Just think it's a New Year but we still have 6 months left in our Rotary Year. January is Rotary Awareness month, a great time to think about what that means to your community and your club. It's a time for us to see what we can do for Rotary and what Rotary can do for us. Giving to the Rotary Foundation helps on both sides, giving and receiving. Earlier this month I asked each Area 10 club what Awareness means to them and a little about their year so far.

The Fernley Club has been very active. They recently received 2 generous donations for their Backpack for Kids Program. This program provides weekend food supplies to 145 Fernley students every weekend. They had their Annual Golf Tournament in July which provides funding for the Backpack program and the Boys and Girls Club of Fernley. So far this year they have been visible in their community by sponsoring a Little League team, having floats in their July 4th and Christmas parades, distributed dictionaries to 3rd graders, and put Polio Plus jars in over 30 business in Fernley. They are also working on starting an Interact Club.

Since then the club has enjoyed several outstanding speakers at their Tuesday lunch meetings. Their main project this fall has been fund raising for the Rotary Foundation, the main event being the hosting club for the Area 10 Foundation Dinner. The keynote speaker was Deepa Willingham. Deepa addressed extreme poverty in the world and the Rotary Foundation's efforts to make a difference. The dinner was well attended and included

Also visible were the Fallon Soroptimists, Women in Education, PEO and the American Association of University Women. The evening ended with both a live and silent auction, which raised the clubs Foundation goals for the year. They are also hosting Area 10's Speech and Music Contest.

Tonopah this year has inducted 5 new members and have more looking to join. Their traditional event which really raises awareness of Rotary is their Annual Fathers Day Fishing Derby at Sportsman's Park. The Rotary club adopted the park and has made many improvements over the years...picnic tables, shade trees, bathrooms, and well pumps. In 2010 they developed a relationship with Change the World With Love, a non-profit organization which has been working in a small village in Mali called Nana Kaneiba to bring better healthcare and educational opportunities. In November they held a Magic Show which featured a Magician/Comedian from L.A. The event sold out and they made enough money to give \$2000.00 for the school in Mali, \$500.00 for a school in Ghana, \$500.00 for Polio Plus, and enough to send 2 youth to RYLA. The event was a huge success which raised awareness of what the Rotary Club of Tonopah does both locally and internationally. The Rotary Club of Tonopah is very active in the local community. Although we like to build awareness of Rotary in Tonopah, "we don't feel like it is always necessary to be recognized for our service, Rotarians often jump to help people because they are compassionate to embrace humanity."

The Rotary Club of Smith Valley has been active keeping everybody aware of Rotary so far this year. 2 of the functions they put on have been going for almost 45 years. In August it was the Annual Lamb Feed and in October it was the Annual Rotary Fun Days. Each was a great success. They are working on their annual Spring Brunch and Dessert Auction coming in May. In this small community they are visible donating to the Dressler Park and the S.V. Community Hall. They sponsored the S.V. Junior Rodeo, donated to the area 4-H kids trip to Washington D.C., and Dictionaries for 3RD graders. Their Annual 1ST Grade Christmas Party has been around for over 55 years.

This is slated to be done in a big way in February in the Reno area with a great number of the hotels and businesses with electronic marketing screens agreeing to continually cycle the End Polio Now and Rotary logo through their media presentations on Rotary's birthday, February 23rd. In the interim, clubs can actively address Rotary awareness in each of their own communities through local media usage to share what Rotary is accomplishing locally and internationally. Additionally, awareness of Rotary opportunities can be shared at club meetings by individual Rotarians who have had special Rotary experiences that have made an impact on their personal lives. Lest our lives in Rotary become a little dull or fuzzy, we need to be refreshed about the good Rotary does in, "...transforming the world, one life, one family, one community at a time".

