into arguably the world's premier international service organization, international understanding, good will and the resulting peace have become a major focus of our organization. It only makes sense that as we put "humanity in motion" in our service around the world alleviating hunger, and disease, fighting illiteracy, providing clean water and much needed sanitation; all actions which foster peace and understanding at the common man's level, we need also to be involved in promoting peace and understanding within the ranks of those who are in key political, leadership, and influential positions in the world. That's where the Rotary Peace Fellows come into play.

The Rotary Foundation program known as "International Studies in Peace and Conflict Resolution" delivered at 6 universities around the world, is a scholarship program for students desiring advanced study and degrees in international studies centering around peace and conflict resolution. Rotary Peace Fellows are leaders promoting national and international cooperation, peace, and the successful resolution of conflict throughout their lives, in their careers, and in service activities. Peace Fellows are chosen from countries around the globe based on their ability to have a significant positive impact on world peace and conflict resolution during their careers.

District 5190, I am proud to say, is a 2011-2012 Peacebuilder District, one of 43 (out of 534) districts in the world that sees this as an important program. A Peacebuilder District is one that annually supports a Rotary Peace Fellow with a minimum of \$25,000 from District Designated Funds (DDF). This is only one of many programs of the Rotary Foundation that utilize a districts DDF, that 50% of donations to the Annual Programs Fund that comes back to the districts after a 3 year investment by the Foundation. I cannot imagine a clearer picture of the value and importance of our individual and club support of TRF. Many of the Foundation programs administered by the districts: Group Study Exchange, Peace Fellows, Matching Grants, and District Simplified Grants, lend themselves to advancing world understanding. "World Understanding Month", therefore is an appropriate time to consider how we Rotarians and Rotary clubs can best lend our financial support to the Foundation. As the pages of the calendar flip over ever faster during the latter half of the Rotary year we need to do a check-up on

our giving and how it currently measures up to our goal for the year. Remember the mission of the Rotary Foundation "...to enable Rotarians to advance *world understanding*, goodwill, and peace through the improvement of health, the support of education, and the alleviation of poverty."

Last year's event brought a great response, generating \$400 per member to Polio Plus.


Veteran's Guest House Receives Donation

Rotary Receives 2.5 Million United Airlines Miles For Humanitarian Projects

Rotary earned second place in the giveaway, rising from 18th place due to a huge last minute effort through social media to get enough votes. Shriners came in first.

What seemed like a huge undertaking, the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation's \$200,000,000 challenge in funding for polio eradication has been met! The Gates Foundation's \$355,000,000 in challenge grants is now adding another \$50,000,000 to extend their partnership with Rotary.



"In recognition of Rotary's great work, and to inspire Rotarians in the future, the [Gates] foundation is committing an additional \$50 million to extend our partner-

ship," said Jeff Raikes, chief executive officer of the Gates Foundation. "Rotary started the global fight against polio, and continues to set the tone for private fundraising, grassroots engagement, and maintaining polio at the top of the agenda with key policymakers."
