World peace through enhanced world understanding

Greetings fellow Rotarians! WOW - January just flew by. I would have liked a few warmer days. The

thermometer at my place hovered around zero, barely climbing to the low teens in the middle of the day for most of the month. Despite the low temperatures, Kim and I recovered from the Christmas and New Year's holidays, and began our midyear visits. This year I am "tag-teaming" these visits with District Governor Elect, Vicki. We got off to a great start in Area 2 with the Presidents, and President Elects of the Loyalton, Portola, Quincy, and Greenville clubs. We polished January off with midyear



visits to Area 13 in Bishop, Area 3 in Truckee, Area 10 in Fallon and Area 9 in South Lake Tahoe. These visits are a great opportunity for clubs to refocus and regroup to make the final push for the year. At the same time, I am seeing the Presidents Elect getting excited and energized about carrying forward into our next Rotary year come July 1st. Watching this continuity of leadership build in our clubs is truly gratifying.

February is "World Understanding month." This month is a time to focus our energy on the 4th part of our purpose as Rotarians: promoting "the advancement of international understanding,

goodwill, and peace." February 23rd is also the day that a lonely young attorney in Chicago named Paul Harris began the Rotary movement. I am sure that very few people noticed that meeting at the time: just four businessmen coming together for an evening of fellowship. That small meeting, 108 years ago began a chain reaction of good. Today we see the result as a global movement of people committed in large part to the aim of world peace. We celebrate our birthday as "World Understanding and Peace Day," underscoring the importance of this part of our "mission" as Rotarians.

As I reflect on this core goal of our organization, I am amazed by the sheer audacity of this undertaking. We, as Rotarians, are out to affect change on a global level through simple individual acts of service and goodwill. We are not a government, we have no military might, and yet we undertake to bring peace to an entire planet so troubled by ethnic conflict, terrorist attacks, and civil strife. Well, we are not a government, and perhaps that is our greatest advantage.

I am sure all of us embrace the concept that enhancing understanding between individuals from different countries across the globe has a positive effect on the prospect of world peace. After all, understanding is the cornerstone for developing friendships. Friendships are defined by honesty, mutual compassion, trust, and reciprocity. Friends may fight at times, but they rarely go to war.

Rotary has long dedicated resources and focus to programs like Ambassadorial Scholarships, Group Study Exchange, and Youth Exchange. These programs are not designed to bring an immediate return, they are meant for the long haul. This year's theme: "Peace Through Service" clarifies for me how we as Rotarians will achieve world peace. The service of Rotarians over the last 108 years has

not just had an additive effect. In fact, our service multiplies exponentially through time and space. This is because when just one life is improved through an act of service that life in turn affects the lives of others in a positive way. Each of those additional lives are made more whole, and more satisfied, and they in turn spread that peace to more and more lives, on and on like ripples in a pond ... ripples that may never stop.



We are a diverse area. Three clubs are located along Highway 50 and the 4th in the mountains between Highways 50 and 80. Our memberships range from 61 to 16 and the spirit of Rotary is more than alive and well in every club. It is a pleasure for me to serve and support the dynamic Clubs of Area 6.

Placerville Rotary is hosting its 40th annual Bon Voyage Ball at the El Dorado County fairgrounds on March 23rd. The Ball is one of Placerville's two large

fundraisers. Dozens of cases of wine are raffled off in a "Mountain of Wine" and 50/50 tickets are used for Polio Plus. The majority of the proceeds are going to the completion of renovations on the beautiful Rotary Park. Rotary Park has been host to Little League games since 1971, and Placerville Rotary has recently added ADA parking, concrete walkways, handrails, and remodeled bathrooms. The funds this year will go toward new snack bar equipment and better lighting for the field and the playground equipment.

Cameron Park Rotary reports: On December 21st, Rotarians picked up 51 refurbished bikes from Folsom Prison for distribution to local school children in time for the Holidays. The Bike program is a joint effort between Folsom Prison, Cameron Park Rotary and the Ponderosa High School Interact Club.

In December we completed an educational solar system to compliment The Cameron Park Rotary Observatory at Folsom Lake College. This solar system is a working system that will provide power and a working model for students to observe and learn about. This was a joint effort between the Rotary Clubs of Cameron Park, the Rotary Club of Placerville, and SolarHut, LLC.

We are planning a Peace Forum on February 23rd from 12:30 to 4:00 at the Cameron Park CSD at 2502 Country Club Drive, Cameron Park, to mark the 108th Anniversary of Rotary. Our Peace Forum is called "The Power of One." DG Woody Willbanks will be opening the Peace Forum. We will be featuring 2 panel discussions and a keynote speaker, Emily Jonas an Ambassador and Response Team Member for Shelter Box International. This is a FREE event that will show how Rotary International and the Rotary Club of Cameron Park is committed to service above self and the opportunities everyone has to become involved in creating Peace.

