

Dear fellow Rotarians,

November is Foundation Month, and time for us to take a look at where we are in our Rotary Foundation: what it's done, what it's helping us do now, and how we can move forward.

Last Rotary year, our Foundation received US\$304 million in total contributions: that included \$140 million to the Annual Fund, \$28 million to the Endowment Fund, and \$108 million to PolioPlus. All of those gifts are now hard at work, Doing Good in the World: supporting Rotary's work today and strengthening our organization for tomorrow. The Foundation approved 494 district grants and 1,260 global grants, with a total of \$111 million in funding.

As you all know, polio eradication is the number one priority of Rotary and our Foundation. It has been a historic year for polio eradication, with unprecedented new support and fewer cases of polio than ever before. As announced at our Atlanta convention in June, the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation has increased its commitment to our polio eradication initiative, and will match 2:1 all Rotary contributions up to 50 million dollars, for the next three years. If Rotarians raise \$50 million per year, the Gates Foundation will match this with \$100 million: resulting in \$150 million for polio eradication in each of the three years. In total, more than one billion dollars in new funding for polio were pledged by governments and key donors in Atlanta.

It was a great lead in to the 2017-2018 Rotary year, and Rotarians have been doing an amazing job not only of raising the money to fulfill our commitment, but keeping public awareness of polio high. Our fifth annual World Polio Day, on 24 October, was a great success; our livestream event, broadcast from the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation headquarters in Seattle, was our largest ever, with over 149,000 people viewing and Vice-President Dean Rohrs representing Rotary in the program. Another 3,428 World Polio Day events took place around the world. It's not too late to be a part of it; head over to the End Polio now website to see the recorded video.


In 2016, 37 children were paralyzed by the wild poliovirus. So far in 2017, that number stands at 13. We are on our way to zero, and you can follow that journey with the updates that are published every week by the Global Polio Eradication Initiative.

It's important to remember that we have to keep doing everything we can do to End Polio Now, not only until the last child is paralyzed, but until eradication is certified by an independent commission. We expect that to happen at least three years from the last time wild poliovirus is found, in a child, a water supply, or anywhere else. Only then will we celebrate the end of polio - and the greatest work yet of Rotary and our Rotary Foundation.

## LIFE HAS INTERESTING CYCLES....

In 2001 the Rotary International Convention was hosted by District 5840 in San Antonio. After the Convention, the District 5840 Host Organizing Committee had \$320,000 remaining.

The President of Rotary International for that year was Frank Devlyn, from Mexico City.

The Rotary Foundation had recently established donor advised funds within the Foundation. It was decided to place the remaining funds in a District 5840 Donor Advised Fund, who would manager our funds for us. The proceeds of the \$320,000 would provide grant funds in the future for the District.

Our District and Rotary Foundation has been benefitted greatly since establishing our own Donor Advised Fund. We have given the Rotary Foundation \$58,460 over the years. The Clubs in our District have received \$194,505 in matching grants from the DAF proceeds of the initial corpus.

That means that the District has been able to accomplish, as a minimum, \$389,010 worth of humanitarian projects it would not have otherwise achieved. Plus, we still have the corpus of \$320,000 working for the future.

Recently several states along the Gulf of Mexico and Mexico City were ravaged by natural disasters...hurricanes and earthquakes.

Mexico City particularly experienced one of the worst earthquakes in its history. The Rotary Foundation, in response to these disasters, established respective Donor Advised Funds. These allow Rotarians to contribute to the assistance of the disaster areas.

The District 5840 Donor Advised Fund decided it would provide \$5,000 to the Mexican Earthquake Disaster Relief DAF. This is the home area of Past President of RI Frank Devlyn.

What a unique and special moment for us to give back to the former President of RI, from the Donor Advised Fund his International Convention's success afforded us the ability to establish!!





## Kerrville Morning Rotary Club provides books and magazines for St. Lucia library

Imagine a library about the size of a doctor's waiting room, two shelves 10 feet long, each holding about 100 books mostly printed from about 1915 to 1940. Not surprisingly it is very lightly visited by the students, especially the boys. Such is the state of the library of the Anse La Raye Primary school consisting of grades 3-6.

Anse La Raye is on the west coast of the tear-drop shaped island of St Lucia, in the Caribbean. St. Lucia is a beautiful, green tropical island which is a tourist stop for some cruise ships. It has some lovely resorts. But none are near Anse La Raye. This fishing town of 6,000 has an unemployment rate of 60%. The students here have little to encourage them to read, widen their horizons, learn skills and bring economic growth to their town.

Kerrville Morning Rotary Club will provide these students with more than 700 books, including educational magazines, which will give a real incentive to the students to read, to take books home to read and to open themselves and their families to the larger world of opportunity.

There have been many who contributed to this literal mountain of books ; Rotarians, members of the community, Notre Dame Library, Comfort Library, and Friends of Butt-Holdsworth Library. while discussing shipping issues with the owner of the local UPS store, Ginny and Bill Bull chose to contribute books. Then they influenced their daughter, Angela Brinkley, who was teaching 5th grade in Morgan City, Louisiana. She was promoted to curriculum facilitator. Because of this promotion, she sent 250 books she had purchased and used in her classroom to Kerrville for this project. Through the generosity of many in the community, a total of 730 books and magazines were collected.

The committee who shepherded this project is Rotarians Samantha Booth, Laura Bechtel, Drew Whitehead, John Aceti, chairperson, and non-Rotarian Carol Aceti. Kerrville Morning Club Board of Directors approved the project and allocated the funds for shipping.

This project was affected by Hurricane Harvey. The books are ready to ship and the port of Houston is finally ready to receive them. There has been a delay of several months.

John Aceti has also served as liaison between the Anse La Raye School and the Kerrville Morning Rotary Club. After serving as Global Volunteers in Anse La Raye schools as tutors in 2015, John and Carol observed the dismal state of the materials in the school. John also attended a Rotary club meeting in Castries, the capital of St. Lucia, to encourage their support for the school.

With the cooperation from the St Lucia country manager for Global Volunteers, Chemida Popo-Cox and the teacher/assistant principal of the Primary School, Sylvia Joseph, this project will stimulate reading and a love for books. Both are native St. Lucians and are excited about additional resources for the school. Global Volunteers, an agency which promotes opportunities all over the world for mentors, health workers and agriculture consultants, offered to build additional shelves for the library. Also the school district has hired a librarian. The cooperation between Kerrville Morning Club members, Kerrville community members, Anse La Raye Primary School and the help from Global Volunteers is a plus for the love of reading and a vision of a better world on this island.