I would like to end this month's article by saying how much I appreciate what RI President Kalyan Banerjee has shared in a number of his speeches. Banerjee reminds us of the challenging words of Mahatma Ghandi, "Be the change you want to see in the world". Banerjee also reminds us that peace begins in the home, in our own lives, and in our outreach. We each have a responsibility to make this world a better place. One of the things this



ROTARY CLUB OF JACKSON COMPLETES FOUNDATION HAT TRICK

As of December 13, 2011 the Rotary Club of Jackson has completed a Rotary Foundation Hat Trick with every member reaching EREY status, Sustaining Member status and achieving Paul Harris status. This is the first time in the Club's history that all three have been achieved in a single year. Initially Foundation Chairman Patrick Crew and President John Sullivan set the Club's Foundation goal at achieving EREY status for every member. As the year progressed they established a stretch goal of every member achieving Sustaining Member status. Finally they established a super stretch goal of every member achieving Paul Harris status. As part of the Club's efforts to achieve Sustaining Member status Pat Crew created commemorative Sustaining Member wine glasses which were awarded to individual members when they reached that goal. Enthusiasm built and the 100% goal was achieved. The Club started Foundation Month early emphasizing the \$2 for \$1 program that the Rotary Foundation had for Polio Plus at the end of October. The Club used Recognition Points to make it \$4 for \$1 for those working on their Paul Harris level one. Again the 100% goal was achieved. In addition, the Club has met its Annual Programs Fund and Polio Plus goals for the year.

A Life of Service

Gold Country Rotarian, Alan Young, has given his life to the service of others. As a firefighter, he has saved lives. As a consultant on natural disaster rescue and recovery missions, he has helped families to start anew. And as a Rotarian he has rolled-up his sleeves to support his community and give a helping hand to those who need it most.

Philosophically at least, Alan hasn't strayed far from his roots. He was born November 1946 in Bryn Mawr, Pennsylvania, just outside Villanova, best known for Villanova University. The University's motto is 'learn to think critically, act compassionately, and succeed while serving others', which are principles Alan has lived by.

Alan's father was a career military officer, serving in the Navy during WWII, and later the Air Force. Typical of the military brat lifestyle, Alan moved around a lot, including three years in France from ages seven to ten. His family was one of the first American military families to live in Bordeaux, France after WWII. Alan recalls, "Cyclists in the Tour de France rode on the cobbled streets just outside our house." Alan would later move back to Pennsylvania to live with grandparents who could provide the young lad with a more stable environment.

Alan began his firefighter career at age eighteen, working for the Citrus Heights (now Metro) Fire Department. Alan left fire service temporarily to serve in the military, including two tours of duty in Viet Nam as a Marine Sergeant. Returning to civilian life in August 1971, Alan joined the McClellan Fire Department, and later the Sacramento Fire Department where he retired as Assistant Fire Chief in 2002. As if firefighting weren't enough, Alan also took on a part-time job instructing students on fire management and safety at American River College.

Alan describes the firefighter community as a large extended family. "I worked with the same people doing the same job for thirty years, and we're still close friends to this day. We watched our kids grow-up and shared family functions. We shared our lives. That's why the fire service is so different than a regular job."

In 1975, just ten years after starting the job, Alan received the highest honor given by firefighters to firefighters – the California State Firefighters' Association Valor Award. "We had a fire next door to our house when I was offduty. I took four people out of the burning building, and I was able to save them all."

Alan is now semi-retired. As needed, he's called upon to consult on rescue and recovery operations for James Lee Witt who was FEMA Director under Bill Clinton. Assignments have included recovery operations following the Haiti earthquake; work in Biloxi, Mississippi after Hurricane Katrina; fire investigations in Chicago high-rise buildings; and various projects in California. "My main mission in Haiti was to help people get closure." Alan recalls a gentleman from Columbia who was separated from his new bride during the quake and spent weeks trying to find her. Alan's team found her remains among the debris of a hotel that had collapsed, and they were able to identify her. "I helped him get closure after the frustration of waiting so long to find her. That was very rewarding after all that tragedy."