Currently, we are working on an International project that consists of developing a new shelter for traveling indigenous people in Cartago, Costa Rica. We have committed funds and are being led by PDG Bob Dorr and Jim Buckley. They are making presentations to other clubs and have had several clubs commit to funding as well.

Georgetown, chartered in 1948, is located on the Georgetown Divide and has a rich mining history. The Georgetown Divide is a destination for equestrians, boaters, fishermen, and jeepers tackling the world famous Rubicon Trail.

Under the leadership of Club President Garland Windle the Club has grown to a record 37 members who are involved in restoration of historic mining equipment and assisting in community service projects such as providing dictionaries to elementary school kids, Rotary Eight Grade Leadership, a Kid's Fishing Derby in June, Safe Halloween, Sober Graduation and a Santa Visit Program in December.

Fund raisers include a BBQ and Street Dance in June, Margarita Booth at the County Fair in June, Hamburger Booth at Founder's Day in September, an Auction in November and a Crab Feed in February of each year.

The Pollock Pines~Camino Rotary Club continues to do great things on the Western slope! Pollock Pines~Camino Rotary encompasses two small but vibrant communities that include the ever famous Apple Hill of Camino to the outdoor recreation mecca of Pollock Pines. Currently the club has a 16 member roster. But do those members work!

Rotary is more than alive and well in every club in Area 6

The club provides dictionaries to third graders in six school districts, including two one room schools. Additionally the club has funded several mini-grants that have supported Christmas dinners and shopping trips for local seniors, agricultural projects at the local high school, band instruments, classroom technology and classroom books. Starting in April the club runs the local flea market which runs through the late fall.

The club is now preparing for its second annual "Strikes for Scholars" fund raiser at the local bowling alley. This fundraiser pits teams from local schools and businesses against each other as we raise funds to benefit students and the community.

This year marks the second year that our sponsored Interact clubs have hosted a monthly pancake breakfast, serving warm and tasty food even when the outside temperature hovers around 17 degrees.

The club, while typically an early morning meeting group, has also started an evening meeting at the Forrester restaurant in Camino on the $3^{\rm rd}$ Tuesday of each month. The evening meeting provides us an opportunity to fellowship with a great meal and special speakers.

In the planning stages is a ½ marathon and 10K trail race "The Pony Express half" that will have its inaugural run in the fall around the shores of Jenkinson Lake. In short, the Pollock Pines~Camino Rotary lives by the phrase "small but mighty" and continues to serve both communities in a variety of ways.

Calling USS Rotary Enterprise – Hey Woody beam me up I have some news about Area 10! WOW – Look at all the windows! Woody, see that mountain down there with all the mines? That's Tonopah, home of the Tonopah Rotary Club. Amy is in her second term as President and has done a fantastic job. They only have 21 members, but they

have an enthusiastic commitment to the Rotary motto "Service Above Self." They are the second oldest club in 5190 and will celebrate their 90th anniversary next year! They even moved back to the historic Mizpah for their meetings. Last spring the club

participated in a town cleanup day, swept sidewalks, washed windows, hauled trash, pulled weeds, and just pitched in to make downtown shine. They had their annual Father's Day Kids Fishing Derby at Rotary Park. In October, Tonopah hosted Area 10 Foundation Dinner. It was a ghoulish evening with Halloween costumes and guest speaker, Dr. Michael Murphy, the Clark County Coroner. Dr. Murphy spoke on "Keeping Positive in a Negative World." Left over meals were auctioned off and the monies from each meal went to many of their community funds. The Purple Pinky Booth netted a nice profit for their Polio Fund. Their next "big" event is February 2nd and is named "Texas Hold 'Em Poker Tournament."

See that valley down there with all the fields and Naval Air Base? That is Lahontan Valley and the home of Fallon Rotary Club. Mel Foremaster is the President. They sponsored a Golf Tournament which raised \$5,423 towards Rotary's Relay for Life Team. They raised a total of \$13,467 for the Fallon Event. In July, Barb and Andy were in Fallon to introduce the Ignite Program and by November was a Premier Club! They sent 5 eighth graders to Eighth Grade Leadership program. Fallon's Annual Lobster Feed was held at the Churchill Vineyards. They had over 120 people. In November they held their Annual Foundation Dinner, "The Redneck Luau." It raised \$6,507 for the Foundation, and gave \$1,000 to Polio Plus in honor of their guest speaker, Al Frumkin. They received a DSG and were able to donate \$4,000 to the purchase of a new commercial oven for the Churchill County Senior Center. They also commit monthly to "Fallon Daily Bread," a community service started by them. So if you are in Fallon on the third Thursday stop in and help them. They are the parents of a Rotary Satellite Club.

