







# MESSAGE

If we are to truly change the world with The Magic of Rotary, it's up to all of us to foster a sense of belonging in our clubs. But every club should take its own path to get there, and the Action Plan can help you find your way. What does that look like?

Take for instance the Rotary Club of Beveren-Waas in Belgium. It was chartered in 1974 but has evolved with the times, developing both a strategic plan and a membership plan. To find new members, the club analyzes the city's professions to help focus its search, and all new members are quickly assigned tasks and roles.

The club also mixes up meeting times, alternating between evening and afternoon sessions, making them accessible for all members.

Sometimes, circumstances force clubs to make changes. But as people of action, we know that behind every obstacle is an opportunity.

The Rotary Club of Holyoke in Massachusetts was forced from its meeting place because of rising costs after the COVID-19 pandemic, but members took this setback and turned it into a strength. The club started meeting in a library community room that was available for no charge and catering lunch from a nearby deli. Lunch costs \$10 per person but it's optional, so no one has to spend money to attend a meeting. What a great way to work toward being "fair to all concerned."

Since making this change, the Holyoke club has gained 13 members. I suspect part of its membership growth is due

to the club's sense of inclusivity — the first step toward belonging.

If you ask members what they expect from the club experience, you might find that your club doesn't meet expectations. Think of this as an opportunity to reshape your club in exciting ways, as alternative club models are making a positive impact.

For example, a Rotary Fellowship called Beers Rotarians Enjoy Worldwide, or BREW, has worked closely with the Water, Sanitation, and Hygiene Rotary Action Group for the past eight years to assist with clean water projects. In that time, BREW has funneled 25 percent of its dues to those initiatives.

BREW is one of many examples of members pursuing belonging to improve the world.

I can't stress enough the importance of belonging. Clubs become simply irresistible when all members feel that they are exactly where they need to be. To me, belonging is the spark that ignites The Magic of Rotary.

As you receive feedback from club members and the community you serve, I urge you to pursue that spark. The Action Plan can help you find the path to success, and if you light your way with the spirit of belonging, that path will lead to a bright future for your club, your community, and the world

# Rotary Club in Mpika continues work of Malaria - Free Zambia

hen we launched Partners for a Malaria-Free Zambia (PMFZ) in March of 2021, one of our objectives was to establish a Rotary club in at least one of the districts we would be serving. On 15 June, that objective became a reality with the chartering of the Rotary Club of Mpika.

This milestone is particularly significant as it coincides with the 30 June closing of the Programs of Scale project and its hand over to the Rotary Healthy Communities Challenge. The timing couldn't be more perfect as the establishment of the Rotary Club of Mpika gives us hope that our initiatives in Mpika and surrounding districts will be sustained under its stewardship.

The journey to this moment has been anchored on the collective effort and dedication of the residents of Mpika, members of the Rotary Club of Kasama, Past Assistant Governor Martha Lungu, and myself. Special mention is due to our selfless District 9210 Governor Gabriel Chipara who has been a constant source of guidance and support to the steering team from the very beginning. In fact, DG Gabs, as we fondly call him, traveled all the way from Harare, Zimbabwe to Mpika in the northern region of Zambia early this year to encourage the then-prospective members of the club. His support and encouragement have been a driving force behind this achievement.

DG Gabs also made the long trek up north to officiate

at the charter night. The PMFZ project through Malaria Partners Zambia supported the orientation training of all prospective members, ensuring they are well-prepared to uphold the values and mission of Rotary. Throughout the life of the project, Rotary volunteers have been at the heart of our advocacy, mentorship, and technical support efforts. Their contributions



have been invaluable in driving forward our mission to combat malaria and improve health outcomes in the region.

Throughout its life, the project has strengthened existing Rotary clubs in Zambia and contributed

to their growth and sustainability. The project has engaged more than 130 Rotary and Rotaract members from across the country. PMFZ played a key role in integrating members of the newly chartered Rotary clubs of Solwezi and Samfya, enhancing members' Rotary experience.