This past summer Alan suffered a serious illness and says he was reminded again of the importance of a good attitude and a strong support system. "Rotary people were so good to me. It's incredible how much strength you can get from people concerned about your well-being."

Given Alan's background, it was no surprise to anyone that he was asked to become a representative of Shelter-Box, a disaster relief organization that both he and Jeanette Bullock (also a representative) are very passionate about. That was in 2009. To date, Auburn Rotary Clubs and other local service organizations have donated twenty-one shelter boxes at a cost of \$1,000 each.

Alan's other passion is kids. Since joining Gold Country Rotary in 2003, Alan managed the club's college scholar-

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ship program for four years, and the speech contest for two years. Last year Alan established the "Bootstrap" award. It's given to a graduating high school senior who, in spite of adversity, accomplished their goals through hard work and perseverance. "There are a lot of kids that don't get an opportunity for a helping hand. The bootstrap award is there to help them move forward." Asked why he joined Rotary, Alan says "I wanted to be a member of a service group who gave back to the community. My sponsor, Jimmy Mullenix, asked if I wanted to join Rotary. I had a little knowledge as my daughter Amy was in Rotaract, and a RYLA participant."

Alan and wife Lindy moved to Auburn over 30 years ago when Amy was just seven. These days Alan loves spending time with his two grandchildren, Maggie who is four and a half, and Seamus Patrick who will be two in April. "Maggie, Seamus, and I spent the day playing in the leaves. Burying each other, running through them, and throwing them in the air."

Family is at the heart of everything Alan does, whether it's his immediate family, his family of firefighters and rescue workers, or his Rotary family. Family has been a primary source of strength and inspiration, and indeed Alan's starting point to serving others. Which brings to mind RI President Kalyan Banerjee's challenge to "unhesitatingly and unflinchingly encircle the world to embrace humanity." It seems that Alan Young has made one heckava good start!

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Top Five Stories of 2011

Logging onto www.rotary.org this week will get you a wealth of information including a story on the top five stories to hit in 2011. Here is their story:

- 1. **Tsunami Hits Japan** The Rotary Foundation established the Rotary Japan 2011 Disaster Recovery Fund which has raised almost \$6,000,000 for long-term recovery projects. The fund is being administered by a committee of local Rotarians who are identifying needs and have already completed 10 projects with \$400,000 of the fund.
- 2. **RI Theme** RI President Banerjee unveiled the 2011-12 RI theme "Reach Within to Embrace Humanity." At the International Assembly in January he urged those in attendance to harness their inner strength to achieve success in Rotary.
- 3. The Fight Against Polio India saw only one case of Polio from January to December in 2011. This puts the world so close to seeing the end of the disease. Bill Gates praised Rotary for its success in the campaign to eradicate Polio and urged Rotarians to redouble their efforts to keep the disease from spreading. The 4 countries that saw a case (or more) of polio this year match the initials PAIN: Pakistan, Afghanistan, India and Nepal.
- 4. **2011 RI Convention** More than 16,000 Rotarians (and many of them from D5190) attended the annual convention in New Orleans, LA. Many of those attending participating in service projects helping families still recovering from 2005's Hurricane Katrina.

5. Strategic Partnerships The Rotary Foundation Board of Trustees approved 4 strategic partnerships in 2011. They will help Rotary broaden its impact in the areas of focus by offering service opportunities for Rotarians through packaged global grants. 1) Vocational training teams to enhance the clinical and administrative skills of health educators at the Aga Khan University campuses in Kenya, Tanzania, and Uganda. 2) Teaming with UNESCO-IHE Institute for Water Education to train scientists and engineers to solve problems related to water and sanitation, particularly in developing countries. 3) Working with Oikocredit International to advance community and economic development through the Netherlands-based cooperative's network of microfinance institutions. 4) Partnering with Mercy Ships to enable clubs to get involved in improving health care services in West Africa.
