counties). Clubs included in this new district were Avon, Bath, Canandaigua, Canisteo, Clifton Springs, Clyde, Corning, Dansville, East Rochester, Elmira, Elmira Heights, Fairport, Geneseo, Geneva, Hammondsport, Honeoye Falls, Hornell, Horseheads, Lima, Livonia, Mt. Morris, Newark, Nunda, Penn Yan, Perry, Rochester, Seneca Falls, Sodus, Waterloo, Watkins-Montour, Wayland, Williamson, Wolcott.

During the Rotary year, 1957-58 District 712 was formed with no changes in boundaries. In 1991 District 712 was renamed District 7120 which included 71 clubs in these eleven counties: Allegheny, Chemung, Livingston, Monroe, Ontario, Schuyler, Seneca, Steuben, Wayne, Wyoming and Yates, and the township of Pavilion in Genesee County.

WHAT IS THE ROTARY LEADERSHIP INSTITUTE?

The Rotary Leadership Institute (RLI) is a multi-district, grassroots leadership development program. The mission of The Rotary Leadership Institute is to provide an educational opportunity for current, potential, and aspiring Rotary leaders. Courses foster Rotary knowledge and leadership skills. It is hoped that these courses will also motivate the participants to be enthusiastic, creative and dedicated Rotarians. Course methods will reflect the most innovative and participatory methods possible. Methods will include discussion groups, role-playing, problem solving workshops, group planning exercises, etc. Lectures are limited and no PowerPoint presentations are used.

The Institute offers a leadership course in three full day parts (Parts I, II, III), plus a Graduate course for those who have completed all three of the previous parts. The courses are designed to provide Rotary knowledge and to develop leadership skills for voluntary organizations. Some examples of course sessions include; Insights Into Leadership, where we explore the characteristics of leadership, Ethics and Vocational Service, Foundation I: where we discuss "doing good" in your local community and around the world, Engaging Members -Engaged club members have fun, make friends, and effectively serve. Creating Service Projects; Strategic **Planning & Analysis**, How to strengthen your club by promoting and leading insightful planning and analysis; Attracting Members; Club Communication; Team Building; Effective Leadership Strategies; International Service; and Public Image & Public Relations, identifying opportunities to promote the image of your club and Rotary to the benefit of your community and world

Attending the Rotary Leadership Institute allows participants to assess their own experience and growth in Rotary and can help improve the path for others to follow. I hope to see you at the D7120 Rotary Leadership Institute scheduled for November 4 at the Inn on the Lake in Canandaigua.

The District Membership Development Committee presented two Membership Development Seminars on September 16 & 30, 2017 in Bath and Pittsford, respectively.

There were 31 clubs represented at the seminars.

This year's seminar followed a different format and topics presentation.

The seminar started with <u>Club Assessment</u>- "Getting to know your Rotary Club's Health", using the tool entitled "**Rotary Club Health Check**" to answer the question "Is your Club Healthy?

- Two things about the Rotary Club Health Check tool: (1) When a club uses this tool, it helps the club identify potential "health risks" or areas that need to be looked at and worked on. (2) This tool recommends other resources to use to help the club in addressing identified areas of concern.
- Included in the Club Assessment is identifying the club's strengths and opportunities for improvement that were used in developing goals.
- Discussion on what <u>S.M.A.R.T. goals</u> are and practice on writing SMART goals using information gathered through the Club Assessment session.
- Through working out the areas of concern and looking at the goals established at the seminar, attraction and engagement techniques were identified.
- PDG Glenn also share some of the techniques he uses when he identifies potential members for the new clubs that he is working on.
- A Review of Membership resources. The Rotary International and the District websites were visited.

To avail of the RI membership resources, start with **<u>Rotary.org/membership</u>**. There are numerous resources on the webpage. Once on the page, you will see these following tools and more:

Rotary Club Health Check – helps identify areas of concern that could potentially lead to more serious problems **Membership Minute** – need to subscribe to access and then you will receive an email for current topics, etc.

- Strengthening your Membership great tool as a reference when a club wants to start developing its Membership Development Plan
- Introducing New Members to Rotary: An Orientation Guide use this as a pre- or post-Induction tool to inform and educate your new members
- Membership Assessment Tools –contains materials such as Satisfaction Survey, Creating Club Diversity, Finding Prospective members, etc.
- District 7120 website- enter <u>rotary7120.org</u> on your search bar and click on Membership Development Some of the tools listed above could be found in the district website Other tools will be included soon.

To participate in Rotary Foundation Programs including Global and District Simplified Grants during Rotary each year, a club is required to become certified/re-certified and accomplish the following four tasks:

- Each club President-Elect and Foundation Chair, or their representatives, are required to attend a district sponsored Grant Management Seminar (GMS)
- 2. Club president and president-elect must sign a Memorandum of Understanding (Club MOU) crafted by The Rotary Foundation
- Club president and president-elect must sign the District 7120 Addendum to the Club MOU
- Each club must adopt and retain document retention and financial management policies required by the MOU.
- Additionally, clubs must have donated \$25 per capita in the previous year in order to qualify.

Two GMS formats are offered: A FULL GMS (approx. 2 1/2 hours) and a RENEWAL/REVIEW GMS (approx. 1 1/2 hours). The Renewal/Review GMS option is available ONLY for Rotarians who have attended a full GMS in a prior Rotary year.








Geneva Rotary Welcomes State Senator Pam Helming
