The forms for nominations will be sent to district leadership in the near future. Nominations for our Zone will be submitted to the Zone 28 Rotary Foundation Coordinator, Newell Krogmann, who in conjunction with the Zone Rotary (continued on the next page) and Rotary Public Image Coordinators. Tamie Koop and Debbie Stacey, will facilitate selection of one winner from the Zone.

After our Zone winner is chosen, the RI Board of Directors and the Rotary Foundation Trustees will select the global winner, who will be honored at the annual Rotary International Convention in Atlanta in June 2017.

The <u>Global Alumni Service to Humanity Award</u> was created to honor an outstanding Rotary alumnus whose career and activities illustrate the impact of Rotary's programs on his or her service to humanity. The award is open to <u>all Rotary alumni</u> (not just Rotary Foundation alumni).

The <u>Alumni Association of the Year Award</u> recognizes an alumni association that has increased awareness of the significant role alumni play in Rotary and demonstrated the lasting impact of Rotary programs. The alumni association must:

- Be formally chartered by Rotary International
- Be up-to-date in responding to all requests for information from RI, such as surveys, and keep Rotary's records of association officers current
- Enhance the awareness of the value of alumni within Rotary
- Have completed a project or activity over the preceding 12 months that had an impact on a local or international community and involved a majority of the association's members
- Have an online presence through social media (e.g., Facebook, LinkedIn)
- Demonstrate collaboration between Rotarians and alumni
- Support the Object of Rotary and demonstrate the principle of Service Above Self

## **Foundation Thoughts**

Our Rotary Foundation – A Very Small Seed Makes a Very Large Tree by Karel Weigel, ARRFC, Zone 28

In my church, the 3<sup>rd</sup> Sunday in January is reserved for a Peace Service in honor of Martin Luther King Jr. whose birthday the nation celebrates the following day. The service this year was devoted to inspirational readings and music, including a song sung by the Children's choir which included the words, "A very small seed makes a very large tree". While I was enjoying the music and watching the children, I thought how perfectly that same idea described our Rotary Foundation.

Our individual contributions (a very small seed) make a very large Foundation (tree)! The Rotary Foundation is about "Doing Good in the World." In that spirit, we identify with other philanthropic organizations which are equally dedicated to humanitarian service. But Rotary's methods are unique. Money contributed by individuals and by clubs and districts is invested for three years (interest accrued on the investments is used to support The Rotary Foundation's operating expenses). At the end of the third year, the one-half of the original funds is returned to Districts as District Designated Funds (DDF) and the other half goes to the World Fund to be used by the Trustees of The Rotary Foundation for programs, including the provision of matching funds for Global Grants. These dollars are used by the clubs and Districts to fund grants that change lives through a wide range of local and international Rotary Foundation activities. *We* as Rotarians decide how those dollars will be used by creating grant projects in our communities to meet immediate needs or partnering with clubs and districts around the world with strategically focused high impact projects.

#### **Centennial Promotion**

The celebration of The Rotary Foundation's 2016-17 centennial officially kicks off at this year's convention in Korea, but you can prepare your club and district officers now using materials in the <u>centennial promotion kit</u>.

Here are some ideas for promoting the centennial in your district:

- Use the <u>centennial logo</u> on your Foundation training materials and district communications.
- Share weekly Foundation facts with participants prior to training sessions.
- Feature the Foundation in your training programs, emphasizing that clubs should hold Rotary Days to showcase the Foundation's history and good work. *(continued on the next page)*

- Strategize ideas to help clubs find ways to promote the centennial in their communities.
- Share your district's plans for increasing Foundation giving in honor of the centennial.

#### The Rotary Foundation is a Top Charity – Another Kudo

The Rotary Foundation has been identified by CNBC as one of the top 10 charities changing the world in 2015. #### **Grants and Travel Insurance – Some New Rules**

As of 1 April, travelers funded by Rotary grants are not required to make their travel arrangements through RITS/BCD. They may either use RITS or make their own travel arrangements. And, effective 1 July, Rotary will no longer provide a blanket travel insurance policy for Rotary grant travelers. Insurance will instead be an eligible grant budget item.

#### **Reporting on the Use of Grant Funds – A Stewardship Requirement**

# From Section 7 of the District Memorandum of Understanding that all districts must sign to do Foundation Grants:

#### **Report on Use of Grant Funds**

Grant reporting is a key aspect of grant management and stewardship. Districts shall set up a grant reporting process.

A. Districts must report to their clubs on the use of all district designated funds (DDF) to their member clubs by

- 1. Providing a report annually at a district meeting to which all clubs are invited or eligible to attend that includes a breakdown of expenditures for each project that received funding and the names of districts, clubs, and individuals who received grant funds
- 2. Including financial information on such grants in the governor's final monthly communication
- B. Districts must adhere to all TRF grant reporting requirements.

# **Special Grant Recognition in the Rotary Foundation Centennial Year – June 30 Deadline**

As part of its <u>centennial celebrations</u>, The Rotary Foundation plans to recognize major achievements related to its programs, including the important work that Rotary clubs and districts accomplish through Rotary Foundation grants. At the 2017 Rotary International Convention in Atlanta, the Foundation will recognize 10 outstanding global grant-funded projects completed in 2015-16. The criteria for selection are:

- Community impact
- Sustainability
- Rotarian involvement
- Replicability

To be eligible for recognition, the project's final global grant report — submitted via My Rotary — must be accepted by 30 June 2016. As always, we encourage you to include photos and videos of project activities with the final report. Photos should have a minimum resolution of 300 dpi, and videos should be shot horizontally at the highest resolution your camera will allow.

The hope is that this project recognition will encourage even more Rotarians to become involved in their Foundation as we work together to advance world understanding, goodwill, and peace through the improvement of health, the support of education, and the alleviation of poverty.

# **Rotary Peace Centers**

In support of Rotary's commitment to making peace possible, in 2002, The Rotary Foundation partnered with top universities around the world to establish The Rotary Peace Centers. The Rotary Peace Centers program identifies highly qualified professionals and, through academic training and practical field work, prepares them to address the root causes of conflict.

Since the program's inception, more than 930 Rotary Peace Fellows have earned a Master's Degree or Certificate in the field of peace and conflict resolution. These leaders go on to professional careers in leading NGOs, government agencies, universities and other global institutions where they work to create peace and cooperation in their communities and abroad.

One Rotary Peace Fellow working to prevent conflict and build understanding is Rotary Peace Centers alum Kevin Melton. Kevin graduated from the University of Queensland and went on to work at renowned institutions including USAID and NATO. He has since joined fellow Peace Centers alum Cameron Chisholm at the International Peace and Security Institute (IPSI). At IPSI, Kevin and Cameron promote feasible and effective solutions to violence and instability in areas affected by extremism.