See that town down there with the freeway and all the industrial area? That's Fernley, home of the Fernley Rotary Club. President Brian Roberts is doing a great job! They are very active in many community activities. At Thanksgiving they worked with the Lions Club to feed the homeless and hungry in Fernley. They served over 350 people and also provided these meals to the "Meals on Wheels" program. They collected over 180 gifts for Fernley's "Toys for Christmas" program. They just completed their "Sweepstakes" fund raiser, and netted \$3,800. Have you heard about the Fernley Rotary Club's Backpack Program? Every week they prepare backpacks for needy children at Fernley schools to take home for the weekend. They are full of healthy meals because some of these children would not eat on the weekends. Right now they prepare 161 backpacks a week. They also hold a golf tournament every summer and a lot of the proceeds go to benefit the Fernley Boys and Girls Club.

and for all. It is a window of opportunity of historic proportions.



Final Future Vision Grant Management Seminars

The next Grant Management Seminar (GMS) will be held Saturday afternoon, February 9th, 2:00 - 5:00 p.m. in conjunction with the afternoon session of Pre-PETS. Location will be the Atlantis Casino Resort and Spa in Reno. All current club Presidents, Presidents Elect and Foundation chairs are asked to participate in this training before May 1st, which is the first date grant applications for new 2013-14 Rotary year will be accepted.

The last GMS for this Rotary year will be held on Friday afternoon April 19th from 1:30 to 4:30 also at the Atlantis in Reno. This is the afternoon just prior to the district's annual Paul Harris Society Dinner and Saturday's District Assembly.

Rotarians can go to our district website to register. All clubs must be qualified (have attended the GMS) <u>prior</u> to applying for a TRF funded grant after 1 July 2013. Currently, 36 of our 58 clubs are already qualified and most of the remaining 22 clubs only need one of their required three club leaders to attend to become fully qualified.

RYLA Rocks

Plans for RYLA 2013 are off to a rousing start with nearly 240 reservations already, or soon to be, in place. The popular camp, which is adding a 3rd week (mid July) to the 2 sessions annually held in June at Grizzly Peak Camp in Portola, CA opens the door to more students than ever before.

Last year the two June camps maxed out at 120 students per camp and a decision was made that that was just a few too many. So the goal this year is to fill 3 camps with approximately 90 students in each camp.

Attendance over the last several years has been steadily increasing and it looks likely at this point that the new goal of 270 total students will be easily reached.

In just a few weeks clubs will begin the process of identifying students for Camps 1-3.

The 2012 program consisted of:

- structured working sessions on making choices, selfunderstanding, teamwork, resolving conflicts and ethical behavior;
- a community service project to give the students a sense of the importance and the benefits that come from helping others;
- leadership skills to equip them individually with the skills they will need in leadership positions in high school and beyond; and
- creating the nucleus of a leadership group in their present school to be a focal point for the remainder of the school year.



Changes made on ClubRunner flow up to Rotary International, Changes made at Rotary International do not flow down to ClubRunner Since the District is using ClubRunner for member information (names, addresses, email addresses, etc.) always make changes on ClubRunner.

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Our outbound Group Study Exchange (GSE) team is currently in district 3150, centered in Hyderabad, India. They left Reno on Jan uary 26th and arrived in Hyderabad the next day at 2:50 AM!

Chesa Keane, RC of Reno Centennial Sunset, is the team leader. She was a member of the GSE team to Utter Pradesh in 1995. She owns a computer/IT consultancy company.

This is an all female team. Kelli Seals and Kelley Glogovac are residents of the Truckee Meadows. Kelli works for the Washoe District Health Department as a Health Educator. Kelley is the manager of PJ's restaurant on Wells Ave... Katie Long is a Vector Control Technician for the Placer County Mosquito and Vector Control Agency. Shelley Drievold is a Marketing Assistant for the Sierra Nevada Memorial Hospital in Grass Valley.

Group Study Exchange is partially funded by The Rotary Foundation and has been in existence for 30 years. The one month exchange includes vocational visits, cultural experiences and many Rotary contacts. Team members are hosted by local Rotarians and make presentations to Rotary clubs in D-3150.

In April the GSE team from India will arrive in our district for their month stay. Both teams plus last year's outbound team to Brazil will report on Friday afternoon, May 17th at the district conference.

"Now more than ever, the world must be absolute in its resolve to eradicate polio," the Board said in a statement. "If the right things are done and commitment remains high, it will happen." Confirming that polio eradication must be seen through to completion, the Board
