DEAR ROTARIANS

May is Rotary Youth Service Month. Looking around our Rotary district, it is clear that District 6270 takes youth service seriously. So many of the projects being done by our clubs center around our young people. This is as it should be. After all, the young people we serve are the future of our state, our country and our world. They are the future of Rotary.

The strength of Rotary comes from all the people, all over the world, joining together to make a positive difference. In order to stay a strong and relevant organization, Rotary needs to recognize the power of our young people. We need to involve our young people in Rotary projects and in Rotary clubs. If your club has a project and you need more help with it, try reaching out to a local high school. The students often need service hours. Plus, there might be a club or group at the high school that focuses on the type of work your project requires.

As you know, Rotary has club options for younger folks. There are Interact clubs for high school students and Rotaract clubs for folks ages 18 to about 30. Currently, there is not an age at which people must transfer to a "regular" Rotary club from a Rotaract club. However, the Council on Resolutions is encouraging districts to set age 30 as the age limit for Rotaract clubs.

In our district, we currently have 21 active Interact clubs, sponsored by 15 Rotary clubs. It seems to me that almost every high school has a Key Club, which is a club sponsored by Kiwanis clubs. It would be great if we could get Interact clubs to be at least as common as Key Clubs!

Right now, our district has only one Rotaract club. It is a pretty amazing club. It went from an almost-dead club to having the fastest growth of any club in the district. They had only 11 members on July 1, 2025. As of today, they have 45 members! That is an increase of over 400%! The members of the Rotaract Club of Milwaukee are energetic and committed to service. If you are in Milwaukee on a Wednesday evening, check out this club. Their excitement is contagious!

So, as you go through your days, give some extra thought about how you can involve our young people and young professionals in your Rotary club and its activities and projects. Let them see the value of all the good you do!

International Partnership



Transforms Sports Access

Through Rotary, I see the lasting impact of an international partnership on inclusion for people with physical disabilities.

A transformative collaboration between the Rotary Club of West Bend Sunrise and the Rotary Club of Zenica has successfully renovated and enhanced athletic facilities and disability inclusion in Bosnia and Herzegovina. The project, which demonstrates the positive impact of international cooperation in creating opportunities for people with disabilities, received funding from the Rotary World Fund, USAID, and Rotary Districts in Wisconsin, New York, and Bosnia and Herzegovina.

The Rotary Club of Zenica provided the initial “on the ground” support by talking to disabled athletes about their needs, gathering local support, overseeing the work on the renovation, and setting up the opening ceremonies and the sports tournament to be held upon the opening of the renovated facilities. The inaugural Rotary Competition on the newly renovated courts marked a milestone in the project's implementation and is now an annual tradition.

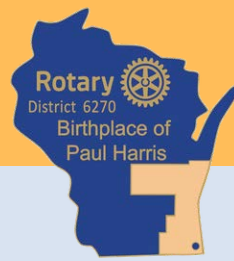

This project fostered meaningful connections between its partner organizations, combining project oversight with cultural exchange and fellowship. Here is an exciting introduction for some or update for others on the Rotary All-User Playground.



The Rotary All-User Playground will redefine play as a powerful tool for personal growth and community connection for kids and adults of all ages.

The Thiensville-Mequon Rotary Club and its community partners are raising funds for the Rotary All-User Playground, which is a fully inclusive outdoor space that will serve families across the Mequon and Thiensville communities. The playground will create an accessible and welcoming destination for people of all abilities.

Local families, businesses, and neighbors have already contributed more than **\$1.4 million** toward the **\$4.5 million** goal. A new **\$1.0 million** commitment from Brad Smith, Vice Chair and President of Microsoft Corporation, and his wife Kathy, in honor of Brad's father, longtime Rotarian and community leader Stan Smith, brings the total fundraising to over 50 percent of the project cost. This act of benevolence moves the Rotary club significantly closer to making the playground a reality.

Stan Smith, a dedicated volunteer with Rotary since 1977, serves as co-chair of the Capital Campaign. In recognition of his decades of service and his leadership on this effort, the main Rotary structure inside of the playground will state "For the community by the Stanford Smith Family."

Located in the scenic 95-acre Mequon Rotary Park, the All-User Playground will be adjacent to the south pavilion at 4100 Highland Road in Mequon.

Improve Access

I am proud that my Rotary Club helps people gain reliable access to their home and improves the quality of their life.

One of the supports that the Berlin Rotary Club provides is newly constructed wheelchair ramps for physically disabled people in our community. Supporting people with physical disabilities is essential toward removing barriers so that everyone has equal access to opportunities, dignity, and independence, which we believe are fundamental human rights.

Several of our members are experienced carpentry professionals and they lend their talent to these impactful service projects. We begin by evaluating the site of the proposed build to help prevent/reduce hazards and complications. Then we enter the design phase of the project wherein we transform our vision into an actionable and technical plan. We are very fortunate that the materials for each build are donated by our community partner [Drexel Building Supply of Berlin](#). The club then chooses a date and time to construct and install the wheelchair ramp. Again, we are very fortunate that the Berlin community steps up to help as local residents often volunteer their time to help us with these projects.

