Message from DG Ray October is Vocational Service month.

This second avenue of Rotary Service evolved from the classification principle-a feature originally unique to Rotary-that limits active membership to one representative from each business and profession. Thus members have an obligation to serve as a representative of that classification within the club. Their knowledge and experience gives the Rotary

club the resources to be able to undertake projects that can address all aspects of Vocational Service. However I need to say that membership development is first and foremost a search for the right people and not the people with the right classification.

In my official visits I have found that many clubs offer a Pride of Workmanship Award or make an Efficient Business presentation, carry out mock job interviews with secondary school students, support the Shine On Awards which recognise outstanding community service given by people with disabilities, arrange industry visits for the club, promote four minute talks by members about their occupation, discuss the 4 Way Test, raise issues about ethics in business, and debate the relevance for today of the Declaration of Rotarians in Business and Professions (Directory, p13). Wouldn't it be good to video the awardee in his/her workplace and play the video at the award presentation. This would go down well with the media and be fun to do.

Next month is Rotary Foundation Month and we are running the District's first daylong FOUNDATION WORKSHOP on 18th November, at the Wagga Wagga RSL. It will be followed by a FOUNDATION DINNER and ALUMNI REUNION to which all the GSE members over the last 20 years, and Ambassadorial Scholars have been invited. What an interesting night that will be. The Rotary club of South Wagga Wagga has kindly agreed to run the dinner. Come along and share some home hosting by a Rotarian family. I'll see you there. ROMAC UPDATE

There is one thing that anyone associated with the ROMAC program comes to expect - that is the unexpected. We ran into difficulties talking the local visiting GP on Tanna Island into carrying out chest X-rays for Dick and his uncle, Thomas. This has now been left to Rtn Ron and Ann Hartland who left for Vanuatu in September to arrange X-rays in the capital Port Vila – this should now be complete.

Youth Exchange orientation day at Barambola

Inbound students and outbound students, short and long term students, with parents, relatives, committee members and others met for the second orientation weekend under the guidance of chairman George Weston at Barambola on Saturday and Sunday, October 7th and 8th. We were all fortunate that Evena who is an Ambassadorial Scholar from Russia was able to attend and she gave a brief impromptu talk about her feelings as an Ambassadorial scholar. The weekend was, as usual, informative and enjoyable. The training that is given to our exchange students prepares them very well for their exchange experience. The team is to be congratulated for their dedicated work for the students.

Chairman George Weston reports that the student allowance for inbound students is now raised to \$110.00 per month. All clubs need to pay their students this amount but please keep the payments at this level rather than increase them. In the past, clubs paying amounts exceeding the agreed upon payment have caused problems when students compare notes and find that some clubs are paying in excess of the amounts set at the regional level.

Does New Child Protection Legislation affect Rotary?

In July 2000 new legislation was introduced in New South Wales that will affect all people working with children. The new laws are the *Commission for Children and Young People Act 1998* and the *Child Protection (Prohibited Employment) Act 1998*. The intention of these Acts is to create workplaces where our children are safe and protected. It seems that the changes in the law will also apply to voluntary groups as well as those in paid employment. What is envisaged is that people who may pose a risk to children will be excluded from being engaged in roles where they have direct, unsupervised contact with children. Voluntary organisations such as Scouts and Guides have already instituted checks on their personnel. I should think that we in Rotary will have to determine whether the same sorts of checks and restrictions will apply to Rotarians (and non Rotarians I should think) working in Rotary activities with under 18 year olds (e.g. RYPEN, Youth Exchange hosting, transporting students and counselling them etc). I will keep you updated on this issue.

South Wagga Wagga Rotary club celebrated its 70th anniversary on Monday September 25th. Three Charter members attended: Les Kennedy, Barney Greenway and John Rorrison. We heard about the bad old days of Rotary where classifications were strictly adhered to and meetings were controlled with a rod of iron. Interact clubs

Interact is Rotary's oldest youth program. takes its name from the words *International* and action. It has 161,000 members in 6992 clubs in 105 countries. Seventeen of the twenty-three Rotary Districts in Australia have Interact clubs.

Interact clubs must be sponsored by Rotary Clubs and membership is open to secondary school students aged 14 to 18 years. Clubs may be formed from groups in the local community but it is usual for them to be school-based.

Young people are provided with opportunities to work together in a world fellowship dedicated to service and international understanding. They work to solve local problems, improve the quality of life and make new friends locally and overseas. They are required to carry out two service projects each year: one must serve the school or local community and the other must be at the international level. Clubs interested in establishing an Interact Club should talk with Peter Olson (page 49 of your directory).

n Membership will be similar to present c rules but the club will determine the lofi cality that it will serve. The time, place, w frequency and content of club meetings A will be determined by the membership. Attendance requirements will be similare ly determined by the membership. Leadb ership will be by election by club memn bers and the club structure will be deter- \overline{v} mined by the function (membership deje velopment and education, service pro f_{f} jects, club administration, Foundation, p fellowship events). Club members will a pay the normal district and RI dues and, d as usual, the club members will set club T dues.

The Council on Legislation would have to adopt a p1 modification of the bylaws to enable this pilot th programme to take place. As yet we have no furs6 ther details about how the ten clubs will be choje sen but we do know that this is a three-year pros1 ject and that clubs would have to report to RI at w specified times as to how the new rules were r6 working. This is an exciting innovation. I will (I report on it as information comes to hand (Parramatta has no information as of now).
