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Basic Education and Literacy: We all Need to Take Stock & Act

The 2020 Global Alliance for Literacy Assessment indicated that approximately 773 million adults globally still lack basic literacy and numeracy skills and among those two thirds are women. Furthermore, Southern Asia is home to almost one-half of the global youth and adult population with no basic literacy and numeracy, while 27% live in sub-Saharan Africa. The other 10 % are in East and South-East Asia, 9% in Northern Africa and Western Asia, while about 4% live in Latin America and the Caribbean. The numbers certainly show us that we need to be more concerned, do more and do better to reduce or even solve this critical problem.

Evidently, this has led to a large gap in the demand and supply of skills in Africa due to the education and literacy challenges despite the efforts and initiatives undertaken by various stakeholders governments, development agencies, humanitarian groups like Rotary among others.

In addition, we observe that

Ndwaddemutwe **Community Project**



The excitement was evident within the Ndwaddemutwe Community when District Governor Rosetti Nabbumba handed over a classroom block to Ndwaddemutwe Primary School!

The classroom block was renovated by the Rotary Club of Sunrise - Kampala in partnership with Rotary Club of Mendip, United Kingdom. Prior to this, the school buildings, constructed in the early 1990s, were dilapidated. On the same day, a borehole with a yield of 1,100 litres per hour, along with two 10,000-litre water storage tanks, were handed over to the community. These were just two sub-components of a Global Grant (GG) 1528355. The Ndwaddemutwe Community Project is an Adopt a Village (GG), approved in the sum of USD 71,000.

"The renovation of the classroom block, has improved the quality of the learning environment. The floors are clean; there is no more dust, and no more

got a first grade (12 aggregates) -the first one after 13 years" said the Headmistress. "Access to clean water has greatly improved children's health due to access to safe drinking water both at school and home; Absenteeism and late coming have greatly reduced; this creates more time for the pupils to concentrate and learn."

Financial empowerment is an important component of any Adopt a Village project. The Ndwaddemutwe Agali Awamu Sunrise Women's Microcredit Group is beginning to show results due to improved financial capacity; women invest in their children's education.

Other interventions under the GG include training in menstrual hygiene and provision of reusable sanitary pads for adolescent girls and addressing community health through training outreaches and, supporting the health centre.

The project has triggered several unplanned positive outcomes. An Old Boy residing in the United States heard about the project and extended a helping hand of support. In addition, Rural Electricity Authority (REA) agreed to connect the school to electricity; poles were erected at the school. With the high enrolment at the Primary School, Government built a Secondary School.

As a Club, we are way ahead in implementing the District Governor's signature programme; Basic Education and Literacy Enhancement Programme (BELEP). We plan to handover computers and books to the already furnished computer lab and library to equip teachers and pupils with basic computer literacy skills and cultivate a reading culture among children.

EXPERIENCES FROMTHE **BAT RACE** & Lessons Learnt

As I was preparing to write this article, I remembered the book, I read sometime back-Do More Great Work, by Michael Bungay Stanier with focus on "How to Stop the Busy Work and Start the Work that Matters." I pondered on the questions Michael asked? Where are am I? How did I get here? Where am I going? Is there a better route? Could there be a different destination?

I will examine these questions from the rat race perspective under:

- 1. What is the rat race?
- 2. What are the experiences with it?
- 3. What are the lessons learnt from these experiences?

What is the rat race?

Oxford Dictionary defines rat race as: "A way of life in which people are caught up in a fiercely competitive struggle for wealth or power; an exhausting, usually competitive routine." It can also refer to anyone who feels stuck in a routine and frustrated with no time for his/her own wants and hobbies. There are two forms of rat races:

First, is being in a continuous state of continually working hard but never getting enough to meet basic necessities keeping you strenuous and wearisome. In this state, any salary increases and consumption loans keep you around square one needing basic money to keep you moving.

Second, mankind by nature always wants better and more things. Thus, the more money a person makes, the more he or she feels the need for more. If one worked hard and even prayed to put up a two bed-roomed house, by the time he or she completes it. the desires are for a four bed-roomed house or if you drive a Toyota Corolla right now, sooner than later, you will feel you deserve better, perhaps a more luxurious four-wheel drive vehicle. This is to do with mindset of continuous desire for more.