Jaden Schubert is a local community member who received a wheelchair ramp after he was in a life altering car accident. Jaden stated “the Berlin Rotary Club did a great job on my ramp, having a ramp that you can trust rather than a rickety metal ramp really makes all the difference and makes it easier.”

We take great pride in these projects because they help fairly distribute resources in our community which is an important Rotary goal.

We are happy to report that the results are in for March 2026 year-to-date PolioPlus giving. We are doing quite well as a district, up nearly **\$35,000** compared to this time last year.

In terms of international impact, there have been two recent cases of wild poliovirus reported, one each in Afghanistan and Pakistan. Although there is fighting ongoing between the two countries, authorities are working hard to maintain their planned vaccination scheduling.

District members are reminded that in order to apply for a Global Grant to complete a larger humanitarian project outside of the U.S., a Rotary Club in District 6270 needs to send two members to the Annual Global Grant Training. The next opportunity to do so is Tuesday, May 26, 2026, from 6:00 PM – 8:00 PM. In this online training event, you will learn how to: plan your project; find other clubs to partner with; apply for a grant to fund it; administer your project; and report on project's progress and outcomes.

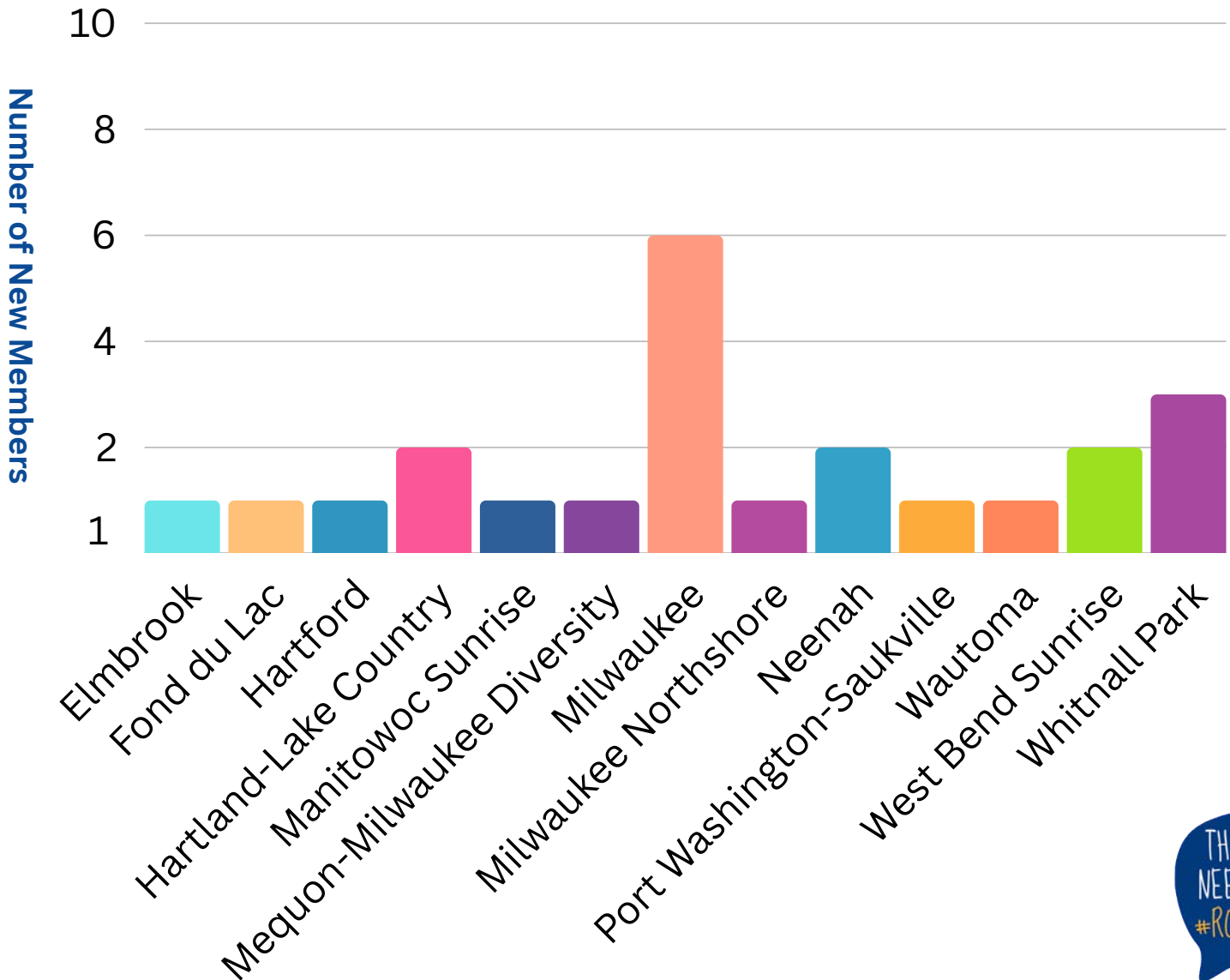

GLOBAL GRANT PARTNERSHIP OPPORTUNITIES

Providing Education, Diagnosis, and Treatment in the “Rest of the World”

