ROTARY FRIENDSHIP EXCHANGE

RFE District Chairman Ken Stone, advises that a number of Rotary Friendship Exchanges are currently in the planning process and the assistance of clubs is urgently needed to host incoming teams.

Rotary Friendship Exchanges involve Rotarians in international visits which are reciprocal, District-to-District or Club-to-Club. This is one of the few Rotary programs where Rotarians and their partners get to meet one another, one-on-one, to further international friendship, understanding and goodwill.

The first RFE is expected to be with District 1070, (UK) Leistershire and Northamptonshire) with an inbound group from D1070 visiting us in April 2001.

A club-to-club exchange between our Temora club and Lake Taupo, NZ (D9930) is being organised directly by these two clubs. RFE committee representative Geoff Cowan also advises that a club-to-club will possibly be arranged with a club in Turkey.

Arrangements are presently being negotiated for an RFE between D9700 and D7710 in North Carolina USA for incoming and outgoing visits in Spring/Fall of 2001.

Negotiations are underway with D1020 for an RFE which would see a team from D9700 in Edinburgh, Scotland in August 2002 to attend the Edinburgh Military Tattoo, with a reciprocal visit from the Scots to follow. It is hoped to conduct a combined inwards return visit to D1070 in conjunction with the D1020 visit.

Overtures have also been made to Brazil to determine the prospects for a South American excursion. D9700 urgently requires interest from clubs ASAP to Ken Stone (Work 69381175 and Home 69262421 email marganken@bigpond.com), who want to participate in the hosting of the visiting D1070 team, arriving in April. This is a great opportunity to meet with overseas Rotarians, to show them true Australian hospitality and to welcome them to your place. Great Rotary PR opportunities also! RFE is a reciprocal program and there will be home-hosted return visits to overseas clubs in the offing.

Dr. Tim O'Carrigan was very happy with the healing of the scars and the infection in Dick's leg. He removed all the stitches from his leg and was happy that the hardness in the muscle area around the wound had disappeared. He will perform the operation on Dick as scheduled on the 15th December 2000, which means that Dick and Thomas have to be transported to the Sydney South West Private Hospital for Dick to be admitted at 2.00pm on Thursday 14th December 2000. Thomas is okay to stay with him

Dick should be in hospital until about the 22nd December 2000 depending on his recovery. He will wake up with the leg apparatus on him. The apparatus will have two rings around his leg towards the knee and two half rings around his leg towards his groin. This will mean he will not be encumbered with the apparatus for showering or for toiletry. Sitting will be OK except that his leg will be as straight as it is now. Dr. Tim felt that whilst his legs will eventually be the same length he would never have the same flexibility in both legs because of the effect on the muscular development of his thigh and knee.

There would be no need for admission to the Bathurst Rehab until at least the 15th January 2001. Dr. Tim felt that the only rehab required after his release from hospital until perhaps the middle of January will be the requirement to remove the two pins from his leg four times a day to exercise his leg with some swinging of the leg and then the replacement of the pins. This will be demonstrated at the hospital.

From Rotary's point of view a very big thank you should be given to the Meek family. Maxine Meek feels they also are advantaged by this arrangement and all are enjoying the companionship.



ROTARY CALENDAR

DECEMBER is the month all AGMs should be completed and re-registration of incorporated clubs with the Department of Fair Trading. Have a *HAPPY CHRISTMAS* (three months to 9700 Jubilee conference) JANUARY is Rotary Awareness Month. This month brings the semi-annual reports (SAR) to secretaries of Clubs, the confirmation of GSE 2001-2002 district pairings and 3-H grants preliminary proposals. (Two months to 9700 Jubilee Conference)

FEBRUARY is World Understanding Month. 5th-11th is Family Week, International Assembly held at Anaheim 18-25, World understanding and Peace Day is held on 23th which is also Rotary's 96th Birthday.

Rotary Peace communities should hold their celebrations on this day. (One month to 9700 Jubilee Conference).

MARCH 12-18 is World Rotaract Week. This is the month of our Jubilee Conference in Orange 30th to 1st April.

APRIL is Magazine month. This is the month when Presidential Citation award applications must be sent to RI. I hope we get 41 this year.

MAY is the month for the District Assembly and President Elects' Training Seminar.

CAP Update (Community Assistance Program)

RI has informed me that 10% of the money donated by clubs in this district to the Rotary Foundation last year amounts to US\$3,060.97 (A\$5,570.96). This money will be available for CAP grants during my Rotary year. However I am also informed that the minimum award for any one project is to be A\$1,820.00. RI advises that "Brochures and applications will be distributed to all districts in December 2000 and the Foundation will begin accepting applications on January 1, 2001. This timing is very tight since clubs are less active during December and January. A selection committee has to decide which projects will be recommended to RI.

A number of clubs submitted applications for humanitarian projects within the District. These applications were well thought out and were good proposals. Since the rules have only recently been made available, the selection committee returned the applications and asked that they be rewritten to be consistent with the new rules. I hope that these clubs do take the time to revise their applications and return them as soon as possible. Since no grant is to be lass than \$US 1,000, the selection committee can award up to three grants.
