At the 2023 Rotary International Convention in Melbourne, I asked all Rotary members to become champions in our effort to illuminate mental health needs near and far. This includes helping one another feel more supported, advocating for mental health services, and building bridges with experts in the field to expand access to treatment.

It's an important task and a big ask. But it's also something that should feel familiar to every Rotary member – because everything we do is in the spirit of caring, giving, friendship, and compassion, and has been from the beginning of our organization.

We've grown into an amazing global network of 1.4 million interconnected community leaders leaders who share a deep commitment to doing good in the world. But what makes Rotary powerful isn't just what we do for the communities we serve. We also support and empower each other. by creating a safe space for our members to bring their whole, authentic selves. We show each other comfort and care.

These connections are deeply meaningful. The U.S. surgeon general recently declared loneliness a public health epidemic. Dr. Vivek Murthy said, "We must prioritize building social connection the same way we have prioritized other critical public health issues such as tobacco, obesity, and substance use disorders." I am proud of what Rotary has done across generations to build those kinds of social connections - and this magazine focused on loneliness and what Rotary can do about it in its January 2023 issue.

Our worldwide community and our foundational value prioritizing Service Above Self makes Rotary a powerful global advocate for mental health. A recently published study by Ohio State University found performing acts of kindness was the only one of three mental health interventions tested that helped people feel more connected to others. Study co-author David Cregg said, "Performing acts of kindness seems to be one of the best ways to promote those connections."

This research suggests what we've known all along - that doing good helps transform not just the communities we serve, but it also transforms us. As we put a greater focus on mental health, let's not think of this effort as something new to Rotary, but rather as something we can do better and as a result have a greater impact on ourselves and the people we serve.

We are not starting this effort from scratch. The Rotary Action Group on Mental Health Initiatives has been focused on these kinds of issues for several years, and we will be looking to members of that group for leadership as we continue to build awareness.

Mental health care fits comfortably within several of our areas of focus. As of May, there are 41 global grant-supported projects with a mental health focus. Many of them have tremendous promise, and we will be highlighting them in the months ahead.

So let's work together to erase the stigma associated with emotional well-being, raise awareness of mental health needs, and improve access to preventive and interventional mental health services.

Together, we will Create Hope in the World.

38 years of Rotary in Gulu: Even in War, we remained Tenacious

"My name is Charles Odora Oryem, and I am a charter member and Past President of the Rotary Club of Gulu. I had the honor of serving as President in two consecutive terms, from 1989-90 and 1990-91. Our Provisional Rotary Club was chartered on May 28, 1985, with the sponsorship of the Rotary Club of Jinja. I vividly remember the moment when our charter certificate was delivered by the President Rotary of Jinja Rtn Dr. Enock. E. Tumwine and PP Jackson Oyugi to our charter president, the late Jude Tadeo Omal. Reflecting on the journey of RC Gulu and the achievements we've made over time brings about a mix of emotions.



Our club faced significant challenges during the Lords Resistance Army Insurgency, and at one point, Rotary considered revoking our membership due to nonpayment of dues. The turmoil that started in 1986 took a toll on our city, making it inaccessible and unsafe. Many of our charter members, who were civil servants, had to flee Gulu for their safety. Despite these difficulties, a few committed members, including myself, Rtn Pen Olum Chope, our treasurer Rtn Simon Gunya Purudi, and charter president Rtn Jude Tadeo Omal, tried to keep the club alive. Our meeting venue, the Gulu Golf Club (now TAKS Centre), was vandalized, leading us to relocate to the neighboring Acholi Inn, which

remains our meeting venue to this day.

In those challenging times, communication was limited to landline telephones, telegrams, and letter writing, making it difficult to stay connected and mobilize members. Many of our charter members did not return to Gulu, further complicating the club's efforts to function effectively. However, attending the 63rd DCA in Kampala in June 1988 gave us the motivation and drive to reorganize and continue our Rotary journey. PDG and RIPE, the late Sam Owori, welcomed us warmly and generously covered all dues and conference requirements, providing the much-needed recognition and encouragement.

