Taking Time to Become a Rotarian

Nearing the end of my presidency, I’ve realized that I have spent a lifetime becoming a Rotarian. As a child my Father named me “Busybeth”. Being the youngest of four children I was always one step behind my brothers and sister. I may have been “the baby”, but that didn’t stop me from working hard, playing harder, and having fun with my siblings. Hum, I detect the qualities of a Rotarian.



In the mid 1970s I became a wildland firefighter. For the next 37 years my career centered on protecting lives and serving people. As years passed I learned new skills and joined teams that managed complex domestic and international disasters. I spent a lot of time away from my family living service above self as I helped people regain their lives after wildfires, hurricanes, tornadoes, and the 9-11 attack.

In 2004 I joined Rotary. After attending a few meetings and filling out forms, I was inducted into the Rotary Club of Alturas. I listened to words about being chosen because of my “representation of a worthy vocation, possessing qualities that would permit me to exemplify the true spirit of Rotary, and how my skills and talents would carry the principles of Rotary into my community and the world.” I heard the words, but it would take time until I understood what they really meant.

My mother died early Easter morning. What a loss. She was an amazing, accomplished and complex woman. Reflecting on her life, I remember one of the lessons she taught me -- Give away the things you love the most. What do I value most? Time. Why time? I’ve got a finite amount of time to live

A prospective member who has been introduced to Rotary by enthusiastic Rotarians, and who is well informed in these areas before joining, is more likely to become an involved and active member.

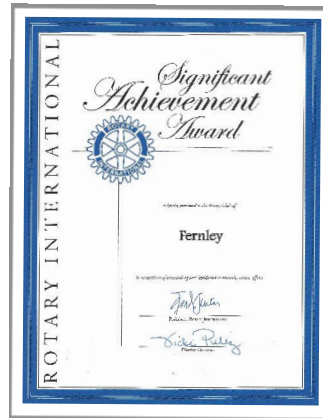

These are children who would go hungry over the weekend if assistance was not provided. Every club member participates in the program in some way. An excerpt of what was in the application for this award:

A young student asked her School Counselor "why is someone giving me this food when they don't know me". The counselor replied, "because they love you and do not want you to go hungry over the weekend", which brought her to tears. Hearing this story was the

trucks to move the food, shop for nutritious food items which is faithfully packed by a group of Rotarians, usually between 5 and 11 members per week, on a 2-3 week interval. Fernley Rotary members then deliver the packages to these 5 schools each week on time for distribution to the students. The members purchasing the food have also developed relationships with stores like Wal-Mart and Costco to meet both the nutritional and financial needs of the program.



Is Your Elevator Speech Ready?

One of the key aspects of membership development is getting prospective new members interested. Often we stumble into an opportunity when someone asks us: "What is Rotary?" (Maybe they saw that pin that you always wear so proudly.) When the opportunity arises, it is very important to have a short, succinct, and accurate answer to this proverbial question. The answer must also include our personal "Why" of Rotary membership.

Often, caught unprepared, we may expound on the internationality of Rotary, the size and scope of our service, or that we meet every week and eat together. None of these are

particularly good at catching someone's interest in 15 to 30 seconds. So, first ask yourself: why did you join and what keeps you coming back? If you are like many Rotarians, the two most cited reasons that people join are for the networking and friendship, and to make their LOCAL communities a better place for all. About 75% of Rotarians joined (and stay) for these reasons.

The key thing is to prepare yourself, think of your "target audience", and be ready to respond in a way that will stimulate further interest and discussion when the right person asks you: "So what is Rotary, anyway?" There is nothing worse than to have someone

ask and your response is: "ummmmm..."

READY TO LIGHT UP ROTARY

Just coming back from the District Training Assembly I want everybody to know how pleased I am with the new motto "LIGHT UP ROTARY" This is exactly what I have been working to do since I became a member of Jackson Rotary in 2006.

Even before being a Rotarian I have strived to live by the "Service Above Self" attitude. In 1997 I relocated in California from Brazil. Learning about Solar Cooking I immediately thought it would be an ideal system for Brazil where many families live below the poverty line and where the sun is abundant.

In 2005 my husband Michael and I acquired 2 dozen Solar Cookers and traveled to Brazil to demonstrate how they are used. However the people we spoke to were initially suspicious, asking what we were trying to sell them, and what was in it for us. In spite of our best explanations we could not convince them we had no personal gain from it.

Then the Rotarians stepped in! Our dear friend Ronaldo Carneiro, PDG of District 4530, invited us to his club as well as to a Rotary BBQ, to explain our plan to the local Rotarians. Afterwards all the Rotarians tried to help us, indicating where to go and to whom to speak. This opened the doors, it made an enormous difference.

Back in California I was asked to join Jackson Rotary, I accepted gratefully, Ronaldo Carneiro had already become my mentor. I showed the potential for an international service project to the club while I started translating all the available documentation in Portuguese and writing numerous letters to obtain a Host Club in Brazil.

After a year my Rotary Club sponsored our "Training the Trainers" project. Returning to Brazil we held 12 hands-on

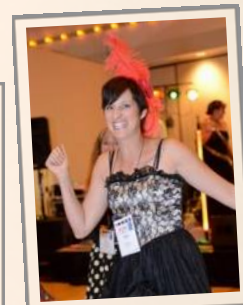
workshops teaching people how to cook with the sun and how to make the cooking devices with inexpensive and readily available material. We trained 10 Community Leaders and 330 students, and did 8 slideshow presentations in rural areas. We distributed 70 new solar cookers, hay baskets, rocket stoves and water pasteurization indicators and had our students make many more during the workshops. And along the way we visited 11 Rotary Clubs.

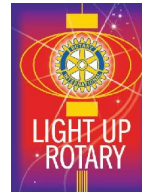
