

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FROM THE WOODSHED...

Carrying the Torch!

Wow! My travels have begun! I've been looking forward to the start of the 2012-13 Rotary year for a while now and it is everything I dreamed about. Kim and I hit the road and visited eleven clubs last month.

We began with the small but determined Rotary Club of Greenville, then had dinner with the Carson City Sunset Club. We got up with the chickens to see the wonderful things that Truckee Sunrise is doing, were amazed by the Rotaractors of Reno, and ended our second week with lunch at the Rotary Club of Truckee. During week 3, we toured the clubs of Area 6: Pollock Pines-Camino, Georgetown Divide, Cameron Park and Placerville. We finished July with Plymouth-Foothills, and the Jackson Club.

During these visits, the perspective you get on how much impact our clubs have in their community is amazing. When you're with your own club "down in the weeds", working hard on that fundraiser, or service project; involved in club leadership, or committee work, it is difficult to comprehend what your club's contributions truly mean to your community.

Not only do Rotarians roll up their sleeves and contribute directly through their service, but they also partner with other outfits in their community to assist them in doing their work. Kim and I saw clubs financially supporting other organizations, holding joint fundraisers, providing venues, and working side by side on various projects to improve lives, and change the world. Growing strong and vibrant clubs is truly a key aspect of enhancing our ability to continue changing the world. Developing and retaining members has always been a central focus of our leadership training. Every year at the President Elect Training Seminar, and District Assembly, we teach the principles of membership. We hold an annual Membership Seminar (August 25 this year), and spend quality time discussing concepts, and usually hearing some success stories. Successful clubs usually develop a structured and comprehensive membership plan. The plan sets specific action items, and gets members involved on a large scale. Importantly, club leadership holds each other accountable for accomplishing assigned tasks, and follows through.



When I was club president, we grew by a couple of members. However, I never developed and implemented a comprehensive plan. It was a successful year, and I felt good about it. Looking back however, if I had been able to create a plan, and stick to it, I am sure that my club would be larger and more resilient today. I wish we had had the **Ignite** program during my year!

The **Ignite** program provides all the structure that a club needs to put together a great plan. It does this by providing choices so clubs can tailor the plan to suit their particular needs. There are **5 choices for membership development**, and if a club has a better idea, they can choose that one! The important thing here is to choose an approach, and move forward!

The biggest reason Rotary has not grown more in North America, and I suspect this is true in our district, is low rates of retention. **Ignite** addresses retention by breaking it down into three simple **"Tips on Retention**":

1. Every new member (even us "old" members) **needs a friend** in Rotary. Someone to whom she or he can constantly turn to with questions, and who will understand and assist with problems.

2. Every new member **needs an assignment**. Activity in Rotary makes us stronger as Rotarians. Just like the muscles in our bodies, if we use them, we grow stronger! Sometimes we hesitate to assign new members to tasks or committees. They may make some mistakes, but don't we all? The important thing is the growth in Rotary that they will undergo through being engaged. This really goes for all members, not just brand new ones!

3. Every new member must be **nourished in Rotary**. They need to understand that they have joined a worldwide movement dedicated to "service above self", and just exactly what that means. New member

Now we are eagerly awaiting the club visits by

DG Woody and his lovely wife Kim (Woodette). The first DG visit to the Rotaract Club of Reno proved to be moving and uplifting. President Courtney Pino proudly presented to DG Woody a check for just under \$5000.00. This money was the result of the club's fundraisers and was dedicated to the Rotary Foundation Polio Plus account. The biggest project currently is to acquire usable fire equipment for shipment to Argentina. If anyone has access to a C130 please let the club know. To date they received a used fire engine from the Susanville Volunteer Fire Department. On September 22, the Rotaract Club will hold its next fundraiser, their Fifth Annual Wine Tasting and a 9 hole-two man scramble golf tournament. It will be held at the Washoe County Golf Course with golfing at 4 pm and wine tasting and auction set to begin at 6:30 pm.

Shauna Morris is the new President of the Reno Midtown Rotary Club (formally know as New Generations). The club will focus on building academic success, self-esteem, problem solving and team building skills in children in grades K-6. In addition to the elementary school programs, the club supports the Rotary Middle School Leadership program and RYLA at the high school level. Club members feel that it is never too early to start inspiring children, especially those from at risk backgrounds. This Club encourages children to aim higher and learn that they can achieve whatever they put their minds to.

The Rotary Club of Reno Centennial Sunset is a 29 member strong organization with a "big heart" quotes President Joe Musser. Proudly known as a "fun club" they have dedicated their passion to literacy and education for children and young adults both locally and throughout the world. The primary club fundraiser is known as the Taste of Reno Tahoe (TORT). Annually they gather some of the finest restaurants and wineries in Nevada and California for a celebration of "Pairing Good Foods & Wine with Good Works". Through TORT fundraising efforts, the Rotary Club of Reno Centennial Sunset has donated over 3,000 hours of volunteer time and \$85,000 to worthy causes. Well-done Rotarians! Clearly this Rotary Club is a small club with big ideas and bigger executions in their mission of "Service Above Self".