Throughout our struggles, we have maintained a close partnership with Lacor Hospital and its dedicated doctors, i.e the late PP Dr. Matthew Lukwiya and the late Rtn Dr. Isaac Ezati, back then and now, PP Dr Cypriano Opira, Rtn Dr Denis Okwir, Rtn Dr, PP Sr Josephine Oyella, and Rtn Dr Jacinta among others. Together, we have worked hard to support malnourished children and those injured in the conflict. The support from fellow Rotarians, including the Rotary Club of Rubaga, was instrumental in facilitating reconstructive surgeries in Gulu during the LRA insurgency. Rotary's impact on our community has been immense, from rebuilding schools and hospitals to empowering vulnerable populations and extending clean water access.

Today, Rotary in Gulu has undergone a paradigm shift, benefiting from technological advancements like computers, smartphones, and the Internet, which have facilitated networking, communication and virtual meetings. Rotary's membership has diversified, attracting professionals from various fields. We are proud to have produced the first female president in Rotary District 920, PP Rtn Rose Aida Aol Okot, after women were admitted to Rotary in 1998 following an appeal to the International Court of Segregation in 1997.

The growth of Rotary in our region, with the establishment of clubs in Kitgum, Gulu, Arua, and others, brings me immense joy as it signifies more people joining in the mission of doing good and serving the community. Seeing young people getting involved fills me with hope, as Rotary's future depends on nurturing future leaders through mentorship and networking. As seasoned Rotarians, we must make way for the youth to develop their leadership potential and actively involve local communities in our projects for long-term sustainability.

Rotary has been transformational in Gulu, making a significant positive impact on the lives of people in our region. As we celebrate our achievements, we must continue to attract and support new members and engage local communities to ensure that our efforts have lasting benefits for generations to come"

We continue to spread hope

As Rotarians, we celebrate the profound impact our organization has created in the world. The project aims to address the challenges faced by young boys in the Northern region, where some have resorted to a life of crime, earning them the code name "AGUU." In this Hope Creator year, the Rotary Club of Gulu is committed to providing support and guidance to these boys.

We were delighted to have the presence of two Bishops from Northern Uganda, who were bestowed with the honorary title of Rotarians by the District Governor. Continuing our efforts to make a positive impact, the District Governor symbolically planted trees at the remand home, signifying our support for the boys in the remand home and our dedication to the environment.

In July, the Rotary Club of Gulu organized a Rotary in community event centered around the month's theme of Maternal Child and Health. We collaborated with the Rotaract Club of Gulu University and distributed 50 Mothers kits to pregnant mothers at Bardege Layibi Health Centre III. The highlight of the day was cleaning the health centre and providing the mothers with essential items from the Mothers Kit, including reusable pads, cotton wool, plastic sheets, soap, and surgical blades.

The Boy Child Uplifting Program:

30 DAYS AND COUNTING

BCUP as it starts to perceptibly disseminate within the Rotary Fraternity; is defined as the Boy Child Uplifting Program, an initiative and brain child of the District Governor - Edward Kakembo Nsubuga as the flagship program adopted and implemented by both Rotarians and Rotaracators of D9213 and pioneered in the Rotary year 2023/24.

The Program seeks to address the imbalance in our society statistically recognized between the girls and boys, men and women as they live and share the evolving environment that God has created for every human being. The imbalance remains evident right from homes, schools, religious activities as well as in the formal and informal employment sectors.

The real problem at hand is the number of our boys and young men living within our society but increasingly isolated in remand homes, prisons and rehabilitation centres because they find themselves in conflict with the law

- Crime: 74,444 prisoners, including pre-trial detainees, remand prisoners and convicts: 95.4% are male, 4.6% female - Uganda Prisons Service prisons.go.uq
- Addiction: 60-71% of school-going children (12 to 24 years) use addictive substances, especially alcohol (19.3%) and drugs (4.4%), as at 26th May 2022. Boys are two times more prone than girls. https://journals.org>articale
- School drop-outs: 1 in 10 school-age children did not report back to school in January 2022, after covid-19 lockdown, due to lack of school fees and requirements, loss of parents and guardians, peer pressure for sustaining small income initiatives during the lockdown. https:// www.unicef.org>uganda

BCUP is here to uplift the Boys and young Men with a pilot age group of 10 to 35years for the less privileged, middle class and also the high end economically stable male society. A combination of all these categories of boys and young men appropriate education,life skills empowerment



and income to have and sustain a decent living. In Rotary, our seven areas of focus are all relevant to this program but during this pioneer year, both Rotary and Rotaract Clubs are guided to focus on 2 areas; Basic Education and literacy as well as

Economic and Community Development.