Experiences with the rat race

Let me illustrate this using Navneet Kumar's rat race story. In the story, there were two childhood friends who met after a long time and found time to discuss their successes and failures in life.

One shared his successful education career with good grades and a good job but was kind of regretting that he did not have enough money to give his children a secure future. He was concerned that if they followed the same path, they will have the same insecurities.

Then, the other, started, I belong to business background and always inclined to money. I am one of the richest people in this town, my monev keeps working for me and my children are financially secure. But since my childhood, I wanted to be a scientist like you and I don't feel good when I meet friends like you, in fact I feel insecure.

There was some silence from both of them each wondering about each other's rat race stupidity. I know there

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are many of us in the situation of the two childhood friends rat race box.

The most painful part is that most of us live like this. It is partly a mindset matter of human desire to earn more and more money to sustain ever-changing lifestyle desires. Ås from school, one studies to move from one class to another, struggles to improve on the marks attained in each subject, works to upgrade from diploma, to first degree, to masters and then to PhD, to many this becomes the rat race journey for everything in life.

Let's reflect from the Rotary perspective: Is Rotary in the rat race? Few years ago, we were all working hard to grow membership and create another Rotary District for Uganda and Tanzania from district 9211. This was successful achieved through creation of District 9213 and District 9214. Congratulations. The great performance in membership and in TRF giving is now leading to a new discussion of creating a new district. This is very good for our communities and service. But, are there elements of the rat race in there? Are Rotary Clubs in the rat race? Competition among clubs is good, healthy and encouraged. Is there need to examine the potential rat race elements so that a strategy to minimise the negative impacts are explored.

Are Rotarians in the rat race? This a great community of people who pay to serve as coined by PDG Bob Waggwa Nsibirwa. Are there elements of rat race in paying to serve humanity? How deal with them as we champion serving humanity.

Lessons from the rat race

First, did you know that happiness is a feeling, nothing more and nothing less? Theodore Roosevelt observed that you need to - "Do what you can, with what you have, right where you are." Look around and ask, what are the key resources that are within me that I can tap to create the value and happiness that I need. Second, submit yourself to the race, meaning, make a decision to go in and take action. Go in the race that you understand, do not follow other people's races, they may stop along the way and you get lost or they may run very fast that you may not be able to see where they are.

Third, choose your pace, rest and fun times, it will not matter how much time you put in: but the joy will be from the value in the time you put in. You may need to start today before many rats surround and restrict your ability to

Finally, the journey out the rat race will in no doubt involve hills, valleys, anthills and so forth, but, with courage, strength, patience, commitment and persistence, you will pull them off.

The club anthem is a powerful tool that greatly facilitates the enforcement of the club's public image and informs its relations within the club and with other clubs, organizations and individuals who have the potential to become partners, members, or well wishers. It is a great membership and partnership attraction tool as well.

Before its charter on March 29th, 2021, Rotary Club of Sonde had adopted its anthem titled, 'We the Sonde Models.'

'We the Sonde Models,' is a patriotic and beautifully rhythmic song developed by club members led by Rtn. Andrew Mauka Mugeni, Dr. Jane Egau and Rtn. Pauline Babirye Abok.

Over 2,100 people die every year in Uganda due to Cancer. While that number could be brought down, there is a significant lack of equipment for treatment in Uganda.

The 11th edition of the Rotary Cancer Run 2022 s was flagged off by the first ever Rotary International female President Jennifer Jones at Kololo airstrip on September 4th, 2022. RI President Jones was the chief runner. She shared her own testimony of healing from Breast cancer.

"You started this run 11 years ago and 12 years I discovered that I had breast cancer. It wasn't easy but part of the reason I am sharing this with you is that early detection is the answer. Cancer is a treatable disease. I urge you to go for cancer testing often. 12 years later, am proud to



stand here with you cancer free"

The Rotary Cancer Run aimed at creating awareness and mobilizing funds towards building a bunker at Nsambya Hospital and increasing the level of access Ugandans have to cancer treatment.

Speaking to the runners, PDG (Past District Governor) Stephen Mwanje who is the Chair Board of Trustees for the program and the brain behind the idea noted that this year, they registered over 40,000 Runners not only in Uganda but also in 11 cities outside Uganda raising over a billion Uganda shillings (1,362,262,000) twice the amount that was collected in 2019.

