April is Rotary's Maternal and Child Health Month. According to the World Health Organization, 5.6 million children under age five died in 2016. More than half of those deaths were due to conditions that could have been prevented or treated by access to simple, affordable interventions.

Rotary members provide help to mothers and children in need by offering families training in how to prevent mother-to-infant HIV transmission, how to breastfeed, and how to protect themselves and their children from illness. Here's how you can

support mothers and children during Maternal and Child Health Month.

Rotary makes high-quality health care available to vulnerable mothers and children so they can live longer and grow stronger. We expand access to quality care, so mothers and children everywhere can have the same opportunities for a healthy future.

The Rotary Foundation reaches mothers and children in need by giving communities the help and training they need to take control of their own maternal and infant health care. Rotary makes amazing things happen, like:

## **Mobile prenatal clinics**

Haiti has the highest maternal and infant mortality rate of any country in the western hemisphere. Rotary provided a fully equipped medical Jeep to volunteers and midwives to reach mothers and children in remote areas.

### **Cancer screening**

Rotarians provided a mobile cancer screening unit and awareness trainings around Chennai, India, where there is a high mortality rate of women with breast and cervical cancer due to late diagnosis.

### Preventing injuries and deaths

Rotary members launched a \$3 million, five-year pilot to save lives of mothers and children during home deliveries in Nigeria. Since 2005, they've also repaired 1,500 obstetric fistulas — 500 more than their initial goal — restoring dignity and hope to vulnerable mothers.

During April, Rotary Maternal and Child Health Month, take action to support mothers and children:

- 1. In cooperation with local ministries of health, develop or support programs that provide immunizations and antibiotics. Measles, malaria, pneumonia, AIDS, and diarrheal diseases are the leading causes of death in children under five.
- 2. Promote good nutrition. Include water, sanitation, and hygiene efforts to maximize child nutrition. Diarrheal diseases caused by contaminated water exacerbate malnutrition in children.
- 3. Providing information about and access to family planning resources. Just filling the unmet need for contraception could reduce the number of maternal deaths by nearly one-third.
- 4. Supporting accredited training programs for health professionals.

Throughout the District, we have many activities planned for the end of our Rotary year 2017-2018. There are so many



projects being completed from all the clubs.

We have completed AG Training, Training, President Elect District Leadership Training, and Club Training. Leadership DGE Kathy Hubbard and incoming District Trainer, Monica Gutierrez have done a fantastic job!

One of our main projects this year has been the club tree planning project, RI President Ian Riseley's initiative to support environmental sustainability worldwide. I had the opportunity to be with Brady Club as they planted two big oak trees on the 10th hole of Brady Golf Course as a memorial to Leroy Keese, a golf buddy of many Brady golfers. Rotary SA coordinated an amazing project with more than six clubs participating -- over 150 volunteers and 54 students -- all helping to plant 90 trees in McAllister Park in San Antonio, and finishing the day with debris pickup. The Wimberley Club is planting trees along the Blanco River in the area that was destroyed by the Memorial Day Flood a couple of years ago. There are many other examples of tree planting projects in the District, and without the vision of President Ian Riseley, we would never have thought of this to help our environment.


## Rotary District 5840 Raffle Cruise









