Road Safety Education Program (RYDA)

RYDA is a one day event held at a non-school site which co-ordinates the efforts of local road safety experts, including driving instructors, Police, recover survivors of road crashes, drug & alcohol educators and motoring services personnel.

RYDA is conducted annually in Bathurst, Cowra, Leeton, Orange, Wagga Wagga, West Wyalong and Young.

In 2012, the Rotary Club of Griffith is considering taking on coordination of RYDA for the schools in their immediate area.

This will provide District coverage for this important program aimed at 'Saving the lives of our Youth'.

RYDA is just another example of Rotary at work in the community. If you can assist in running RYDA in the district there's sure to be a place for you.

KIDS HELP ROTARY PLANT TREES IN HENTY

Around 100 students from Henty Public School planted more than 200 trees recently at the local showground.

Henty Rotarians John Ebsworth, Mark Janetzki and Ron Wellington, staff members and Murrumbidgee Catchment Management Authority (CMA) representatives David Stein and Tom White all assisted planting.

In 2009, the Henty Rotary Club successfully applied for a CMA Biodiversity Grant with a project to enhance the biodiversity of land adjacent to the Buckargingah Creek that flows through the town of Henty.

This involves the removal of weeds, pests, encouraging community participation and adding to the diversity of the flora of Henty's Showground and the Government Dam Nature Reserve.

The Reserve has been a Club project since its inception in 1997 and the Henty Showground was selected because most of the vegetation has been removed over many years of use.

With problems associated with flooding and wind erosion it was decided to undertaken plantings using local species and to add shelterbelts

Mini United Nations Assembly (MUNA)

MUNA helps students to develop public speaking and debating skills along with the study of the customs, culture and problems of the world's nations.

Delegates attend MUNA wearing the national dress of the country they represent.

The MUNA committee is looking into extending the school years that students are eligible to participate in the Program. At present D9700 restricts participation in MUNA to high school years 10 and 11.

When students representing our District progress to the next level of participation in Canberra they are presenting against students years 10 to 12.

To clarify the eligibility for participation perhaps we could adopt a similar approach to D9680: "MUNA is part of an International Rotary project to educate senior high school students (years 10 - 12) on the United Nations organisation and its vital commitment to world peace along with health, education and living standards around the world".

Successful District Selections for National Youth Science Forums


Twenty one students were interviewed for 14 positions in the 2012 Australian National Youth Science Forums (NYSF).


Four students were selected for Session A in Canberra early January, five for Session B in Perth in mid-January and five for Session C in Canberra in late January, 2012.

2. Nominees may be Rotarians but where a Rotarian and a non-Rotarian are ranked equal by the selection panel, priority will be given to the non-Rotarian.

3. A nominee must be either an Australian citizen or a permanent resident of Australia.

4. Nominees should preferably reside and/or carry out their vocation within the boundaries of District 9700

5. It needs to be shown that a nominee has a commitment to high ethical standards and a record of outstanding achievement in their chosen vocation and that this has been to the advancement of that vocation and the nation.

6. The Vocational Excellence must be evident in the direct activity and /or contribution by the individual or individuals nominated and not merely occur within an organisation managed by the individual.

I do not know her name but she hung onto me all day and I will never forget her, or her circumstances. I was invited to join Rotary by PP David Benn from the RC of Wagga Wagga Wollundry in September 2003. Susan and I then went back to Africa to see what we could do and I have never been the same since. My life was changed totally by Rotary and that orphan lass: "It has been a wonderful journey, but most frustrating at times, when you see what has to be done in Africa to make a difference to the lives of these orphans. Hout Bay Rotary club and their project Operation Medical Hope is one great example of what Rotarians can do and Coolamon House in Hout Bay is a result of the cooperation between our club, Coolamon, the clubs in D9700 and Hout Bay our twin club. This adventure will continue to strengthen our friendship with Hout Bay and to make new and lasting friendships with other Rotarians in Kenya, Uganda, Tanzania and South Africa."

Jim was a long serving and Life Member of the Apex Club of Temora and very active in numerous organisations in Temora over many years.

MICHAEL (MIKE) BUTCHER of D1080, England

Mike Butcher died suddenly on 31st August. He was 66 and was a member, and former President, of Great Yarmouth Haven Rotary Club in District 1080. Mike was a leading businessman and local councillor in Great Yarmouthlarger. Mike left an indelible impression on those he met while leading his Group Study Exchange Team to our District in 2008 and returning with his wife Janette for a private visit in 2009. He also was involved in organising the successful friendship exchanges between our Districts. PDG JACK AUBIN PHF, OAM Jack Aubin was the quintessential Rotarian. Rotary's motto is Service above Self and Jack epitomized that motto from the moment he joined the Rotary Club of Bathurst in 1962.

Jack was inducted into Bathurst Rotary Club in 1962 with the classification of Automobile Spare Parts Retailing. He was into his 50th year of continuous membership and for the first 49 of those years Jack maintained a 100% meeting attendance record every year. It was only ill health in his final year which prevented him from achieving an outstanding record of 50 not out. The members of Bathurst Rotary

Club past and present will miss the familiar greeting with Jack every week. "HI JACK, HOW ARE YOU". And the reply was always the same. "NEVER SEEN IT BETTER".

Jack served the Bathurst Rotary Club, the Bathurst community and the wider community of Rotary International with distinction for every one of those 50 years. Some of the highlights and milestones of Jack's Rotary career are as follows;

He accepted the role of Club President in 1969/70 and again stepped up to the rostrum in 2000/2001.

HE was made a Paul Harris Fellow by Bathurst Rotary Club in 1984. He was District Governor - District 9700 in 1988/1989 Jack served on the Board of Bathurst Rotary Club on too many occasions to detail, and in every category possible. Club service. Community Service. International Service. His efforts over many years as Bulletin Editor set a standard that is still remembered. But it was in his great passion for the Youth Service portfolio that Jack excelled, serving on many occasions. In this capacity Jack instigated, in

conjunction with Radio station 2BS, the Bathurst Young Citizen of the Month Award, in March of 1993. A prestigious award that continues to this day, and is much sought after and coveted by local youth. This award culminates each year in one of those monthly awardees being made Bathurst's "Jack Aubin Young Citizen of the Year".

Jack volunteered on two occasions to join FAIM teams and worked on Manus Island and again at Mount Hargan.

Jack and his wife Ruth rarely missed a District Conference and attended several International Rotary Conventions. They were keen supporters and participants in the Rotary Friendship Exchange program staying with Rotarians overseas in their homes and welcoming traveling Rotarians from overseas into their home here in Bathurst spreading the international understanding and friendship ideal. Jack and his wife Ruth were also keen supporters of the Rotary Youth Exchange program, hosting students into their family on numerous occasions. But it will be for his untiring volunteer ethic in Bathurst that Bathurst Rotary Club members will most remember and miss Jack. Whenever a service project was announced, Jack's hand was always up to participate. If a volunteer was needed to represent at a school Rotary Citizenship Award, Jack was there. If a volunteer was needed to present a Rotary award at the Eisteddfod, Jack was there. barbecuing at Bunnings or Harvey Norman, Jack was there. It was for this unselfish dedication to service that in 1999 Jack was given a SERVICE ABOVE SELF AWARD the highest honor an individual Rotarian can be awarded. Jack was proud to be a Rotarian and Rotary should be proud to have had Jack Aubin as a member.
