

HAPPY BIRTHDAY ROTARY!

February 23rd, 2015 will be Rotary's 110th Birthday!

The Mission of Rotary International states "We provide service to others, promote integrity, and advance world understanding, goodwill and peace through our fellowship of business, professional and community leaders". And so it is appropriate that World Understanding Month be the theme while celebrating our amazing organization's Birthday.

As Rotarians how are we advancing world understanding, goodwill and peace? Let's look at a few ways.

Thru our Rotary Youth Exchange program, each year approximately 25 teenagers from District 5190 experience a year abroad while the equivalent number attend classes here in our local schools. If you've sent a child to another country, hosted an exchange student, served on the RYE committee or just interacted with these kids you know the significant impact of this program.

Over the years 100's of District 5190 Rotarians have participated in International Service Projects. They have provided dental and medical care, clean water and sanitation, have taught the illiterate to read and write, supported orphanages, fought disease, provided mobility and dignity by the gift of wheelchairs and been emergency responders in disasters (and much, much more).

Have you ever had your pinkie painted purple, contributed to Polio Plus or participated in a National Immunization Day? Our effort to eradicate Polio worldwide has prevented over 10 million cases of paralysis while building international relationships united in a common cause.

Did you know 49 Rotarians where among those that drafted the original United Nations Charter in 1945? To this day Rotary is at the table contributing on all U.N. Humanitarian issues. (Please see the article on the U.N. in this newsletter).

Last month we talked about Aimal, a District 5190 Peace Scholar who will be studying at the University of Bradford. The Rotary Peace Scholar program started in 2002 offering advanced curriculum in International Studies, Peace and Conflict Resolution. There are now over 600 Peace Center Alumni working across the globe making a difference.

And there is even more...

There are Global Scholarships, and have been Ambassadorial Scholars and Group Study Exchanges, all fostering world understanding, goodwill and peace.

Our international conventions are a great way to experience the world wide scope of Rotary. Interacting with likeminded individuals from 200 countries and territories provides tremendous inspiration, as you hear how Rotarians are helping the world.

Some Rotarians feel the needs in their own communities are so great that their focus in service should be at home. And perhaps it should be as local needs can be substantial. As a member of our great international organization however, we also have the opportunity to have a global impact in bringing the world together.

Paul Harris believed the path to peace was walked one step at a time, one person at a time. As a dues paying Rotarian and a supporter of our Rotary Foundation you have made each one of these programs possible. FROM THE PRESIDENT'S CLUB CAR

Partnering Divides the Task and Multiplies the Success

Students and teachers in Cape Town, South Africa have been given the gift of knowledge through training and improved opportunities to share knowledge. Rotarians from the Rotary Clubs of Wynberg, South Africa, Alturas Sunrise and Tahoe-Incline formed an international partnership in response to real needs of the Isihiwo Primary School. Together they were awarded a Global Grant for teacher training and to enlarge the existing computer centre.



TEACHER TRAINING

Wynberg Rotary Club (WRC) through continued involvement discovered that although the teachers were trained on paper, there was a huge gap in their knowledge and understanding. An Early Childhood Development specialist was sent into the classrooms to assess the teachers. The diagnosis was that there was a huge need for additional training. The specialist also advised that there was more value to train teachers from several schools at one time. The training was extended to several schools in the general area of the Isiphiwo Primary School.

This training has been completed and focussed on subjects such as: daily routine, classroom management, management of curriculum, life skills, maths, literacy, behavior and discipline, assessment, report writing, managing the outdoor area and training in how to use resources indoors and outdoors. This was topped off with a visit by all the teachers to a well-run and established facility from which they all learned a lot.

COMPUTER CENTRE

Isiphiwo had 30 computers which were over 10 years old to service nearly 1,200 children and 36 staff members. This meant that children had to share computers during some classes as their class sizes average 36 in number. This also meant students only had 30 minutes a week of exposure to computers.