This is to purposefully sustain the critical tool of education to equip our Boys with a culture of seeking knowledge to enable them favorably compete in the ever evolving society with increasing income demands across all levels of life styles. We can not then leave out the income generating skills which must be trained as hands on projects in the different sectors of hospitality, manufacturing, engineering, construction; to mention but a few. These are all pointers to Clubs for implementation as is or additional creative concepts on how to uplift our boys and young men in the already existing service projects or identifying new areas that have

Sonde Models is currently in the initial stages of imparting life skills to the male students of Faith High School, with the aim of promoting personal success in both their academic journey and future endeavors. As part of our training scheme, we have taken up the task of equipping the boys with essential financial literacy and saving culture skills, areas that have been overlooked in the school's teaching and training curriculum.

To further enhance the scope of our program, we are actively engaging in negotiations with the staff of the leisure and hospitality department at Makerere University Business School. Our goal is to involve them in empowering the boys with valuable knowledge in leisure management, which will broaden their horizons and prepare them for a successful future.

Working closely with the school's Boy Child Coordinator, our club facilitates peer talks with the boys, addressing the significance of living a successful family life. We firmly believe that by instilling these crucial skills in the boys, we can contribute to the establishment of strong and thriving family setups in the future, especially given the current state of affairs.

Furthermore, our team of Sonde Models boy advocates, in collaboration with BCUP team leader Rtn. Joseph Epilu, is actively exploring ways to support and guide the boys in developing their personal branding. We see this as an opportunity to inspire them not only in their current educational journey but also in their future business endeavors as they progress through life.

concentrated boys or young men that can benefit from this program.

The first 30 days of BCUP where kicked off with the launch of the Boy Chid Uplifting Program; with 42 Rotary Clubs and 14 Rotaract Clubs that physically attended and participated in this launch as well as 51 Rotary Clubs and 24 Rotaract Clubs that followed this launch virtually on the 1st July 2023. The highlight of the launch was RC Sonde who attended with their Boy Child Students from Faith High School.

The Sonde Models are recognized as the 1st Rotary Club to display their BCUP implementation program through this school and we now take a look at their opening activitiy at the District BCUP launch.

The BCUP implementation road map will still

be re-echoed until all Clubs are comfortable to independently or supportively swing into action. But to start us off, the journey has begun with strategic awareness and sensitization campaigns through Clubs' presentations to announce the need to support and uplift the boy child. Clubs are encouraged to continue with this awareness campaign through their weekly meetings with these basic actions as proposed; Boys and Men participating in leading and managing at-least one weekly Club meeting a month; including inviting a Guest Speaker to talk about the boy child at home,at school,at work,in church,in a mosque,in a play ground, in a marriage etc.

The BCUP District Committee has 23 Members and they are available to do the BCUP 360 degrees

presentations in Clubs. In the first 25days; we have done presentations in 10 Clubs of; RC Sonde,RC Jinja,RC Najeera,RC Kampala City, RC Butabika Royals, RAC Kampala North, RAC Mityana,RAC Soroti, RAC Mbale, RAC Kampala-Maisha.

The Clubs have also started unveiling their BCUP activities through launching and community activities. RC Upper Kololo led by their HCP Joyce Sadoori, launched their BCUP project at Naguru Remand Home where 152 of the remanded 155 were boys between the age of 12 to 17.

Rc Upper Kololo donated 500 chics to the Boys to be skilled in raring of chicken and also partnered with Hotel Lavena who are ready to buy the chicken and therefore a ready market to support these Boys' for a sustained income generating chicken project.

The District Governor during his tour of duty in Northern Uganda also continued with the visits to the Remand Homes like Juvenile Remand Home in Gulu; and again, 98% of the Remandees are Boys and therefore the innovations for skilling projects to support these Boys are very much needed.

RC Tororo launched their BCUP project with a match to create awareness of the Program in Eastern Uganda,

RC Arua Eco City also launched their BCUP Project and distributed text books to Springs Nursery School

RC Mukono Central visited Kame Ghetto in Mukono to identify BCUP beneficiaries and they carried out a community sensitization talk.


