#### Training tip

Consider brainstorming with your training team, or your whole club, about the next Rotary year. Think about how you will generate new ideas.

Consider having your team/club members write down their suggestions before brainstorming verbally. Writing instead of speaking allows individuals' thoughts to flow freely, without interruption. It can also allow people to contribute equally if you have quieter or more outspoken individuals. Also if you run out of time you can collect the ideas for future reference.

As participants begin to share their ideas verbally, be ready to record new ones that are generated verbally.

Lockhart recently donated \$1000 to the LearnGrow program.

We heard a great presentation on the program at the District Conference in Bathurst.

The LearnGrow program has a unique worldwide agronomic data base, which is helping educate communities especially in the Pacific nations to grow and use their local adapted plants that provide a more balanced diet and more sustainable production system than introduced crops and practices.

## World first for Parkes

The outstanding achievements of the Parkes club were highlighted at their recent Changeover:

- First Rotary Club in the world with 100% Life Members of RFFA (Rotarians for Fighting Aids) banner presented by Australian RFFA Chairman PDG Fred Loneragan.
- Parkes Club also had the top contributions in the District to the Rotary Foundation Annual Program Fund \$US6298 (\$US143.12 per member) and to Polio \$US10,017
- The Club also had the top contributions to Australian Rotary Health (\$A48,000)
- Two babies are to be born to Club members this year how appropriate is that for Membership Development!!
- A great surprise (to John) was the awarding of a Paul Harris Fellow sapphire pin to PP John Pizarro.

## South Wagga Wagga – Nepal RAWCS project

Congratulations to the Club on initiating a RAWCS project with the Rotary Club of Kathmandu in D3292 to build a technical institute (Samudayik Technical School)

The project will provide student and staff accommodation for the school that will provide agricultural, forestry, engineering, health and services educational courses in the Sindhuli area of Nepal and further the Rotary goal of world peace and understanding.

Well done to Club members Bruce Duffy and Mick Lucke who travelled to Traralgon recently to lend a hand with recovery from the Victorian fires –fencing and shed building.

#### Young

This year the Club will be pursuing a matching grant with Pierre/Ft Pierre club in the USA to help a community in Honduras to have clean water.



#### Outstanding Donations The Rotary Foundation -

The total District 9700 contributions to the Annual Program Fund of the Rotary Foundation in 2009/10 were \$US64,664, which was \$US54.20 per District member. The Clubs with the highest total contributions were: Parkes \$US6,298, Wollundry Wagga Wagga \$US3,916, Orange Daybreak \$US3,718 and Wagga Wagga \$US3,673. The highest per capita contributions were: Parkes \$US143.12, Orange Calare \$US111.72, Blayney \$US110.95, Boorowa \$US103.03 and Junee \$US102.81.

Total contributions to Polio Plus were \$US63,082, with the highest Club contributions being: Parkes \$US10,017, Wagga Wagga \$US4,186, South Wagga Wagga \$US4,031, Orange Daybreak \$US3,758 and Blayney \$US3,636.

#### Australian Rotary Health

Total contributions from D9700 to Australian Rotary Health were \$109,206. The highest Club contributions were: Parkes \$48,000, Wollundry Wagga Wagga \$33,150, Orange Clare \$8,800, Orange North \$2,800 and Grenfell \$2,340.

Indigenous health students and PhD research scholarships are being funded by Parkes, Wollundry Wagga Wagga and Orange North. Last year Community Health Forums were held by Condobolin, Cootamundra, Grenfell, Narrandera and West Wyalong.

Rotary Clubs in Orange and Wagga Wagga also hosted medical students under the rural Doctors program while they were doing clinical placements in each city.

# Murrumbidgee Club in Vanuatu

Members of the Murrumbidgee Rotary Club recently retruned from a working trip to Tanna Island Vanuatu.

The team of 9, led by then President Gary Roberts, spent 2 weeks on Tanna and lived with the Ni Van villagers.