The event attracted over 20 Corporate partners with Centenary Bank being the official platinum sponsor of the event for the last 10 years.

Rotarians, Rotaractors, and well-wishers from all walks of life arrived at Kololo airstrip as early as 5:30 am to participate in the run. They were first treated to dance and guided workouts by different fitness trainers who emphasized the need for exercise as the key to keeping healthy and combating otherwise preventable communicable diseases.

The Rotary International (RI) President – Jennifer Jones visited Makerere University as part of her Imagine Impact Tour on 2nd September 2022. On arrival at the Yusuf Lule Central Teaching Facility (CTF) Auditorium, the RI President was met with many attendees. She was received by a contingent of high-level University leaders led by the Vice Chancellor Professor Barnabas Nawangwe in company of the Chairperson University Council Mrs. Lorna Magara.

They were ushered in by the University Music Students with traditional dance before national anthems were sung; the Ugandan anthem, East African and Canadian anthem respectively which evidently tickled the emotional nerves of the RI President.

The Director of the Peace Centre; Dr. Helen Nambalirwa Nkabala welcomed Rtn Jennifer Jones and her delegation. She acknowl-



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edged her being the first female RI President and enumerated the female leaders in the house with a mention of the very first female Chairperson in the centennial years of the University's existence; The Chairperson University Council and the Dean School of Humanities Professor Josephine Ahikire.

She narrated how the Peace Centre would be receiving its 4th cohort of Peace Fellows. "Even though the Peace Centre has only been in existence for a short period, it's impact on the hill is being felt." She thanked the different players including Rotary Peace Fellow Alumni, the Peace Jammers on Campus, the Peace Centre Board and the Peace Fellow Host Counsellors for the achievements made.

In her remarks. Prof. Josephine appreciated the excellent preparations made ahead of the meeting with emphasis made towards Dr. Helen and her team. She reiterated the moment of excitement they were feeling. Even though the Centre was hosting a 2nd RI President in the space of 2 years, it was being officially launched now by the 1st ever RI female President and they were very pleased to be associated with this history and at the 1st Rotary Peace Centre in Africa. She the centre will be replicated to the entire continent given the quality and diversity of the fellows. She thanked the University Vice chancellor for allowing the Rotary Peace Centre to operate as a semi-autonomous institution, and pledged unreserved support to the Peace Centre.

In his remarks, the Vice Chancellor Prof. Nawan-

gwe shared the history of how Makerere University Kampala (MUK) started with 14 men with the Motto; "Let us be men". In 1950 however, the first female student was admitted to the University thus the motto was changed to "We Build for the Future". The University has made great strides as a centre of academic excellence on the continent, being the first to ever launch a Gender mainstreaming programme. And now. the first to introduce a course in Peace Building and Human Rights. Gender disparity gap has been bridged; to date the enrolment of male to female

students is nearly at par due to foresighted policy guidelines that have been implemented over the years. He is proud to be associated with these successes.

The University's focus is to become a leading research hub on the Ăfrica continent. He reiterated his colleagues' sentiments on how much the Rotary Peace Centre had greatly profiled the University's diversity; it hosts students from 54 countries in the world. He went ahead to reveal that the University's strategic plan aims at preparing students to solve current global challenges. Sighting one example, he noted that whereas land is shrinking, the need for food was growing.

Other speakers included Past District Governor (PDG) Emmanuel Katongole; he attested to the fact that possibly 99% of Rotarians in Uganda had all gone through MUK which makes association easy. He recognised PDG Yinka from Nigeria for having provided the initial seed capital towards es-

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HOW HISTORY OF ROTARY AND INSURANCE CONNECT!



Being an insurer, a beneficiary of insurance a year later on 13th March 2020 when I underwent a head surgery at Case Hospi-tal and a new Rotarian (2019), I felt that this connection was worth being written about for the sake of institutional memories.

Rotary's founder, Harris, was a lawyer, Rotary President from 1910 to 1912 and a member of Rotary Club of Chicago. Harris' desire for camaraderie among business associates brought together 4 individuals that brought together varying professionals. This eventually led to an international organization of service and fellowship. When the Rotary Club of Chicago published this member roster in October 1905, the Club had grown to 21 members, including two honorary members.

