January is RotaryAwareness Month

Welcome to 2011 and I trust that you had a great break over Christmas and it was a joyous time. We now look forward to the next year and the opportunities to serve and build stronger Communities, locally and overseas.

There has been continued flooding in D9700 and responses from Clubs have indicated that while there were isolated incidents of destruction the major effect was damage to crops and slowing of the harvest and the real costs are still to be realized. However this heartbreak for many in our communities comes on top of the prolonged drought. I reiterate what I said in the December Newsletter.

In our Rotary Clubs we need to provide support for our fellow members and others in the community who are doing it tough. We need to be aware of the strain these hardships can bring and be aware of and SW Qld. The flooding has been particularly devastating for some whole communities and is still ongoing in places such as Rockhampton and St George, which have been flooded more than once in the last year.

Most of the damage is occurring in D9570 (Emerald, Rockhampton) and D9630 (Darling Downs and St George) and I have been in contact with the DGs Judith Henderson and Anne Brand respectively, who have each established District Flood Relief Appeals. The funds will be used for rebuilding projects generally through local Rotary Clubs.

D9570 Governor Judith Henderson said "There will be many cases of genuine need that will fall through the cracks, that Rotary may be able to support. It will not be clear as to where the most important need will be after the floods



any signs of deteriorating mental health among individuals in our Clubs and the community. Recognition of the hardship and a friendly word of support can help.

As well as the floods in NSW there have been severe floods in Carnarvon WA and currently record floods in central for a while yet. But the 2008 experience demonstrated that the communities will need counselling, motivational and inspirational events at about 3 months, 6 months and 12 months after the disaster." "This is where Rotary can do a really

good job that will benefit many rather than just a few. Also, we found that the Government/Red Cross

controlled process will cater for the immediate needs of flood victims including cash handouts."

I encourage Clubs to undertake an appeal for funds to help in the rebuilding from the flood damage. It is preferable and easiest if these funds are remitted



to D9700 Treasurer Geoff Tancred, for consolidation and forwarding to assist specific rebuilding projects when they are identified by the appropriate District and Clubs. This way the use of the funds will be visible and not go into a hole and be lost as far as reporting back to donors. DG Neal

District Changes Rotary

Following the 2010 Council on Legislation resolution, the Rotary International Board has adopted the criteria that Districts with fewer than 33 Clubs or 1200 members will be merged. Currently there are 5 Districts in NSW (including D9700) and Qld that have less than 1200 members and have been notified by RI that they may be merged from 1 July 2013.

The NSW (and Qld) DGs have met and agreed that a combined submission on our Districts will be made to RI.

We saw it as an opportunity to strengthen and future proof Rotary in NSW into the future decades as well as remove some anomalies and inequities in current District boundaries. Rotary needs to adapt to change with some of that change reflected in the new RI Strategic Plan and the Future Vision for the Foundation which will come into effect on 1 July 2013. These changes mean we need to have stronger and better resourced Districts, especially to be able to effectively engage in larger projects that are more cost effective and have a greater impact on those people in need.



We need to be on the front foot with a plan for the Districts in NSW and Qld that suits our needs, rather than have something imposed from RI. Over the next few months the DGs will be working with their District and Club leaders to develop a combined submission to RI.

For most Rotarians there will be little impact of any changes that may occur to the District. Club projects and activities supporting their local communities will not be affected. Any existing inter Club activities and relationships can be maintained and there may well be new opportunities to expand on these.

There will obviously be some changes to District Committees and these will need to be worked through. It also means that the nominations for DG (2013/14), which were scheduled to be called soon, will be delayed for a few months until the District boundaries for 2013/14 and beyond are clarified.

Any comments on this would be welcome by DG Neal.

Parkes – Aust. Rotary Health Scholarships

Parkes Rotary Club has sponsored another PhD research project that may help solve some of the mysteries surrounding brain disease and malfunction. Chantal Leigh Duffy has been awarded a scholarship at Sydney University to investigate the anti-inflammatory and neuro protective effects of omega 3 fatty acids. The Club contributed \$11,000, supported by \$7,000 from Australian Rotary Health and \$11,000 from the University of Sydney.

The Club has PhD research scholarships active in the areas of Mental Health, Parkinson's disease and spinal injury. They also have two indigenous doctors in training, with Shaun White, having completed his studies and is in his residency at Orange Base Hospital



Bathurst Daybreak - \$20,000 support for Headspace

Headspace opened in Bathurst in 008 as a free service where young people can discuss their concerns and receive support and information in a confidential, nonjudgmental environment. Bathurst Daybreak recently presented the Service with \$20,000 from the proceeds of the Bathurst 2 Blayney cycling challenge. More than 1400 cyclists from a wide area took part in the event in April. Over the past two years the event has provided Headspace with \$38,000 which has allowed them to expand to bigger premises. Club President and B2B Committee Chairman Paul Field said the event had been a very successful partnership between community groups, business and cyclists.

Orange North - Meeting PNG villagers water needs

In the spirit of Building Communities - Bridging Continents and with Cholera and other water borne diseases an ever-present threat, 100 PNG villagers now have a reliable source of clean, safe drinking water.

A team of D9700 Orange North Rotarians - Team Leader Peter Davis, AG John McKenzie and DGE Ian Simpson, installed a simple water supply system in partnership with people of the Magare village on the Sogeri plateau inland from Port Moresby.

The project, completed over five days in December 2010, consisted of building a small retention dam across a permanent waterfall and piping the water into the village through 850 m of 32mm poly pipe. The villagers have protected the water pipe from regular burning and other hazards by clearing a pathway with bush knives and hand digging a trench to bury the poly pipe.

Students of Cherrybrook Technology High School in western Sydney and the trekking company Adventure Kokoda[™] provided funds. There was also a substantial discount on plumbing materials bought through a business link with the Rotary Club of Port Moresby.

The Sogeri district was a major staging area for Australian soldiers in WWII and with the local villages providing many of the porters there are strong links with trekkers walking the Kokoda Track. his project fits into the 'Water and sanitation' focus of the Future Vision of The Rotary Foundation.