RC Kampala Ssesse; the Governor's Club hosting the first fundraising drive at Guvnor Uganda to support the Boy Child Uplifting Program.

In the next 6 days to close July, or Partners will also be visible in supporting BCUP. On Friday 28th July, Ndejje Senior Secondary School will be launching the "Men of Valour Club" whose objectives will be to uplift the Boy child. The District Governor,PS of Ministry of Education and Sports, PS Ministry of Gender, Labour and Social Welfare are expected to attend.

We shall also witness the BCUP launch for RC Kiboga, RC Kibuli and we are excited to close the 1st month of the BCUP implementation journey at the National Theatre to witness the joint BCUP launch of RAC Makindye, RAC Kololo,and RAC Kampala South on 31st July 2023.

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Breaking Barriers, Building Hope: Fighting mental health together

Five years ago, Jane was happy and upbeat that her career and life was looking very promising. She was a bright student who had secured a scholarship for her university education and subsequently got a well-paying job immediately after graduation with the marketing company where she did her internship attachment.



While at the University, she had met her course mate John who became the love of her life and they both worked in the same company. All was blissful in their relationship and they eventually got married and were blessed with two children. Being go-getters, they guickly rose through the ranks at their workplace however there was consistent competition amongst them to surpass each other's performance targets and attain promotion. They were largely absent from actively parenting their two children who ended up having behavioral issues being distracted from their studies. Their home gradually turned into a "war zone" which caused immense strain on their marriage. For the sake of peace, John secured employment out of town and moved out of home.

The conflict situation as well as single parenting however weighed heavily on Jane who slipped into depression, became inefficient and unmotivated to work. She was constantly unhappy and angry with her work colleagues and children whom she blamed for her husband leaving her. She preferred to be alone in isolation and not interact with family or friends. This was an indication that her mental well-being was rapidly deteriorating.

Mental well-being is a state that enables people to cope with the stresses of life, to realize their abilities,

to learn well and work well, and contribute to their communities. Mental illness occurs when mental health is compromised for so long that it affects our mental ability to function. Anyone of any age, gender, background or ethnicity can get a mental illness. Current statistics reveal that approximately 35% of Ugandans suffer from a mental illness of whom 15% require treatment. More females (5.1%) than males (3.6%) are affected by mental illness. Regrettably, access to mental health care in Uganda is limited due to the presence of few specialized facilities providing mental health care. Many Ugandans believe spirits and witchcraft to be the cause of mental illness, so they will commonly seek health care from traditional healers.

Against this background, Rotary D9213 will implement a Mental Health Campaign in response to the call by the Rotary International President 2023-24 Rtn Gordon McInally to Create Hope in The World by Working for Peace and Mental Wellbeing. The objectives of the Rotary D9213 Mental Health Campaign will be to

- 1. Raise awareness about mental health needs
- 2. Enhance access to mental health services
- 3. Fight stigma and discrimination of persons with mental health disorders for their improved emotional well-being

These will objectives will be achieved by

- Integrating and implementing mental health awareness and service activities at district, club and community levels
- Encouraging members to embrace mental wellness at individual level and
- Rallying support from the district leadership, Rotary fraternity, partner and stake holders so as to institute a culture of mental wellbeing among our families, workplaces, clubs, committees' general population and our country at large.

Everyone inside and outside Rotary and has a role to play in the mental health campaign to achieve the envisioned impact. Time has come to have open conversations about mental health symptoms and consequences as well as forging stronger support strategies and accessing treatment for those affected.

Highlights of the Orientation to Mental Health Campaign.

On July 16, 2023, Rotary District 9213 organized a transformative event that brought together over 100 Mental Health Champions and Hope Creator Presidents from various Rotary clubs across Uganda. The Orientation to mental health campaign was a resounding success, demonstrating the unwavering support and commitment to addressing the silent epidemic of mental health disorders affecting millions of people worldwide, including Uganda.

Mental health and well-being are crucial factors in an individual's ability to cope with life's challenges, unleash their potential, and actively contribute to their communities. Understanding the significance of mental health, District D9213 has taken on the responsibility of reshaping the mental health landscape in Uganda and ensuring that everyone has access to the necessary support and care.

