It's Spring Fever!

Spring is here! We have set the clocks ahead, the days are getting longer, and the daffodils are starting

to bloom. March was a busy month of continuing Rotary activities. The Presidents Elect Training Seminar (PETS) in San Jose started the month off with a roar! DGE Vicki and the Far West PETS Committee put on another great session for the districts in Northern California and Hawaii. It was very gratifying to see all of the Presidents Elect charged up and ready to energize their clubs next year. Kim and I also attended Foundation Dinners in Area 7 and Area 5. Both events were



extremely well attended, and had exceptionally interesting and inspiring speakers. On March 16th I attended my own Loyalton Club's 74th Charter Night celebration. It was wonderful, and our next year's Charter Night will be a really big deal (75 years)! We finished out March by helping Portola celebrate their 75th Anniversary of Rotary Service. Once again, it is such an honor to ioin Rotarians from around the District to celebrate their incredible service to their communities and to our world!

April is Magazine month. This month is a good time to take a few moments and go through our great Rotarian Magazine. It truly is a world class publication. It is designed to provide interesting and relevant information in a format that you can move through quickly. Our magazine also lends itself to that quiet time where you can sit down for a few moments and be inspired and entertained with great stories from around the Rotary World. In fact, keep an eye out for a story, or possibly two stories, about District 5190 Rotarians that will be printed in upcoming issues. I don't want to spoil the surprise!

Last month, our clubs continued to make good progress on my highest priorities: Rotary Foundation support, and membership development. Total District 5190 contributions to the Annual Programs Fund (APF) now exceed 91 percent of our aggregate goal! Many clubs have already met or exceeded their commitment. Polio giving is also continuing to rise as worldwide cases of this devastating disease have slowed to record low levels. As of this writing, there have been only eleven cases of polio reported in the world since January first. That is a sixty percent reduction from last year at this time. It is especially exciting that there has been only **ONE CASE** reported in Afghanistan!

Rotarians across the District really got busy on membership last month. Because of your efforts, our district doubled its net growth from my last report to you! We are now at 2,507 active members. That is an increase from 26 to 51 new Rotarians in the last month alone.

> It seems like folks are catching "Spring Membership Fever"!!

With only three months left in the Rotary year, it is critical that we intensify our focus on achieving our membership goals. Have a meeting with your membership committee, develop a three month action plan, and don't focus solely on finding new members: implement a new member retention initiative as well. We have to hang on to what we have! Reach out to those members you have not seen in a while, hold a fun Rotary social, and make sure we are delivering on the promise of Rotary. Adjust your membership goals if needed. If every club added just 2 new members between now and the end of June that would be a tremendous accomplishment!

To assist in this effort, I am initiating an effort to refocus and re-Ignite our membership efforts. I am calling it: "Spring Membership Fever!" For the month of April, I want to make an all out push to reach out to bring in new members, and keep all of the folks that are currently on the rolls. For this initiative, your club can score points by inviting visitors to your club meetings (5pts), bringing in new members (25 pts), and implementing an activity designed to attract and retain members (10 pts). The club submitting the highest point total will be this spring's "Red Hot Club" and will be given recognition at the District Conference. Clubs already reporting under the Ignite program will recognize these as they are identical to information they are already tracking!

By far, the majority of clubs have grown and retained membership so far this year. Whether or not your club is struggling with membership issues, this is not a time to slack off on our membership efforts: membership demands constant attention. We simply cannot afford to back off from this issue. We cannot get discouraged and we must not give up: what Rotary provides for your community and the world is just too good to not fight for! Reaching out to someone in your community and inviting them to share this wonderful gift of Rotary Service will not only help us continue to change the world, it will change that person's life forever. And when you change one life, that changed life in turn changes other lives. This is the beginning of another chain reaction of good that will spread like ripples in a pond reaching ever more people, ever more lives. Please, make this the month that you undertake the single most significant act of Rotary Service that any Rotarian can undertake:

Sponsor a new member into YOUR great club!

It's not unusual to be walking in downtown Grass Valley or Nevada City, shopping for groceries, or picking up prescriptions to bump in to a fellow Rotarian from one of the five Clubs in Western Nevada County. With over 250 active Rotarians in the area, the chances are that you'll see a friend on a pretty regular basis.

While the five Clubs have distinct personalities and traditions, members are proud of the fact that they work together in a common cause to serve the community.

Take, for example, the Fairgrounds Rotarians-at-Work project under Scott Spencer (Grass Valley). Last year, Rotarians, family members, and youth groups such as Interact Clubs and Scouts, turned out in large numbers to paint, fix, repair, plant, rake, roof, and provide care for the Nevada County Fairgrounds, one of the true gems of our community. The public attention to this day of service was overwhelming, and this year, because the Fairground's funds are still compromised, we'll do it again.