In addition, PMFZ has inspired and contributed to successful small grant applications from Malaria Partners International for the Rotaract Club of Lusaka and the Rotary clubs of Samfya and Kasama. Their efforts are crucial in sustaining the gains achieved by the project.

To us, the charter of the Rotary Club of Mpika is timely and significant for the sustainability of our work in Muchinga province. Having laid the foundation for a healthier, malaria-free future, we will continue to support and nurture the new club, ensuring that the seeds we have planted grow into a robust and vibrant force for good in Mpika and beyond.





# THE ANCIENT AND TESTED LAWS OF WEALTH CREATION: THE 5 LAWS OF GOLD (WEALTH).

read a book; The Richest Man in Babylon by George Clason, wherein the writer gives insights on the time-tested ancient wisdom of wealth creation and protection. He opens his narrative with a question of choice; if given a bag of Gold and one for wisdom which one would you choose? Many, as I too, would go for the bag of Gold. In the explanation with examples, he confirms that with this choice, the gold will be depleted soon and one will be back in need. It's recommended that one chooses wisdom that will, guide in the sustainable handling of the gold. So I picked the following lessons from the 5 laws that are shared in the book, which aligns to the time tested testimonies on wealth creation.

The first law: Gold comes gladly and in increasing quantities to any man who will put not less than one-tenth of his earning to create an estate for his future and that of his family. This speaks to deliberate saving. I learn that one should save after earning then spend what is left!

The second law: Gold labors diligently and contentedly for the wise owner who finds for it profitable employment, multiplying even as the flocks of the field. This teaches that once one earns and saves, there is need to invest wisely so that the money multiples.

The third law: Gold clingeth to the protection of the cautious owner who invests it under the advice of men wise in its handling. This calls for seeking advice, mentorship and guidance from qualified people, who have the skills and experience in handling wealth. Many a time people give advice and we follow yet the advice is based on "I heard"!. This challenges the investor to seek knowledge and also right guidance some freely available like with their bankers and the seasoned financial advisers.

The fourth law: Gold slippeth away from a man who invests in businesses or purposes which he is not familiar or which are not

approved by those skilled in its keep. This is a serious caution that not any and all investment options are profitable. One needs to first have a fair understanding of the investment options before they inject in their money. In the past we have seen Ponzi schemes which are too good to be true and left many in losses.

The fifth law: Gold flees away from a man who would force to impossible earnings or who followeth the alluring advice of tricksters and schemers or entrusts it to his own inexperience and romantic desires in investment. Money as said before grows in most times slowly. When a person wants money with greed and willing to take on anything for it, then you are sure it will elude the person. It requires patient and avoiding temptations of get rich quick schemes. These are time tested truth worth following.

We need more hands to join this fight, especially as we strive to save the lives of young children and pregnant mothers who are at the greatest risk. Rotarians have a critical role in supporting national programs, partners, and communities in combating Africa's most endemic disease. s we have looked at the basic science informing our inheritance and what brings us to the understanding of SCD as a specific genetic condition, let's delve into a simple gaze of why most warriors tend to have a similar look or stature.

The genes that are present within an organism's DNA are referred to as the organism's genotype while the organism's physical appearance is called the phenotype. There are many different factors that can affect the phenotype of an organism. Let's take a closer look.

An organism's phenotypic expression refers to the observable characteristics in an organism that results from the expression of genes. Variations in gene expression lead to altered proteins being produced which lead to changes in physical and structural appearance. Mutations within the genome can also influence an organism's phenotypic expression. This can be seen in the case of sickle cell anaemia.


# To say;

Sickle cell disease results from a mutation in a gene responsible for encoding the haemoglobin molecule found in red blood cells. Glutamate is needed to form a normal haemoglobin molecule. This leads to the formation of a healthy round red blood cell. In the case of sickle cell anaemia.

a mutation causes glutamate to be changed into valine. This change leads to the production of a sickle cell, which has a different shape (that of a sickle), since the haemoglobin molecules become sticky.