Thanks to Rotary eighty new computers will be installed in the enlarged computer centre which will allow each child about 90 minutes a week of computer use. This also opens up the way to install 10 computers in the library where there were previously none for research purposes.

Once the new centre is up and running new software will be investigated for more interactive projects in different subjects without negating the role of the teacher. This also opens up a huge number of other possibilities including engaging with the community. Cabling has also been laid to allow for further developments in the centre for other forms of multimedia in the future.

We have allowed the staff to dream big, but said one step at a time and to show proper and full utilization first. We have every confidence of this computer/ media centre being a showcase in an area of dire



poverty and one of the highest population densities in the whole metropole of Cape Town.

After a long year of hurdles we are nearly there. School has started again and the students curiosity has been overwhelming. We eagerly await the first day that we can allow the children in to see and experience the new computers and centre.

p2 + 70 = DECADES OF PARTNERING IN POSITIVITY

This past November 1300 Rotarians from around the globe trekked by air, ground, and foot to the United Nations Headquarters in New York City. They came to participate in Rotary International UN Days, a day dedicated to inspiring and educating participants as well as providing insight into the relationship of Rotary International and the UN.

Rotary's relationship with the United Nations dates back to 1945 when some 49 Rotary members acted as delegates, advisors and consultants at the United Nations Charter Conference. Today, Rotary holds the highest consultative status possible with the United Nations as a nongovernmental organization.

In a zesty five-minute call to action, Former RI General Secretary Ed Futa, rallied the crowd. He spoke about peace and polio (thus the "P2"), and of topics dealing with complex issues of water, economic development, human trafficking, and women's health. Futa moved the listeners to their feet as he introduced RI President Gary Huang.

In his key note speech, President Gary stated, "In a way, we are a mini United Nations. We are the united clubs of Rotary, with a common ground of service." He also noted the anniversaries we will celebrate this year: 110 years for Rotary International and 70 years for the United Nations. Imagine what the RI - UN partnership will do in the next 70 years!





They must fill out the student's application and submit it to their local Rotary club for sponsorship. The deadline for the District Scholarship application is April 15, 2015 for funding for the September 2015 beginning school year.

90TH BIRTHDAY BASH

On March 16, 2015, Rotary of Grass Valley will hold an evening celebration of their 90th birthday at the Holiday Express Gold Miner's Inn in Grass Valley. The first meeting of the Rotary Club of Grass Valley was held on the evening of Tuesday, January 13, 1925 at the Bret Harte Inn. The Rotary Club of Auburn sponsored the organizing of the club. Officers were elected at the first meeting and Thomas Ingram was the first President of this club. In more modern times his granddaughter, Patricia Ingram Spencer served as President as well.

The club was officially admitted to membership in Rotary International on March 16, 1925, and the Charter Celebration was held April 13th, 1925 at the Elks Lodge in Grass Valley with 500 people in attendance. The club has gone on to sponsor the Nevada City Rotary in 1935, and Penn Valley in 1993. In addition they helped with the sponsoring of the Nevada County South club. The club has been honored to have 4 District Governors in their membership over the years, which were Gordon D. Moyer, Kenneth J. Casper and in more recent years, Charles "Chuck" Elizondo and Wyn Spiller both well known in the district and beyond.

The club has been known for many important projects in Western Nevada County as well as assisting in International Projects over the many years.

Foundation Tip

Good to Know - Updated Funding Model for a Global Grant

Annual Fund: primary source of funding for a broad range of local and international activities.

World Fund: highest priority activities around the globe.

District Designated Fund: pays for Foundation, club, and district projects that club and others in the district choose.

Endowment Fund: ensures long-term viability of the Foundation and grants programs.

Global grants funded with District Designated Funds (DDF) are matched 100 percent by the World Fund, but cash contributions are matched at 50 percent. Also, the processing time for grants funded with DDF is shorter than for grants involving cash. So, your project will be able to install more water wells more quickly if it's funded entirely with DDF.
