

April was a month of recognition, learning and a special visit for District 5190. We celebrated our most significant Rotary Foundation supporters at our annual Paul Harris Society Dinner. Rotary Peace Fellow Nerve Macaspac, currently a PhD candidate at UCLA, shared his story and discussed his current findings. The Rotary Peace Fellow program now has over 850 graduates of peace and conflict resolution worldwide working towards a safer and more tranquil planet. Our own Peace Fellow, Aimal, was also in attendance as he prepares to leave for England in the fall.

The following day was our Club Learning Assembly. Formerly our District Training Assembly, a modified format was presented by DGE Gail, District Trainer PDG Vicki, and a team of dedicated facilitators. The reviews and evaluations are in – the Assembly was an awesome event, with great energy!

Steven Solomon, our Annual Giving Officer from the Rotary Foundation came to our District the last week of the month for an informative and inspiring visit. Please read the article about his trip elsewhere in this issue. The news continues to be encouraging in our fight against Polio! As of April 29, 2015 there has been only 1 case of the Wild Polio Virus in Afghanistan, 22 in Pakistan, and NONE anywhere else in the world! Nigeria (and all of Africa) has now gone 9 months without a case, and will drop off the endemic list should they go another 3 months with no polio. We are THIS CLOSE!

The news wasn't good everywhere however, as our friends in Nepal suffered a devastating earthquake on April 25th. Thousands have died and millions have been impacted. Rotarians everywhere have rallied to offer support, with many clubs making contributions through ShelterBox, our emergency response partner. We offer our sympathies to everyone affected by this catastrophe.

Are you a boxing fan? Unfortunately Rotarian Manny Pacquiao lost his championship fight to Floyd Meriweather Jr. Saturday night in Las Vegas. Yep, Manny is a member of the Rotary Club of Manilla and served as their 2012-13 Club President!

ACTUALLY, WE CAN MAKE A DIFFERENCE

Reaching Out to Aid Our Nepali Neighbors

We express our profound sadness and extend our sympathies to all those affected by the devastation resulting from the 25 April deadly earthquake in Nepal. As we mourn the thousands of lost lives, Rotary joins many international agencies in providing immediate relief to survivors and mobilizing our expertise to support long-term recovery and rebuilding efforts.

How to help:

- <u>District 3292</u>, Nepal, has established a disaster relief fund to provide needed equipment and supplies to affected communities. <u>Contact District Governor Kumar Piya</u> for information about contributing to the fund. (Also see below)
- Rotary's service partner ShelterBox is working closely with Nepali Rotarians to coordinate immediate relief efforts. On Monday, 27 April, and Wednesday, 29 April, Rotarians greeted ShelterBox response teams in Nepal who will mobilize temporary housing and relief efforts. An initial 1,000 housing tents and 1,000 shelter kits will be distributed throughout affected communities. Two more ShelterBox relief teams and additional kits are ready to be deployed once further assessments are complete. Learn more about supporting ShelterBox's relief efforts.
- As with all disasters, the Rotary family may apply for global grants to support long-term recovery efforts in Nepal. Once immediate health, safety, and relief efforts have been addressed, work with local Nepali Rotary members and their international partners to develop projects within Rotary's six areas of focus.


SUCCESS DOESN'T GO TO YOU - YOU GO TO IT