Or how about our on-going project in Uganda? All five clubs have members who were instrumental in the early years of this project. They and their Clubs provided assistance, funding and equipment for 49er Rotarian Dr. Scott Kellerman's hospital. The clubs continue to provide support for this highly successful project, and plans are now in the works for a nursing school, with involvement of many other Clubs around the district and support from outside of Rotary.

And take a look at some of Rotary's own programs that have a strong tug at the heartstrings and pocketbooks of local Rotarians: Interact, Rotary Youth Exchange, and International projects. Each one of these programs has a Rotarian heading up the joint efforts of all the clubs – Gordon Beatie (49er), Bobbie Swanson (Grass Valley), Yvonne Bartlett (49er).

Dan Halloran (Penn Valley) headed up the District GSE Team to Brazil last year, and this year is coordinating the visit of the inbound team from India.

Our Rotary Eighth Grade Leadership Experience (REGLE) is coordinated with the three Auburn Clubs which make up Area 5, and is headed by Blake Smith (Grass Valley). In its third year this year, we are focused on getting next year's Eighth Graders committed and signed up for an outstanding locally held leadership training and personal growth experience. Our principals are raving about the service these eighth graders are providing to their schools upon their return from REGLE.

The Area 4 Rotary Foundation Dinner held last Fall was chaired by Rotarian Janielle Litton (Nevada County South) and was a great success, focusing support on the Rotary Foundation and honoring new and multiple Paul Harris Fellows, Major Donors, Benefactors and Bequest Society Members. It must be noted that two clubs have been recognized for being Every Rotarian Every Year and 100% Sustaining Member Clubs!

Another interesting feature of our Clubs is that many couples are Rotarians, but may are members of different Clubs. Several couples' work and family schedules are such that attendance and participation in a different Club meeting on a regular basis works for them. For them, in many ways it's like being a member of two different Rotary Clubs!

Two Clubs are morning Clubs (our largest and our smallest Clubs), and three are noon Clubs. And every day of the week is a Rotary meeting day somewhere close, except for Fridays. Each welcomes your visit!

Thanks goes out to our Club Presidents for their great work this year! They are: Tim McCall, Grass Valley; Eric Sams, Nevada County South; Bob Kline, Penn Valley; Lindy Beatie (Nevada City 49er Breakfast); and Dennis Geare, president-elect of Nevada City who took over for Pearce "Terry" Boyer who had to step down part way through the year. We appreciate their dedication and commitment to making Rotary a wonderful and giving part of the Western Nevada County scene.




Tech Corner - Promoting Club Events On the District Website

"I would like to thank Rotary International for its continued efforts to raise money to fight the polio virus in the remaining countries with cases.



This was my dad with polio in 1937, before vaccines and just prior to the accepted use of exercise in the treatment. He lost the use of his left arm and hand. He had to repeat 7th grade two times and graduated high school just after he turned 21 in 1945. He farmed with his dad and owned/operated a garage/gas station in a small town for 30 years in Colusa County, California. He died in 1980 at 56.

Its interesting that as a child I wanted to be like him, handicap and all.

They are just one of the clubs participating in this amazing International Project. And – BOY – have the clubs been having fun with this one!! It all started when President Bernadette Lovato, of the Rotary Club of Bishop Sunrise, got wind of the mission of the Free the Girls Organization in Denver, Colorado: they collect lingerie and send it to Mozambique where there is a huge market for these items. The stock is used to

help young women who have been rescued out of sex slavery. With a supply of lingerie these young women are able to establish their own small businesses, and thereby create new lives for themselves. The Bishop Club dubbed their efforts "Bishop or Bust"! They even made up a logo for the project, incorporating their famous Mule Days theme.

Bernadette has spread the word, and organized collection efforts in many interested 5190 clubs. Her goal: to collect 5,190 bras! The clubs that took on this project will be delivering their "hauls" to the District Conference in May. (Stay tuned – Bernadette will be sending out details on the Free the Girls Conference plans soon.)

So, Kudos to the Nevada City Club: they leaped right on this opportunity ... they had their "bra drive" up and running for Mardi Gras in early February, as you can see. Their parade entry

definitely jump-started their collection efforts, as people threw bras and money to the funloving Rotarians as they danced their way down Main Street.

Here's another GREAT idea, deserving of Kudos ... the Winnemucca Club added a special twist to their project by adding personal letters to their boxes of bras: letters of support for the young women receiving their donations. Way to take it to the next level, Winnemucca!

And Kudos to the Cameron Park Club, too ... they kicked-off their collection efforts by wearing bras to a meeting. (I wonder what the guest speaker thought of that!!) "It was pretty disgusting", laughed club secretary James Buckley.