President Greg Krause has taken the helm of the 60-member Rotary Club of Reno Central. The first meeting of the year featured a talk by NCAA Hall of Fame Coach Chris Ault of the University of Nevada Football team. He was extremely optimistic in his outlook for this year as the Wolf Pack moves to the Mountain Athletic Conference. For years Reno Central has sponsored one of the most successful

orientations (some call them "fireside chats") are critical, but only the beginning.

Educating and training members in Rotary is an ongoing process that should never stop. Whether it is attending seminars, leadership training, holding informative club assemblies, or the Rotary Academy, knowledge of Rotary anchors our commitment to the Rotary movement.

Finally, "15+ tips for successful clubs" are laid out, and clubs are asked to select four, then implement one each quarter of the Rotary year. You are not limited to fifteen. As elsewhere in the program, there is space for great ideas from members to be implemented and build success!

In short, the **Ignite** program helps clubs to **focus** their membership efforts, **involves every member**, and develops **commitment** to get the job done. This year my highest priority as District Governor is membership. Our Visionary club presidents have responded with a lofty goal of 10% growth here in 5190 by June 30 next year. My prediction is that we will not only achieve that goal, but exceed it! There is no question in my mind that if all of you focus on implementing the various aspects of the **Ignite** program we will truly light a fire here in District 5190.

From ancient times, the Torchbearers have been the first on the paths of discovery, exploration, and battle; illuminating the way for those who follow. Rotarians, be a Torchbearer: who invites, unites, and **IGNITES** new members whose fire and energy will add to ours and help overcome the darkness of poverty, hunger, illiteracy and disease! It's up to us!

fundraisers in the area, the Margaritaville Crab Feed. This club annually hosts between 700-800 people for a lively event of great food and wonderful silent and live auction items. Beneficiaries include the Boys and Girls Club, AACT (whose students cook for and serve the event), Echo Loder Elementary School, Rotary Middle School Leadership and RYLA, college scholarships and more. A high percentage of the club memberships continue to support the Rotary Foundation as Sustaining Members. It is looking to be an outstanding year ahead for this great group of Rotarians.

The 130-member Rotary Club of Sparks is an extremely active club. President Tim Heydon reports, "Although we support many areas of our community, our main focus of giving is centered on supporting youth". One of the biggest events is the Kids Free Fishing Day. The club stocks the Sparks Marina with thousands of fish and kids receive over 2000 fishing poles and coaching. The club supports literacy

and provides free dictionaries to every 3rd grader in the Washoe County School District. Twelve students attended the 2012 RYLA camp and six students went to the Mason Ortiz outdoor camp. \$8,000 was given in 2012 University scholarships. Annually the club sponsors and hosts a RYE inbound and outbound student. Through the RYE program a young man from Denmark will attend Spanish Springs High School. Sparks Rotary has a partnership with a Rotary Club in Ajijic, Mexico, supports an orphanage in Mexico, and members have visited Mexico to observe the benefits of their international efforts. The club raised nearly \$45,000 from a raffle with a \$10,000 prize. Other small fundraisers keep the membership engaged and provide funding for service projects throughout the year.

The Reno South Rotary Club kicked off its new year with an "expecting" Bodie Monroe as its President. Bodie and his wife gave birth to Eli Parker Monroe on

July 17th. Congratulations! The club's flagship is Most Improved Student (MIS) program. Each year local high schools nominate a male and a female student for this award. The club hosts two luncheons to accommodate the students, parents, guardians, counselors, and teachers. In very moving presentations each student tells often heart wrenching and inspirational stories of overcoming life challenges. Each student is awarded \$100 and one boy and one girl from each luncheon an additional \$100.00 scholarship. Last year the Club awarded \$9000.00 in scholarship assistance and their goal is to provide multiple 4-year scholarships. The inaugural MIS Banquet raised \$13,000.00 for the program. Other service projects include building and maintaining Robin Hood Park, maintaining an active presence at Anderson Elementary School as a Partner in Education, and Project Amigo in Colima Mexico.

President Tom Tucker reports that the Reno Sunrise Rotary Club began the new Rotary year by supporting NGE inbound attorney Aurio from Brazil. Reno Sunrise is also working diligently on its Edible Pedal major fundraiser. This bike ride (not

a race) will be held on September 18th and over 250 riders are currently signed up to participate. Funds from the bike ride support culinary programs at Douglas High School, Carson High School, and the Washoe County School District with AACT. The club also contributed more than \$16,000 to Reno High School, Washoe County Amateur Radio Emergency, Carson City 4-H, Lake Tahoe Back Country Bike Patrol, Tahoe Pyramid Bikeway, and the Urban Roots Garden Classrooms.

President Andy Flock and the Sparks Centennial Sunrise Rotary Club began their first meeting of the year on a high note. Members of the Silver Dollar Chorus

Demolition began May 5th and work continued steadily through the 4th of July. The library opened for business July 9th and the Grand Opening and ribbon cutting ceremony was July 19th.