THE GLOBAL EPILEPSY TREATMENT GAP

Epilepsy affects an estimated 65 million people worldwide — and 80% live in low- and middle-income countries, where 75% cannot access treatment. The stigma is devastating: people with epilepsy face fear, exclusion, and barriers to education and employment. Yet up to 70% of cases could be controlled with the right diagnosis and medication.

ROW Global Health is a U.S. 501(c)(3) public charity and Rotary organizational member dedicated to closing this gap. Their model trains community health workers (CHWs), reduces stigma through education, and delivers anti-seizure medication to those who need it most. Prior Rotary Global Grant projects have proven that the model works (Watch: [Change in Zambia: Education Transforms a Community's Response to Epilepsy](#)). Now ROW and partner Rotary clubs are seeking funding partners for three new 2026 grants.



THREE 2026 GLOBAL GRANT PROJECTS SEEKING CLUB PARTNERS

Kenya



Lead Club: Rotary Club of Howard West, Maryland

Host Club: Rotary Club of Malindi, Kenya

Kenya has ~1 million people with epilepsy — 2% of the population — and studies show people with epilepsy are **6x more likely to die** than the general population. Partners FPE Kenya and Kiserem Epilepsy Foundation will run education programs; ROW will provide anti-seizure medication.

Zambia

Building on the proven first grant, this project expands to the remote **southern Mambwe District** — where **90%+ of people with epilepsy face isolation**, and only 15% of adult patients report employment. CHWs will survey 3,500+ households and bring education to 19 schools.

Ethiopia has **3 million people with epilepsy** and a treatment gap exceeding **95%**. Stigma and cultural beliefs are often more disabling than the seizures themselves. CareEpilepsy will provide clinical care, EEG, medication, and mental health support.

The itinerary included stops at Global Grant water systems currently under construction in the Guatemalan Highlands at Llano Grande and Cruz Chich Chumisa, and community celebrations at water projects in San Antonio Ixoc and Xajaxac.

The participants were able to see the incredible impact of clean water and strategic transportation on these indigenous Mayan communities.



The Whitnall Park Rotary Club worked with the Muskego Police Cadets, and other volunteers from across the area, at Muskego Feeds hosted at LakePoint Church to pack meals for people facing hunger around the world on March 14, 2026.

The **220,000** meals packed during the event will help feed families in Peru.

In addition, this service project is an annual favorite because it allows the club to work beyond its traditional service border. Club members were inspired to see so many people working side-by-side to help others.



The West Bend Noon Rotary Club partnered with the West Bend Downtown Association to help develop a new German Chalet Christmas attraction.

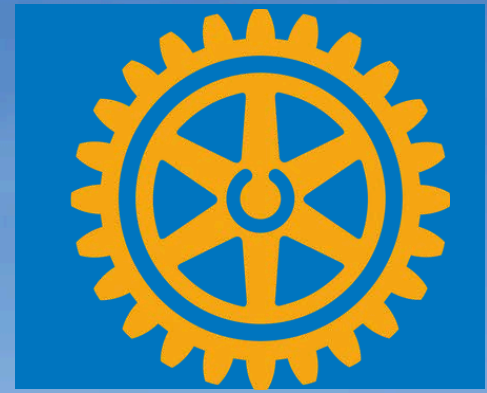

Rotary Recipe

Frozen Chocolate Banana Yogurt Clusters

INGREDIENTS

3-4 cups ripe, but firm banana slices
1 cup of plain Greek yogurt
1-4 tablespoons of honey or maple syrup
2 teaspoons of vanilla extract
1/2 cup of creamy peanut butter
(optional)
12 ounces of semi-sweet or dark chocolate, chopped
1 tablespoon of coconut oil
flaky sea salt
(optional)



DIRECTIONS

1. Line a cupcake pan with paper liners.
2. In a bowl, mix the yogurt with the honey or maple syrup, and vanilla. Add the banana slices and gently toss to coat. Add the peanut butter (if using). Scoop a small spoonful (3-ish banana slices) and place in the paper liners. Freeze 1-2 hours.
3. Melt the chocolate and coconut oil together in a bowl in the microwave. Dip each frozen cluster in the chocolate and place on a parchment-lined baking sheet. Sprinkle with sea salt (if desired). Freeze until completely frozen, 3 hours. Remove from the freezer, let sit for 2-3 minutes. Eat and enjoy!