Though if we drew back our attention to the very lst anecdote I painted a picture of most peoples depiction of SCD warriors referring us as the "Bu Sikuse" basically showing that we are malnourished kind of structure morphologically

# MPOX IN UGANDA: Basic information that you must know

On 23 July 2022, the World Health Organization (WHO) declared the current Mpox outbreak a Public Health Emergency of International Concern (PHEIC). As of 28 July 2024, there are 2 confirmed cases and 6 suspected cases in Uganda. In reference to the MOH Mpox talking points released in August 2024, we share simple basic information to help us understand Mpox and how to prevent it.

### What is Mpox?

Mpox (previously called Monkeypox) is a viral zoonotic disease (a virus transmitted to humans from animals). Mpox is caused by monkeypox virus.

### **How is Mpox spread?**

Once infected with Mpox, it can spread from person to person. Mpox is generally spread through

- Contact with infected persons, such as touching, kissing among others
- Contact with infected materials, such as contaminated sheets, clothes or needles
- Infected pregnant women may pass the virus on to their unborn baby
- Inhaling contaminated particles or viruses.
- Contact with infected animals (squirrels, rats, mice, and monkeys), when touching, hunting, skinning, or cooking them

### What are the symptoms of Mpox?

A person may present with Skin rash, Fever, Sore throat, Headache, Body aches, Back pain, Low energy (body weakness), Swollen lymph nodes.

### Is Mpox treated?

Mpox is treated and usually goes away on its own after 2-4 weeks. Health workers will treat the rash, manage pain and other complications.

### Can Mpox cause death?

It can be severe, causing even death, especially for children, pregnant women, and those with other health conditions.

### How can you protect yourself from Mpox?

- Avoid close contact with people who have been confirmed to have Mpox or who have signs and symptoms of Mpox.
- Avoid touching or sharing personal items like beddings, eating utensils, clothes, phones, or other belongings of a
  - person who has the signs and symptoms of Mpox.
  - Avoid contact with all wild animals (alive or dead), especially those known to carry the virus, such as rodents or monkeys, and those that appear sick or have been found dead.
  - Avoid eating wild animals (squirrels, rats, mice, and monkeys)
  - Get Mpox vaccine within four days of contact with someone with Mpox or within 14 days if there are no symptoms.



- Stay at home and inform your VHT or community health worker
- Call the Ministry of Health toll-free line 0800 100 066 or send an SMS to U-Report on 8500
- Tell everyone you have been close to recently
- Avoid physical contact with others

# You are one **MEDICAL BILL** away from bankruptcy.

In Uganda today, the specter of financial ruin looms large over every household, lurking behind the seemingly routine act of seeking medical care. A simple consultation with a doctor now costs between 30,000 to 80,000 shillings, an expense that can escalate to 100,000 shillings depending on the health facility. For many Ugandans, this is not just an inconvenience but a barrier that threatens their very livelihoods and mental well-being.

Healthcare, a fundamental human right, remains agonizingly out of reach for the majority. Reports indicate a staggering 30% increase in healthcare costs over the past year alone, exacerbating an already dire situation. With Uganda holding the unfortunate distinction of the highest out-of-pocket health expenditure in the region, compared to Kenya, Tanzania, and Rwanda, the burden on individuals is crushing. Nearly 38% of health spending is borne directly by Ugandans, a statistic that underscores the precariousness of their financial health.

Governments across the region face significant challenges in healthcare provision, from inadequate funding and poor infrastructure to the emigration of skilled healthcare professionals seeking better opportunities abroad. The consequences are stark: public healthcare struggles to meet demand, forcing many to turn to the more costly private sector or forego contemporary healthcare altogether. This is very unfortunate but steadily becoming the norm for many. The healthcare providers will blame this on the tax regime levied on the health and medical sector.