At the event, Rtn. Mebra Lwabaayi, the chairperson of the project, shed light on the broad spectrum of mental health conditions, encompassing mental illnesses, psychosocial disabilities, and distressing mental states that impair functioning and quality of life. The World Health Organization recognizes over 200 types of mental health disorders globally, with anxiety disorders, depression, bipolar disorder, eating disorders, and substance use disorders being some of the most prevalent conditions.

The global burden of mental disorders is staggering, with approximately 970 million people worldwide living with a mental disorder in 2019, with anxiety and depressive disorders being the most common. The COVID-19 pandemic further exacerbated these numbers, leading to a significant rise in anxiety

and depressive disorders in 2020. Urgent action is required to address this pressing issue and provide essential mental health support.

In Uganda, the burden of mental disorders is also significant, with an estimated 35% of the population affected, and 15% requiring treatment. However, access to mental healthcare is limited, with only

one mental hospital and 28 inpatient psychiatric units primarily concentrated around Kampala. This lack of accessibility leaves those in rural areas with minimal opportunities for care.

To combat the challenges faced by Uganda's mental health system, District 9213 has adopted a comprehensive approach. The organization plans to collaborate with the Ministry of Health, Butabika National Mental Hospital, regional referral hospitals, non-governmental organizations, and community organizations like Uganda Harm Reduction, Strong Minds, and Free Mind Therapy to provide preventive interventions and treatment.

Preventive interventions play a vital role in effectively addressing mental health concerns. Primary prevention focuses on helping individuals avoid stressors and develop adaptive coping strategies to reduce the incidence of mental disorders. Secondary prevention involves early case finding, screening, and prompt treatment to reduce the prevalence of existing cases. Lastly, tertiary prevention aims to minimize the severity of mental disorders and associated disabilities through rehabilitative activities and appropriate treatment.

Governor Edward Kakembo Nsubuga of Rotary D9213 extends an invitation to all Mental Health ambassadors and volunteers to coordinate and integrate mental health matters within Rotary activities. Creating partnerships with corporate companies and fostering a culture of well-being are among the primary objectives. Together, Rotary

Through collaboration with government agencies, healthcare facilities, NGOs, and media, Rotary D9213 aims to eradicate the stigma surrounding emotional well-being, raise awareness, and improve access to mental health services. Besides, Timber is the only renewable construction material in the world. One cut can be replaced by 5 more.

Structures built with timber provide greater thermal insulation, sound proofing and seismic resistance. Their foundations cost less than half the cost of a conventional block house and yet provide the equivalent desired strength and durability. The overall benefits of timber are far more reaching than concrete walls and ceilings in terms of carbon containing and habitational therapy.

A Past Assistant Governor's Bird's View On Leading Rotary Clubs



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The 360 degrees leadership model is derived from the John C Maxwell book of 2021, "The 360 degrees Leader- Developing your influence from anywhere in the organization" and it contains facts about leadership from any positions, dealing with myths of middle leadership, the challenges faced by leaders, the principles that should be deployed among others.

Almost Rotary Club ushers their Club Presidents with lovely Installation parties which are good for celebrating achievements made in the past enhancing year, visibility, recognizing good performers

and sponsors, as well as strengthening networks beyond their clubs. Like the Government's financial year, the Rotary year is July to June.

I congratulate all Rotary District leaders upon successfully completing the Rotary Year. It is because of the past successes by past leaders that we still find strong Rotary clubs and a growing register of members globally because like us who joined before, every new member finds Rotary an attractive and fulfilling space to be.

Leading voluntary organizations has never been easy. It stretches you, but also gives you an opportunity to serve and learn more about leadership and personal discovery. There are things that they will not tell you as you become President for example, no one ever tells you that you will have to invest your time, resources to keep the club in good standing and members active, or that leadership is hard and you will need to deploy all manner of skills to win and keep people in clubs, or that without a strong governance structure in your club, the burden will rest on you as the President.

