Mr. Ujjwal Chapagain of the Himalayan Rabbit Farm, founded in 2012, will provide training and materials to fifty farmers in Nepal to raise rabbits for food and income. Rabbit raising is a highly cost effective and relatively simple means to these ends. The project is extraordinarily important in the context of the April 2015 earthquake, which killed some 10,000 people and caused enormous damage to homes, farms, schools and other facilities. The project will be supervised by the nearby Rotary Club of Tripureswor, as described in their letter of participation. Rabbit project expert Dr. Steven Lukefahr of Texas A&M University-Kingsville has been providing technical support to Mr. Chapagain for the last six months. The project is jointly supported by the Rotary Club of Kingsville, the Sunrise Rotary Club of Kingsville, and the Rotary Club of Burnet.

Community Assessment & Impact

Malnutrition is a major problem in rural Nepal. (See http:www.npcs.org/np/nutrition.html) According to government statistics, 24% of women are malnourished; 13% of children under five years are wasting, 39% are underweight and 49% are stunting. This was before the April 25, 2015 earthquake. The Rotary rabbit project will not only provide rabbit stock and training to 50 small farmers. It will also create awareness of the nutritional benefits of rabbit meat and assure a market for surplus meat which may be sold. Families will establish organic vegetable gardens, using manure from rabbits. Sales of vegetables will increase income; eating the vegetables will improve health. There will be substantial direct benefits to fifty farm families. Important indirect benefits will include improved school attendance for children whose health has improved, increased supplies of affordable meat and vegetables in local markets, and increased sales in stores as farmers' incomes increase. The target area includes the 13 districts where over 98% of houses were destroyed and hundreds of cattle were lost.

Sustainability

This project is highly sustainable for the following reasons: 1) farmers will receive practical, hands-on training in rabbit production, management and fodder production; 2) follow-up visits will ensure that projects are successfully completed; 3) the most successful producers will be hired as technical supervisors on subsequent projects; 4) fodder production will be encouraged; 5) locally available materials will be used for rabbit hutch construction; 5) each farmer will be required to give the first offspring rabbits at three months to the project for distribution to the next group of farmers; 6) a market for rabbit meat already exists and a transportation system and sales strategy already exists 7) farmers have every incentive to succeed.

Implementation Plan

If Rotary District 5930 approves a grant of US\$5,000, the rabbit project in Nepal will be fully funded at US\$10,000. These funds will be transferred on a quarterly basis to a separate bank account set up by the Rotary Club of Tripureswol, whose President is Mr. Manish Ghiraiya. Transfers of funds will be subject to decisions of an Approval Committee consisting of three members of the Rotary club of Tripureswol (Manish Ghiraiya, PE Bijay Sainju and Rajendra Krishna Shrestha), two members of the Rotary Club of Kingsville (Mike Fountaine and Richard Hartwig), and one member of the Sunrise Rotary Club of Kingsville (Sonja Daghlish). The Rotary Club of Tripureswor will develop criteria for, and participate in, the selection of farmers so that benefits will go to those most in need. They will interact with the

local community and with local cooperatives. They will monitor hutch construction and the development of fodder planting. They will maintain expenditure records and receipts and will promote the project in the district and in local media. The final report will be written by the Rotary Club of Kingsville. Additional technical advice and support will be provided via e-mail by Professor Steven Lukefahr of Texas A&M University-Kingsville.