The passage of Uganda's national health insurance scheme in 2021 was a promising step forward. Yet, its implementation has stalled amidst bureaucratic hurdles and

disagreements over funding mechanisms. President Yoweri Museveni's concerns about the framework highlight broader issues of governance and accountability in healthcare financing.

Community health insurance schemes cover a mere fraction of the population, leaving millions exposed to financial catastrophe if illness strikes. The proposed solution of shifting the burden to employers in the formal sector risks exacerbating economic inequalities and stifling growth.

Meanwhile, the safety net for the most vulnerable remains porous. The informal sector, where many Ugandans work and earn their livelihoods, lacks a reliable mechanism to contribute to national health insurance. This oversight perpetuates disparities in access to care and deepens the cycle of poverty.

As we navigate these challenges, urgent reforms are needed. We must prioritize the swift and equitable implementation of the national health insurance scheme, ensuring robust oversight and accountability in fund management. Investments in public healthcare infrastructure and workforce development are equally critical to bridge the gap in service delivery.

Ultimately, the cost of inaction is measured not just in shillings and dollars, but in human suffering, lost opportunities and death in most cases. Every Ugandan deserves the dignity of affordable healthcare, free from the specter of financial ruin. It is time for our leaders to act decisively, placing the health and well-being of our nation at the forefront of policy and action.

# HOW DO I CONDUCT A COMMUNITY ASSESSMENT FOR BASIC EDUCATION AND LITERACY?

Community assessments identify where our support is needed most and the role Rotary members can have in making a difference. An assessment will illustrate a community's strengths and weaknesses and help you work with local residents on solutions. Project sponsors (often in conjunction with a cooperating organization) need to conduct a community assessment before applying for a grant. If an assessment has already been done, use the relevant data to design your project.

The Foundation will not consider projects without a community assessment.

### Use the community assessment to:

- Gather perspectives from a broad cross-section of the community, including women, young people, and professionals
- · Allow community members to identify the needs that

- they perceive as the most critical
- Ask community participants how they can be involved in the proposed project
- Work with community members to identify longterm goals and expected project outcomes
- Gather baseline data before the project so you can measure your results

# The community assessment results need to be incorporated into your project plan. The results should describe:

- How the project will meet the needs identified by the community
- The long-term goals or outcomes and how they'll be met (for example, through training and public awareness campaigns)
- How the community's resources will be used to implement project activities
- How the community will sustain the project after the grant project is complete

# When you conduct a basic education and literacy community assessment, it's important to:

- Invite teachers, students, school staff, administrators, parents, and community members to be part of the discussion. Some community leaders may be reluctant to include diverse stakeholders in the conversation, but as a project sponsor you have a unique opportunity to bring these important voices together.
- Help school staff and community members identify and articulate their educational needs and goals.
- Understand the goals of local schools and explain to the community how Rotary members can help them achieve those goals.
- Find out if other nearby schools or education programs are addressing similar educational needs.

## Are they working with the proposed technology or new teaching methods? Can the project sponsors use their expertise and experience?

- Explain to the community that Foundation grants cannot be used just to donate materials or equipment.
- Look for ways to build educators' skills and knowledge or create a program designed to improve educational outcomes.
- Involve national or local education officials whenever possible.

### Assess teachers' needs, using questions such as:

- o What do you like most about your job?
- o What are your goals for your students? How does your work help them achieve these goals?
- o What are some of the challenges you face as a teacher? What prevents you from helping your students achieve the goals you mentioned?
- o If you were in charge of education for your whole county, what's the first thing you would do to improve it? o What skills would make you a better educator?
- o Are there training or certification requirements for you to continue as an educator?
- o What training or certifications have you recently been offered or participated in? What do you think about the relevance or delivery of that training, or how you'll use it with your students?
- o What qualities make a great teacher? What makes a great teaching staff?