No one ever tells you that you will have to remind members to pay their dues even when they know that Rotary is by membership and membership is by subscription(payment of annual dues), you will not be told of the moments when members will not be available for club projects because they are busy with their families and other stuff, that in some situations, members will disagree and as a leader, you need to balance your interests and take decisions that are fair to all concerned, without any prejudice. No one will tell you all these, absolutely none. In whatever situation you find yourself, never give up your leadership position because we know you are capable of making it. Therefore, to be an effective Rotary President, you need to embrace the 360 degrees style of leadership.

The 360 degrees leadership model is derived from the John C Maxwell book of 2021, "The 360 degrees Leader- Developing your influence from anywhere in the organization" and it contains facts about leadership from any positions, dealing with myths of middle leadership, the challenges faced by leaders, the principles that should be deployed among others. In it you learn to lead up, to lead across, and to lead down, starting by self-leadership, before leading others.

Whereas leading up involves guiding and taking decisions that influence the people above you for example the board, and District officers, leading across in rotary means that you should be able to engage and influence fellow Presidents to visit your club, attend your projects as you reciprocate. Leading down requires that as President, you be able to win, guide and influence your own club members,

all club officials, make followers, outcome of which is evident from their participation in all events, including paying their dues on time and contribution to the Rotary Foundation.

But as you lead, remember to prepare for any anticipated risks and challenges. These challenges present themselves in the form of; the frustration challenge, the multi-hat challenge, the ego challenge, the fulfillment challenge, the vision challenge and the influence challenge.

In the frustration challenge, you will face frustrations from members and external partners but do not quit. Even you as a leader you are likely to frustrate your members and strategic partners with your unpopular leadership style, character and unethical behavior. No one wants to follow an insecure, vision less, incompetent, selfish and controlling leader. The multi-hat challenge is that one that requires you as a leader to put on many hats. You must be emotionally Intelligent, have capacity to determine what to do or say and when because an effective Club President must have many hats and know when and where to use the hats.

The ego challenge means that you have to do away with your ego because you know that ego is the enemy of progress. You don't have to be noticed or recognized to be a good leader. Even if you are un noticed, unrecognized or unappreciated by some members, you have to serve- do not open wars with people. Do your best and it is just a matter of time, people will appreciate your efforts (if any). The fulfillment challenge involves fulfilling your promises as a leader. The reason you must never over promise and fail to achieve. Whatever goals you plan, ensure they are realistic and achievable within the 12 months you have at the helm.

The vision challenge requires that you have a vision as the Club president, sell it to the club, champion it, invest in it and add value to it. Lead by example. For

example, if you want more PHFs or Major Donors in the club, then start by ensuring that you have complied yourself.

The Influence challenge requires that you influence your club members and followers for they say that leadership is a game of influencing and winning others. Avoid scattering and diving/splitting the club members. Avoid situations that would chase away club sponsors and potential members. Create rapport with your members and identify potential sponsors, engage mother clubs and new clubs chartered by your clubs, do not abandon them-keep them close so that as you conclude your tour of duty, you will pride in having grown the numbers.

In all this and above all, remember to train, consult the past and present leaders, remain active, work on strategies to attract new members, review your plans for the year and assess your performance, prepare monthly reports and submit to your AGs in a timely manner. Reports are important for tracking progress, accountability and transparency. Remember to update the club data and progress reports on the Rotary e-platforms.

The role of your Assistant Governor is not to run the day-to-day affairs of your club but to be a guide, educate, inspire, coach, motivate, assess performance and report accordingly. The Assistant Governor assists the District Governor with the administration of their assigned clubs, and they will always remind you to be accountable, active and transparent.

While I wish you the best as our new Hope Creator Presidents, you need to appreciate that behind the scenes, there will be a lot that we will not see, but that which will eventually put you on the list of the successful leaders of your time.



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Global Grants, "Getting Started"





Community Assessments, looked at in perspective:

Addressing your community's strength, weaknesses, needs and assets is an essential first step in planning for an effective project. It is therefore of necessity the very first "port of call" if you will in any global grant endeavor.

By taking off time to learn about our communities, we can discover the most relevant opportunities for projects and maximizing our respective club abilities to make meaningful impacts. Community assessments in essence make us get a better understanding of the dynamics of our communities and further help both these communities and ourselves make very important decisions about our service priorities. A unanimity of purpose of sorts.