The Connection of Rotary and Insurance in Uganda

The story of Insurance in Uganda is very much like that of the international service organization; Rotary. We can see this through the life of Rotarian Sam Owori (elected to serve as President of Rotary International in 2018-19); he would have been the second African Rotary member, and first Ugandan, to hold that office. He was inducted into Rotary in 1978 and was a member

of the Rotary Club of Kampala¹, Uganda. Like many members, Sam was invited to Rotary by a persistent friend. "I did not

The Rotary Club of Kampala is a member of Rotary International. It is the oldest Rotary Club in Uganda having been chartered in 1957, and is one of the most respected Clubs because of it's unique organization, membership composition and manner in which it conducts Rotary business. The Club draws it's membership from the different professions in Kampala.

"Optimism is what brings us to Rotary. But Rotary is not a place for those who are only dreamers. It is a place for those with the ability, the capacity, and the compassion for fruitful service." Sam F. Owori, 1941-2017



want to go," he cheerfully acknowledged years later. "I had no interest. But I had respect for my friend, so I went. And when I got there, I was in shock. The room was full of people I knew." The more Sam saw of Rotary's good work, the more enthusiastic he became. He is largely credited for the tremendous increase of clubs in Uganda: from nine in 1988, when he was District Governor, to 89 today.

His friends called his enthusiasm "the Owori madness" — to which he mildly replied, "If it is madness, I would be glad if more people would catch it." Sam described himself as "an incorrigible optimist" who chose to see the best side of everyone and the bright side of any situation. Sam is remembered as "Smiling Sam," says RI President Ian Riseley. John Smarge, who was selected by Sam to be his presidential aide, called Sam a "rock star" among Rotary members. "In just the two weeks he was president-elect, you could see how much he was loved.' Smarge says.

The Insurance Story since 18th Century

The concept of insurance dates back to at least the 18th century B.C., with the Code of Hammurabi². Building insurance on solidarity, business acumen, and the logic of calculation has proved an almost unbeatable business idea. It was to conquer the world over the next centuries. Trade and emigration became the 2 most important enablers for creating a global insurance safety network.

As every history, that of insurance has been exposed to challenges. Some large catastrophes proved too big to deal with for some companies. From the San Francisco Earthquake in 1906 to Hurricane Betsy in 1965 or the attack on the World Trade Center in 2001. But overall the insurance industry has proved remarkably resilient to all these challenges. This came from the economy and its recurring crises which caused bigger losses than the worst insured catastrophes.



Insurance is an ideal laboratory for enlightened business ideas. The process of collecting different types of institutional and personal information and, using underwriting to transform it into quantifiable costs was important. Insurance helped money become the means of communication within the economy. Uganda therefore is no exception to these trends.

The Connection of Rotary and Insurance therefore becomes evident in how the 2 sought to address a need or a challenge. They both go through a process of identifying and collecting different types individuals and or institution's personal and data / information respectively to counter a challenge. Let us not forget the time and effort plus effective use of resources that was employed to reach or goal or need. Thus the benefits whose costs may not be quantifiable.

We draw our strength in the insurance world to strive and excel. The volunteer seeks the same and at a global scale which is sustainable and, life changing.

While at RC Masaka, I saw and interacted with Rotarians from all walks of

life contributing selflessly to community service. A number of them were ordinary men and women in employment, retirement and business. Some did not even have jobs. This mix of people from different walks of life brought diversity, enterprise and fun to the Club.

In December 2019, I left formal employment after working with Centenary Bank for 12 years to start my own business. I always envisioned a good life where my sons' dreams would not be limited by my lack of resources. I realized that employment would not deliver me to the future I envisioned for my sons and myself.

I started my small-scale business of selling vegetables namely onions, tomatoes, green pepper, carrots, Irish potatoes, passion fruits, matooke and charcoal. I had planned to start small and grow my business empire slowly and steadily. However, three months down the road, Covid-19 happened and a total lock -down was instituted. This was a huge set-back but I did not lose faith. It was definitely hard because the reality was that I had

gone from an assured monthly salary of UGX2,000,000 to UGX150,000 and sometimes less.

This was around the same time that RC Sonde was in Formation. I joined RC Sonde and Rotary became my safety net because it gave me a sense of community because I had people I could talk to and a number of Rotarians became my clients which increased my sales gradually.

To supplement my income from the grocery shop, I started cooking and selling food to workers from the different industries in the neighborhood.