# WHY ARE COMMUNITY ASSESSMENTS IMPORTANT?

**GLOBAL GRANTS SERIES** 

ffective service projects need a solid foundation. Although clubs and districts invest a lot of time and money into various projects, some still don't make a lasting impact. A well-planned project that fits the community's culture and context is more likely to succeed, and conducting a thorough community assessment significantly increases your chances for success. An assessment can help you:

1. Daily life. Ask each group or person you interview what daily life is like. What are everyday tasks? How do they do them? What are the benefits of doing them that way? How do they wish things were different? (Include educational opportunities, jobs or income, health, nutrition, their physical environment and surroundings, cleanliness, personal safety, and more.)

### Understand the community.

Working with the community to understand its history, culture, strengths, assets, weaknesses, and needs through a broad assessment is an essential first step in planning an effective project. By scheduling enough time to gather input from and information about the community, you can discover the best opportunities for service and maximize your club's ability to bring about positive and lasting change. Even if you're actively involved in the community, an assessment can reveal a new way to address a known issue or give residents a chance to note overlooked challenges.

# Make informed decisions.

Assessments provide data to guide your club and the community as you decide what project to do; how to allocate time, funding, and other resources; and what's the best way to collaborate with relevant local groups.

### · Build trust and community involvement.

Developing trust in communities can require time — in some cases, months or

even years. Conducting an assessment is critical to building valuable relationships and engaging residents in the project, fostering a sense of commitment that will sustain the change.

A community assessment is much broader than needs or solutions. It should have the complete context about a community's culture, unity, divisions, and how decisions are made. Strive to include these topics, using the tools in this guide:

2. What are the biggest issues in the community? What things cause anger, frustration, arguments, or an inability to achieve goals? What things prevent growth or achievement? How might they be addressed? What things bring joy, collaboration, cohesion, wellness, and productivity? Why do they work well?

3. What is the history of these issues? • What has the community (or groups in it) tried to do? What was the outcome? • What have nongovernmental organizations, universities, or other outside groups done? What was the outcome? • What have the local, regional, and central governments done or not done? What was the outcome? • Why do the issues persist? • Do colonialism, paternalism, old customs, traditions, and other long-lasting practices prevent change? Why does that still happen? • What can be done to remove these barriers, encourage reconciliation, or facilitate community harmony? What can be done to improve people's lifestyles or livelihoods, or make things better in other ways?

4. Who is in control of these issues or the underlying causes? Which people are not involved in leadership or discussions? Why?

5. Who are the most trusted leaders in the community (men, women, boys, and girls)?

6. How would advocacy with leaders or the government improve the issues?

7. What other changes would make the community and its members happier, healthier, and better off financially?

4	Audited accounts for 2022/2023 "Amazing Year" by a reputable firm approved by the ICPAU.
5	A club assembly (NOT board) resolution accepting, approving and adopting audited accounts for 2022/2023. Attendance list should of necessity be attached.
6	Evidence of filed returns (2023) by URSB, (form A10).
7	The club's financial management guidelines (standard template available for clubs that don't have one)
8	Signed Memorandum of Understanding (M.O.U) between the sitting president and president elect (downloadable from My Rotary, standard template also available).
9	Compulsory attendance of the DG's Grant's training seminar, the "Anne Nkuutu seminar" (evidence is as recorded by the administrator, Beatrice during the training.
10	No outstanding global grants reports.
11	No stewardship issues pertaining to the club.

THE PERIOD OF QUALIFICATION IS ONLY ONE YEAR & FOR THE AVOIDANCE OF DOUBT AN ALREADY QUALIFIED CLUB CAN SUBSEQUENTLY BE UNQUALIFIED ESPECIALLY IN BREACH OF 10 and 11 ABOVE.