Even for those individuals already actively involved in different community assessments can reveal additional strength and opportunities for growth.

An effective assessment always invariably reveals a few things we did not know about before.

Additionally, assessments also help build valuable relationships and encourage community members to actively participate in making lasting improvements. In a nutshell, community assessments are a very critical first step in creating trust, camaraderie, community ownership and sustainability, the tapestry that makes us who we are

Assessments should be systematic, not between one or two people. A wide variety of community stake holders and beneficiaries should of necessity be engaged in a meaningful way.

Tips for conducting any assessment:

- Remain open minded. Don't presume to know what the communities need.
- Choose the participants carefully. Consider the makeup of the communities.
- Include overlooked and marginalized groups; women, the elderly, young people, the disabled, religious and ethnic minorities. Always keep the community's social dynamics in mind.
- Always consider "yourself" an outsider. Find a well-connected organization or groups that can introduce you.
- Don't promise a project before making a decision, the right decision.

Six Community Assessment Tools:

They are not exclusive. They can be combined or adapted to best suit your respective club resources and aspirations as well as the preferences of the people you wish to engage in.

Community Meetings:

These are sometimes dubbed, "Town hall" or "public fora". Very informal public gatherings that bring together members of the communities to discuss issues, choice, concerns and express preferences for community priorities. A facilitator leads a discussion on issues related to community strengths and potential challenges and encourages attendees to vocally participate.

Survey:

A popular method of collecting information and opinions. They can be general or targeting specific segments of the community. They can be delivered by e-mail, phone or in person.

Interview (Key Informant):

One on one conversations between a facilitator (Interviewer) and a community stake holder (respondent). They allow for a greater understanding of the respondent's ideas and feelings. Unlike surveys, 'follow up' are deemed feasible.

Focus groups:

A carefully guided discussion used to determine a target group's preferences and opinions on a particular issue or idea. Most focus groups comprise of 6 to 12 diverse stakeholders usually asked a series of carefully worded, usually 'open ended' questions on different issues within the communities. Dialogue tends to evolve and participants tend to build on each other's responses.

Asset Inventory:

Identifies various types of resources in a community including the people, physical environment, institutions, services and events. Identification of people, places and anything of value. These are documented and the findings subsequently analysed.

Community Mapping:

These are used to reveal different perspectives about a community. A few resources and a little time are required. In this facilitated activity, individuals or groups draw a map of their community, marking certain points of importance and noting how often they visit the places.

CONFLICTS OF INTEREST IN GLOBAL GRANTS (A TRF PERSPECTIVE):

Consider an individual in a position to make or influence a decision about a grant or award that benefits:

- That individual (In this case a Rotarian/ Rotaractor).
- An immediate family member.
- A business partner OR
- An entity in which the individual, an immediate family member, or a business partner has a significant financial interest or in which the individual, an immediate family member, or a business partner is a trustee, director or an officer

Conflict of Interest in relation to TRF programmes:

Award individual eligibility:

Individuals who can't be candidates or recipients or beneficiaries of any TRF programme:

- Rotarians, Rotaractors, employees of clubs and Districts or RI, spouses, lineal descendants, and their spouses and employees of agencies, organisations or institutions partnering with The Rotary Foundation (TRF) or Rotary International (RI).
- Former Rotarians/Rotaractors remain ineligible for 36 months after termination of membership.

Conflict of Interest-selection committees:

- These must show impartiality.
- Exercise complete transparency. Anyone with perceived conflict of interest must recuse him/ herself
- There must be a fair, open and thorough bidding process.

Disclosure:

To the General Secretary of Rotary International.

- Rotarians/Rotaractors shall not serve on the grants committee for any global grant in which they have a conflict of interest.
- Global grants may not be financed with contributions (Directed Gifts, CSR funds etc) where a donor has a conflict of interest in relation to the grant.
- In ANY Global grant application, any perceived conflict of interest MUST be declared.

NB Not all declared "conflicts of interest" are necessarily a bad thing, keyword is that they must be declared in writing though.

REMEDIES IN CASES OF FAILURE TO DISCLOSE:

- Cancellation of a current grant.
- Suspension of future TRF program grants or awards involving:
- A particular Rotarian/ Rotaractors.
- A Rotary Club.
- A Rotary District.
