Making A Difference 2018 Float News

Message from the 2018 Rotary Rose Parade Float Committee Chair



Our 2018 Float will represent the first year of our Foundation's second century. In our last newsletter we shared the new Tournament of Roses (TOR) 2018 Rose Parade theme "Making a Difference." Which coincidentally aligns with the 2017-18 Rotary theme, "Rotary – Making a Difference." Since then, our Float design and theme, "Planting the Seeds of Service" has been approved and described in this newsletter how it embodies the elements of the Rotary and

TOR theme.

We expanded our Float Participants to 12 walkers and 6 riders including two RI dignitaries. In this issue read how you can be a walker (rider positions sold out), learn about volunteer sign ups and more. Several fellowship activities are coming up to include an early peek at our Float in a Rollout Ceremony Oct 14, decorating opportunities in December, our exciting Holiday Party on Dec 30, and of course the Rose Parade on New Years Day.

2018 Rotary Rose Parade Float Unveiled

Our Float design is a whimsical bunny gazing at the just planted peach tree, the peaches represent Rotary's Six Areas of Focus. Our Float theme "Planting the Seeds of Service" dovetails with some of Rotary International President Ian Riseley's messages for this year:

- 1) Green Message: "Making a difference by planting a tree for each of its 1.2 million members by Earth Day April 22, 2018." "I believe the greater result will be a Rotary that recognizes our responsibility not only to the people on our planet, but to the planet itself."
- 2) Peace Message: "Six Areas of Focus for Peace" The nearly 17 foot tree bears 6 peaches representing Rotary's Six Areas of Focus. A tag on the tree clearly shows the symbols of Rotary's Six Areas of Focus. To further embrace the Peace and Green Messages, we will have a real sapling on the Float from one of Hiroshima's A-Bomb survivor trees that will be planted in one of Rotary's Peace Gardens to promote peace and a green legacy.



Then off to Pasadena and the excitement began. My wife and I had the opportunity to see the construction of the Float and even had hands on experiences of placing a few roses. On January 1, the lineup and preparation began early...very early. We assembled at the predetermined meeting point where another long time dedicated Rotarian Wade Nomura drove us to the Float line up area. Wade knew how and where we needed to go to miss the traffic and got us where we needed to be. I still marvel at how Wade got us there via back and residential streets.

As scheduled like a finely tuned machine the parade began—without a hitch. After the parade when asked my reaction, I could only say that it truly was a once in a lifetime experience---but for me it was a twice in a lifetime experience. An unforgettable one!!



Does it seem like we Rotarians over use the phrase, "Opportunity of a lifetime?". Since I joined Rotary just two and a half years ago, I find myself repeating that sentiment so often that I am often afraid I sound rather overly dramatic. But isn't it just so true? I love parades, I have walked in our local community parades, and even walked the New Year's Day Parade in London in 2016. But nothing compares to the Rose Parade walk and the comradery of walking that walk with fellow Rotarians. The streets were packed for 5 miles with happy,

smiling faces! Every single human being on the route was cheering and clapping and filled us with energy as we made our way down Colorado Blvd. in the crisp morning sun. It was nothing less than exhilarating! We walked, and sometimes trotted, we laughed, waved and shook hands with folks from around the country. But more than anything else we shared Rotary's mission with millions of folks around the world. And all to soon it was over!

"Oh Pick me! Pick me!", that was my first thought when I saw the 2018 rendering for our Rotary Rose Parade Float at the District conference a few weeks ago. I was honored to be a walker for our district 5330 last year. I truly had no idea what an amazing experience that few days would be.

We (walkers) gathered at the parade staging grounds for the photo shoot to learn "the wave", do a costumed photo shoot and learn our rolls for the commencement of judging the following day. I don't care how big your television is, you just cannot fully appreciate the grandeur of these entries viewing them on television. So even if you aren't selected to walk the parade, I wholeheartedly recommend you come, join the fun, cheer for our entry and see the parade in person! I might add, there are few places on earth to spend a better New Year's Eve! The citizenry of Pasadena California live to throw the Best New Years on the Planet! And it crescendos with the Rose Parade. It is truly an experience of a life time and worthy of capturing title as a "bucket list" item.

One of the unexpected highlights of the week came the evening before the parade. The committee put together a more casual dinner at a great little Mexican restaurant. As a fairly novice Rotarian, I was inspired to be in the company of so many Governors and Past District Governors and I had plenty of time to get them to share their favorite Rotary stories. I even had the chance to spend some time sitting with our International President John Germ and his lovely wife. I was so honored to be afforded the opportunity to just sit and chat and hear firsthand his thoughts on the future of Rotary and some of the challenges we face maintaining western leadership at the International level. The morning of the parade arrived very early. The excitement was palpable. We arrived at the staging area long before the sun. When the Princess Trophy Banner arrived before our Rotary entry I saw tears of joy from some committee members, Folks like Joe and Jeanne Ramos who had worked tirelessly for over a year to achieve that win for Rotary. I must say, having that banner leading our Float down the parade route gave us all such pride and, I realized later, would set the standard for this year's beautiful "we're in it to win it!" entry.

Road Test for 2018 Float

Here is what a road test and fire drill of our 2018 Float looks like. This was on Saturday July 29th. All volunteers must be in place by 6:45 am (too early for Jeanne V. Ramos) at the Phoenix Decorating's new facility in Irwindale. District Governor Nominee Melanie Rice, Larry Rice, PDG Miles Petroff and Ray Bushnell were there to sit in all the positions. A sixth rider position was offered to a volunteer. The Float simulates traveling in the





Parade at 2.5 mph. Our Float has a tall peach tree with 6 peaches to represent Rotary's Six Areas of Focus. The 17 foot tree must be able to hydraulically move down to go under the overpass along the parade route and miss power lines. There is a fire drill where the riders and driver must unstrap and be off the Float within 45 seconds. Melanie and I sat where the RI President normally sits in the left front. As of this writing, we have 6 riders identified. The 12 walker positions are nearly full. All this to promote Rotary to 73 million TV viewers throughout the world and 700,000 along the Rose Parade route.



Rotary Rose Parade Float Committee

While watching the 1978 Pasadena Rose Parade on Television, Jack Gilbert, who was President of the Wilshire Rotary Club, in Los Angeles, California, and subsequently chairman of the Rotary Rose Parade Float Committee, had an idea. Rotary would be celebrating its 75th Anniversary in 1980. Jack believed that by entering a Float in the 1980 New Year's Day Rose Parade, Rotary could communicate its message, "Service Above Self" to millions of people worldwide.

Jack shared his vision with other Rotarians, who supported the idea. Seven Governors in Southern California agreed to underwrite the cost of the Float and make up any shortfall not covered by Club contributions. Fortunately, the Clubs contributed \$35,000 which covered the full cost of the original Float. This first Tournament of Roses experience lead to the formation of the Rotary Rose Parade Float Committee which now receives contributions each year from eight Rotary Districts and an additional 700 Individual Rotary Clubs to fund the Float. The Committee has entered a Float every year since 1980.
