Australian Rotary Health is a Rotary International approved project supported by all Rotary Districts in Australia.

It has grown to be one of the largest independent medical research funds in the country, funding over \$2m in mental health research projects and scholarships each year.

While the current focus is mental health research and education programs, it also supports a broad range of other health related projects. Australian Rotary Health also offers Indigenous Health scholarships and Rural and Remote Medical and Nursing scholarships.

Has your Club supported Australian Rotary Health to sponsor a scholarship this year?

Australian Rotary Health is fighting to reduce the impact of mental illness. By 2020 it is predicted that depression will be the main cause of disability - meaning lost days at work and inability to function in a family situation. Rotary clubs have been magnificent in their support and funding

earnGrow: Australian Rotary project goes global

Rotary International has officially recognised the LearnGrow project by establishing the Food Plant Solutions Rotarian Action Group Established to support it.

LearnGrow chairman Buz Green said "Current approaches to food security and malnutrition are clearly not working, as there are still one billion people in the world who go to bed hungry every day along with a further billion, mainly women and children suffering from a lack of essential micronutrients such as vitamin A and iron. The challenge facing these people is to double their output, using far less water, land and fertiliser."

LearnGrow's approach of using the diversity of the world's food plants to

combat food security and malnutrition is making great advances.

Last year, LearnGrow launched its first major project in Solomon Islands in an effort to help the people better utilize their natural food resources. Other programs are being developed in New Guinea, the Philippines, Sierra Leone, Timor Leste, Nigeria and Haiti. It was the brainchild of Tasmanian agricultural scientist Bruce French, who has spent 30 years on a voluntary mission to document information on the food plants for all countries of the world.

The objectives of Food Plant Solutions include:

■ Promote LearnGrow to Rotarians, clubs and districts internationally

- Facilitate the development of LearnGrow groups to undertake food plant programs in developing countries
- Promote the incorporation of LearnGrow into existing aid projects
- Develop a platform for communication between LearnGrow groups and foster membership of Food **Plant Solutions**

Did you know that men volunteerism has dropped and women have increased in the last decade.

Women are one of our greatest opportunities to increase our membership; they are there in the professional, business communities and they are there in our communities as leaders in different areas.

Research has shown that when women are involved in management there is a 35% higher profit return – so imagine what the introduction of women can do to your Club.

When I think about how we can get more women into Rotary, it seems to me

that the best way is for women to get women into Rotary and for your Club to take on a women sensitive project.

RYLA – Bridging Continents with Young Peaceful Leaders

The Rotary Club of Uludag in D2440 Turkey, organised an International Peace RYLA Seminar in April. The seminar was inspired by Ataturk's – Founder of the Republic of Turkey – words "peace at home, peace in the world".

Young community leaders of the future were brought together from all the countries that were involved in the Gallipoli War.

The seminar provided lessons from history to permanently instill the meanings

of peace, brotherhood and human rights in their minds.

D9700 was very ably represented by Angie Fanello from Parkes, who was selected because of her involvement and strong support and advocacy for RYLA over several years. Angie was able to attend the Seminar thanks to the generous support of the Rotary Clubs of Parkes, Bathurst Daybreak, Orange Daybreak, Wagga Wagga, Wollundry Wagga Wagga and South Wagga Wagga.

Angie's summary of the experience: If I was asked to sum up my experience in Turkey with one word - I couldn't. I experienced a rollercoaster of emotions every day, and my heart will now always hold a special spot for the Turkish people. We got to experience so many things - food, sights, feelings. I believe my age

(older than the average attendee) was a benefit. I was able to lose myself in every moment, remembering our history with Turkey and gaining an indepth understanding of Australia's strong bond with this wonderful country. The seminar was amazing. Life changing. We were given the history of Turkey and the story of one of the most wonderful leaders in world history; Kemal Ataturk. We had talks on global warming and what we can do to change it by Akin Ongor; art and literature with Gul Kircil; we had a piano concert from 18 year old Ata Ustun Bilgin and learned about "The Cruel Within" from Emre Konger. I made life lasting friendships with people not only from Australia, but Turkey, New Zealand, Germany, America and Canada. Being at Anzac Cove has changed my life. To have stood in the very same place men fought and died for their country has been etched into my mind, but to have realised the bond past enemies have now formed has been etched into my heart. One thing that stood out was that I did not feel foreign in Turkey - the people were so warm and welcoming and the language barrier was no problem. I recall some free time we had in Mudanya. We wandered down the street and found a quaint little coffee shop. We went in and neither our group of Aussie girls nor the Turkish shop keepers could speak the others' language, but we eventually got our message across with sign language and smiles. With all our silly hand gestures and pointing; laughter was what united us in the end... A truly magnificent journey, thank you Rotary.

Blayney – Foundation Matching Grant success

Congratulations to Blayney Club with support from Bathurst East. Their Matching Grant project to supply \$US35,000 worth of laparoscope equipment to Rajshahi Cancer Hospital in Bangladesh has been approved by the Rotary Foundation. Blayney had an earlier Matching Grant to help get the hospital operating theatre established and visited it a couple of years ago. The Project is in cooperation with the local Rotary Club of Padma Rajshahi in D3280.

The project will provide a badly needed laparoscope to meet the special needs of cancer and general patients. The hospital will continue to render modern diagnostics and treatment to the community at an affordable cost or no cost at all. The equipment will reduce postoperative hospitalization and improve the overall health and well-being of the people of the community.

Installed in the Coolamon Up-To-Date Store during the early years of Lamson's entry onto the Australian retail stage, the Cash Conveyance System is an integral feature of the Store.

The Lamson Cash Conveyance System focuses on the store owners' desire to have the very best in equipment in the newly constructed Up-To-Date Store.

The system sped cash contained in a cylinder across the store to a central cashier and change returned by the same method. An agent for the Lamson System was first appointed in Australia in 1889.

The installation of the system in the Store in the early 1900s, demonstrated the proprietors wish to be 'most up-to-date' in retail technology.

It was said at the time "that the system was designed to solve the 'problem of women being less numerate than men', a statement we are sure would not be 'politically correct' or accepted today.

Jim Darbyshire PHF (Griffith)

There was a sombre pall over the Griffith Club meeting as members reflected on the life and tragic death of highly esteemed member Jim Darbyshire, who lost his life in a road accident south of Coleambally on Monday, April 4th.

Jim, who celebrated his 84 birthday last December 11th, was inducted into the Rotary Club of Griffith on 23rd February, 1971 and since that date has given tireless service to Rotary and the community of Griffith. He was recognised as a Paul Harris Fellow by the Club in 2002.

Jim was talented pilot who had flown in Papua New Guinea, Catalina flying boats for Qantas on the Kangaroo route to the U K and Fokker aircraft for KLM in the Middle East.

In the 1960s he established Cropair, an agricultural air service in Griffith. While flying, he met and married his great love [the late] Patsy, an airline hostess, and together they raised four boys.

Since retiring [which he never really did], Jim gave valued service to the Griffith community through the Salvation Army and Rotary. He has twice been nominated as Griffith's "Citizen of the Year" for his community work.

In toasting the life of Jim, President Greg Murphy said that he was "a stalwart of the club, a very fine man, a sad loss for his family, his friends and the Rotary Club. He was always the first one up with his hand to volunteer for Rotary.... sometimes the only one."
