The Survivor Women From Extreme Violence Shelter (CAREM) provides services to women whose life and that of their children in danger with the extreme violence occurred into their families in their communities. The Sexually Abused Girls House (CRISA provides recovery therapy and elementary education for children and adolescents who have been rescued from violence and so abusive situations. In the state of Yucatán (according to ENDIREH en 2006*) over 44% of the women declare to have suffered from their male partners in the last 12 months and 26,349 women suffer some kind of violence to some of degree of severity. Some of them have had the need of a shelter in order to save their own and their children's lives, which is an good opportunity together with them; once they are in the Refugee they get specialized attention and they can count with recovering their family I new opportunities of personal growth for each member of the family who, due to the violence sequels and conquences, have so needs regarding self esteem and very scarse tools to achieve economic autonomy.

During the time these refugees have been operating, 47 women were rescued from violent situations and reinserted into the so economically self sufficient families. This means there is a direct impact into these 47 families and they indirectly impact the 14 involved in the social network of these women.

When you add violence to an already vulnerable situation involving poor feeding habits, lack of health services, no patrimonial access to training for a well paid job to support themselves and their youngsters among other conditions, then social vulnerabili extreme. To make matters worse, a large part of the women residing in these shelters come from the Mayan people, which add discrimination in terms of justice, since there is no timely attention to this legal matters, much less in Maya language, their moth which limits their access to the justice system thus jeopardizing their lives. According to the National Observatory of Feminicide registered 51 women homicides committed by male partners between 2007 and 2012.

Both, the House and the Refugee, work all 365 days of the year; women are hosted and trained for periods of 3 months which cextended to 5 depending on their risk level and their social and economical vulnerability.

Because of the constant use, the materials and equipment in these facilities are broken or otherwise deteriorated to the point of almost unusable.

In order to achieve a successful social reinsertion, these women survivors of extreme violence, require tools that may allow a quiolence free life for themselves and their children; to fulfill this goal, there are some activities are taught such as organic garder recycling. This kind of activities helps a lot to mental and health healing of the girls and teenagers of CRISAL

They are meant to be expanded with a project to grow medicinal plants of the region and thus promoting respect for their envirc for the traditional mayan knowledge. Some therapies are held through art, music, theater and dance too.

As for the economic autonomy, there are empowering and enterprising workshops; some agreements with training schools suc CECATI, has been drawn so as to have the women take training courses in their facilities. However, hardware and equipment ϵ in order to maintain the training during their time in our safe houses and guarantee a future income and economic independenc rescued women.

It is important to stress that the women stay in the Shelter for only 3 months and they need the both daily living facilities and working/training equipment for their own learning and training, because this will be the key factor to gain their own economic au that is, to support themselves and their children. This will reduce the possibilities of the women to go back to depend economic aggressor once they leave the protected environment of the shelter.

It is also relevant to mention the coverage these institutions provide: it is not limited to the rescued women, teenagers and girls, serves as preventive means to the community through speeches and workshops directed to different vulnerable groups, high so

The working skills will be teach by personal STPS (Secretaria del Trabajo y Prevención Social) and volunteers.

Participating doctors, nurses, teachers, social workers, therapistes and volunteer adults to teach them how to use the machines and occupations.

Rotarians from the International Club will visit the centers to monitor progress, sustainability and expenditures.