NB. It is always advantageous to qualify as soon as possible, in any case within the first quarter of the Rotary year on receipt of the 1st semi-annual invoice. During the second half of the Rotary year, following receipt of the 2nd semi-annual invoice, payment of dues for the entire year as well as audited accounts for 2023/2024, "Hope Creator Year" will subsequently be additional requirements for club qualification.

# The Challenges of Solid Waste Disposal in Large Cities


he issue of solid waste disposal in large cities is a pressing concern that has garnered significant attention in recent years. As urban centers continue to grow at a rapid pace, the per capita generation of waste has also increased proportionately, making the collection and proper disposal of all waste a formidable challenge for local authorities. One of the primary issues is the limited resources and capacity of municipal governments to effectively manage the vast amounts of waste generated within their jurisdictions.

Moreover, the lack of adequate land for waste treatment and disposal facilities further exacerbates the problem. In certain regions, existing disposal facilities have reached their maximum capacity, forcing local governments to make difficult decisions regarding waste management. Other challenges include collection and disposal infrastructure, financial constraints, lack of support from localities, ineffective recycling or composting, ever-changing

climate, lack of technological advances, changing consumer preferences and unclear regulations.

Technological advancements, however, offer promising solutions to address the challenges of solid waste disposal in large cities. Innovative waste-to-energy and waste-to-materials technologies have the potential to transform the way in which urban solid waste is managed, reducing the reliance on landfills and promoting more sustainable practices. By efficiently utilizing carbon-containing waste and other waste materials, the need for virgin raw materials acquisition can be reduced, thereby mitigating the impact on the environment and contributing to the fight against climate change.

The importance of effective solid waste management cannot be overstated, as it is a fundamental and essential service provided by municipal authorities to maintain the cleanliness and overall well-being of urban centers as well as people's safety. Governments

# IMPACTS OF **CLIMATE CHANGE** ON

# 'WASH' INFRASTRUCTURE AND SERVICES.

WASH simply means Water, Sanitation an Hygiene and plays a pivotal role in ensuring that human life is sustained.

The main impacts on WASH services from climate change are:

**Prolonged droughts and lowering water table:** Significant impacts on handpumps and boreholes.

Prolonged rains and flooding: Impact shallow wells and springs that are typically located in low lying areas and sanitation facilities. Prolonged excessive rains lead to flooding and submerging water point sources that are normally located in low lying areas, mainly shallow wells and protected springs. Flooding of water sources not only cuts water points off from users, but also leaves them contaminated long after the flooding ends.

# Declining lake levels: Impacts piped systems.

Water supply systems drawing from surface water are threatened by prolonged dry seasons that lower the water levels. This affects the quality of service and leads to intermittent water supply and related rationing by piped water supply authorities and entities to overcome reduced quantities.

Increasing costs per capita: Due to required adaptation activities. To overcome challenges posed to the water and sanitation infrastructure; there is always need or practice of adoption high-cost technologies that have proven to be more resilient to such impacts as flooding. This results in high capital investment cost of service delivery which, in turn increases the WASH cost per capita in areas prone to extreme weather conditions

posed by climate change. In response, there has been a policy shift by the government banning construction of shallow wells and protected springs and encouraging deep boreholes and piped water systems.

**Constrained operation and maintenance (O&M):** Due to impacts on water quality and infrastructure condition. Advanced WASH technologies not only attract high capital investment but also high capital and routine O&M costs. Following flooding events, components of water systems (point and piped systems) are often washed away and lost.

As a result, O&M costs increase due to repeated repairs or one-time major repairs. Also, the variations in O&M costs cascade to variations in tariff and subsidies.

# WHY ARE RATS AND MICE SUCH A HEALTH RISK TO YOU?

Rats and mice are associated with a number of health risks. Needless to mention Rodents spread over 35 diseases that can infect both people and pets, including:

Plaque

Salmonellosis

Leptospirosis

Tularemia

# These diseases can be passed on by:

Direct contact such as rat bites

Unsafe handling and disposal of infected dead rats Eating food or drinking water contaminated with:

- rat urine
- feaces
- saliva
- hair

Breathing dust contaminated with the urine and feaces of infected rats.