They worked at 3 schools and the hospital, renovating

classrooms, repairing a pump on a well and an air conditioning unit at the hospital dispensary.

The people, NiVans, are wonderfully happy people and were very appreciative of the work we achieved.

The majority of the people still live in villages in bamboo huts with thatch roofs and live a subsistence lifestyle.

They are progressing slowly to develop local tourism and community gardens to support their communities.

# VALE PDG John Clough AOM

1916-2010

John was a farmer near Wagga Wagga and enlisted in the RAAF in 1942. He trained as a navigator/bomb aimer and served in Europe and the Middle East with 454 Squadron. Of the 120 men who went overseas with John only 10 returned. Two weeks before he was posted overseas he married Marge. After the war he took up a soldier settlement block near Junee.

John dedicated 51 years of his life to Rotary service. He joined the Junee Club in 1959 and was President in 1961. In 1969/70 he was Zone representative and served as Governor

in 1971/72 for District 270. This was the era before faxes and email and the District extended through Eden, Canberra, Condobolin, Wagga and the Snowy mountains. John was active in forming Rotaract Clubs and led a Group Study Exchange Team to Virginia USA. The Team visited the Oval Office to meet President Nixon, but the Watergate scandal broke that day and the President was otherwise engaged! John twice attended the Council on Legislation (1979/80 and 1982/83). After moving back to Wagga Wagga, John transferred to the Rotary Club of Wagga Wagga Kooringal in 1989 and actively set about forming Probus Clubs throughout District 970, now D9700.

In 1975 John was awarded a Paul Harris Fellowship by the Rotary Club of Junee and in 1995 a sapphire pin by Wagga Wagga Kooringal.

John provided gentle mentoring and advice to many and his hands on approach to service and the community culminated in him being awarded the Medal of the Order of Australia in 2007. Last year Rotarians and family celebrated his 50 years of active Rotary service. At the dinner John concluded with these words, which go a long way to epitomising this wonderful man.

"We can't all have greatness and I'm not saying I am great, but I do try to do good. And because of that I have made wonderful friends from around the world and have had amazing experiences."

During the Program Graduate Registered Nurses will gain experience in Medical/Surgical, Nursing, High Dependency Nursing, Preadmission/ Discharge Planning, Day only Procedures, Orthopedic Nursing, ENT, Gynaecology, General Surgery, Cancer/ Palliative Nursing, Ophthalmology and coronary Care.

Emily said that the wonderful world of nursing was, "All that I imagined and more".

"Since commencing my career in February, I have loved every minute, every opportunity and every experience. I have realised in the last three months, nursing is not a job, it is a destiny; it is my destiny.

#### **Kasey Howes**

Charles Sturt University Post Grad Year January2010 Wagga Wagga, Calvary Hospital

Kasey said that beginning to work as a registered nurse has been her biggest challenge so far.

"I am working for Calvary Hospital

in Wagga Wagga, As part of the Post Graduate course I will be working in 5 different areas within the hospital, spending about 8 or 9 weeks in each area.

My first rotation was on a Palliative and post operative ward. As I had previously worked as a live in palliative carer I found this ward to be a fantastic place to start.

In the beginning, the daily responsibilities were very overwhelming....So much to do, remember, learn, experience, ask and be responsible for. But with the wonderful support from the staff at Calvary everything seems to fall into place.

Hard work and a lot of overtime, to cross all my T's, dot all my I's and be certain I hadn't missed anything and to ensure my paperwork and documentation were correct paid off, I began to feel a little more confident and enjoy the challenges I would face on a daily basis.

I am very grateful for the support I get from all of the Nurses who continually offer to help and answer my millions of questions and all the staff at Calvary have made the transition from study to work a very enjoyable experience.

I am now currently working in the operating theatres, again like a fish out of water but absolutely loving every minute of it.

Charles Sturt University held our Graduation ceremony In April. It was so good to see all the other nursing graduates and hear about their experiences... which reminded us all we are not alone... everyone has to start somewhere."