Diseases can also be transferred indirectly by ticks, fleas, and mites that live on infected rats.

Through their natural behaviors, rats can weaken building structures by:

Gnawing through lead and aluminum sheeting Chewing through electrical wiring, which can start fires by shorting-out appliances or lighting fixtures.

# HOW DO I DISCOURAGE THE EMBRASSING TENANT FROM MY PROPERTY?

Rats normally come out at night.

# Signs you may have an infestation of rats or mice include:

Droppings (12mm to 18mm long)

Added debris such as shells or fruits with the sides eaten out.

Bones left in the corners of sheds, under homes and other secluded spots

Greasy trails or rub marks along paths they travel, especially supports or beams

Burrow holes around buildings

Signs of gnawing damage

Pet dogs, cats and birds being more excitable than usual

Squeaking, gnawing or scratching noises in walls, cupboards, ceilings and under floors

# Rats can be destroyed and controlled simply by denying them food and shelter:

Store firewood away from the sides of sheds and fences and keep it well clear (40cm) off the ground.

Regularly remove or limit garden waste or other disused material in sheds or around your yard.

Remove fruit and nuts from trees or vines at the end of the season

Block holes and other potential access points around all buildings.

Store bird seed and chicken feed in an airtight container. Keep pet food dishes clean and store bulk pet food supplies in containers and locations where rats cannot enter or chew through.

Maintain rubbish and compost bins free from holes. Do not include meat scraps in compost.

# WHAT SHOULD I DO IF I HAVE RATS ON MY PROPERTY?

It's a fundamental duty of property onwers to prevent rats from invading the properties.

Talk to your neighbor about the rats on your property as they may have the same problem. Rats may also be breeding on their property and may be the source of the rat problem.

Rats found on your property should be destroyed by one of

the methods indicated below.

Report any signs or sightings of rats to your local government environmental health officer (external site). If you cannot control them yourself, seek their advice on control measures.

### HOW CAN I DESTROY RATS ON MY PROPERTY?

1. Poison baits are the most successful way to destroy rats. Many brands are available in retail shop.

Always read the instructions carefully and make sure children and pets cannot reach them.

Check baits regularly and replace them if they have been eaten. If you are dealing with a large rat problem you may initially need to check and replace baits daily. A rat can eat a whole box of rat bait in one night.

2. Traps are another way to control rats. The old-fashioned spring back-break trap is still the best trap for home use but a plastic capture may also be used. Try different types of bait including:

Bacon

Fish

Nuts

Peanut butter

Apple

Pumpkin seed

Sausage

3. Consult your local pest controller or simply visit www. amatahygiene.com and book a survey.

Passersby are captivated by his unique technique, often pausing to watch as Safari skillfully wields his tools. Despite the unconventional approach, Safari's clients remain composed, displaying unwavering trust as he maneuvers potentially hazardous objects like shovels and hammers around them. With each shaving session, his clients emerge with very well designed haircuts. What a feat of magical creativity and innovation!

Growing up, Safari had always imagined himself as an Artist holding a pallet, brushes and paint though his parents wanted him to become a medical Doctor. He followed his Parents' guidance and majored in sciences. While in a Boarding school in Uganda, his friend requested for his help in trimming his hair since he could not afford a haircut outside school. Since then, shaving people's hair became a new hobby and soon the demand for his barber services began growing to unprecedented levels that the school officially hired him as the students' barber. Little did he know that his future was destined to make a living not from Art or Medicine but from Haircuts. Safari made a bold decision to abandon his studies in Business Administration at Kigali University to pursue his true passion for hair grooming which has paid off enormously. Amazing isn't it?

Safari's talent and his theatrical craft has not only earned him livelihood, recognition but fame beyond East Africa.
