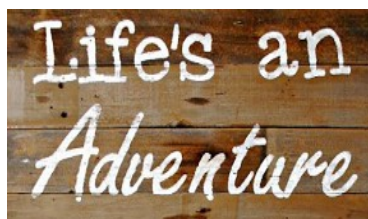

Decades of Success - Ice Fishing Derby

Those Ely Rotarians are not hunkering in their homes as winter sets in - they are ramping up for their annual Ice Fishing Derby! It is always held the last Saturday in January at Cave Lake, near Ely NV. The event has been held each year for over 20 years with the exception of 2018 when the lake didn't freeze enough. This year there were over 750 entrants to this community-supported, Rotary-sponsored fund-raiser and fun-filled weekend. Well in excess of \$25,000 was raised during the event.



Each year a couple dozen fish are tagged prior to the event. All entrants have a chance to fish through a hole in the ice in an effort to catch one of these fish. Cash prizes are offered.



Funds are raised through registration, bar sales, and raffles. Many community businesses support the event through donation of items and volunteer hours. This event brings more people into Ely than any other weekend event in the year. The Ely club donates the majority of the proceeds to scholarships and makes annual donations to Community Against Childhood Hunger program,

two local breast cancer funds, White Pine County and Mt. Wheeler's Christmas programs to name a few.

What a great and successful event! Kudos to the Ely Rotary Club.

The November RYE Corner

November is Foundation Month in the World of Rotary and Rotary Youth Exchange is an outstanding Rotary program designed to invest in the youth who will become our future leaders, leading the way in service organizations and funding programs such as Rotary Youth Exchange around the world.

And once more, I am reminded of our focus upon and guidance for our Rotary Youth Exchange (RYE) students in terms of *Service Above Self*. For years we have attempted to get our students involved in a community service project as a means of providing a clear path to developing their place in the world,

and we have managed to accomplish small, local service projects during the students' year of exchange.

I am reminded of how different people express their sense of service as I reflect on the life of Elijah Cummings, who recently passed away. This concept of service is reflected in one of my favorite quotes from Mr. Cummings: *Our children are messengers of a future we will never see.* It is, therefore, our job to make sure our youth are prepared for this future with the best possible decision-making skills and a sense of compassion for their fellow humans. And it is Rotary Youth Exchange that is the perfect vehicle for training our future leaders.

On October 19, 2019, The District RYE Committee held a joint orientation for the current 2019-2020 Inbound exchange students and for a group of potential outbound applicants and their families. As stated, we have had some difficulty in determining a good service project for our Inbound students in the past. It can be difficult getting 21 students together for a project given the time they are together in various events throughout the year where other objectives have to be met. However, a few years ago, we challenged the Inbounds to gather clothing to be donated to Big Brothers Big Sisters (BBBS) in Reno during the District Conference. BBBS brought several barrels to gather the donations and ended up with four barrels of donations from the students.

The project was successful, but we also knew that we could do better and offer a project challenge that would involve the students in a deeper effort. At our orientation, we challenged each of the students to raise \$500 for the Smiles Without Borders project at Thousand Smiles Foundation dental clinic in Ensenada, Mexico, for much needed lighting in their operating rooms. We spent some time helping them come up with fundraising ideas and the response was great. The minimum goal for each student is to raise \$500 for the Smiles project. If each student meets their goal, that would be \$10,500 toward the cause. If they exceed their goal, who knows?

Some of the ideas:

- Cook something from their home country and sell it at school or at the Rotary meetings
- Make garlands of origami swans to sell for Christmas decorations
- Solicit donations from their community and sell tickets
- Cook a full meal and sell tickets for that meal
- Go to their Rotary club to explain the Smiles project and "pass the hat"
- And more....

As we help our students develop a real sense of community service and *Service Above Self*, we are ensuring that generations ahead will be secure and make a better world possible. This project will enable our Inbound students to grow through their exchange year in ways they didn't expect and in ways that benefit not only themselves but generations ahead.

Rotary Eighth Grade Leadership (REGL) Program

A phenomenal program that continues to make such a difference

The purpose of the **Rotary Eighth Grade Leadership (REGL) Program** is to provide high quality leadership training with a strong emphasis on ethics to selected 8th grade students who have demonstrated leadership skills. Our aim is to provide these selected students with tools for the difficult choices they face as they move into high school.

In 2019 the District 5190 REGL program offered two residential sessions for three days each at Grizzly Creek Ranch in Portola, CA. This facility is truly an amazing facility and the Sierra Nevada Journeys staff are professional and fun.

Clubs interested and willing to sponsor a middle school for the District REGL Program at Grizzly Creek Ranch were notified in February 2019 and asked to send in their reservation form **and payment** to secure a place for their school. We had capacity for 22 middle schools during REGL I (September 13-15, 2019), and for 22 middle schools during REGL II (September 20-22, 2019). By the early April, REGL II was full. By the first of May, REGL I was full.

Dean and Rochelle Whellams of Sparks, NV, remained universally positive with students, parents, school administrators and Rotarians. **Impressive and Amazing** were common words! We are so fortunate to have such talented and dedicated youth leadership program directors!



Four Rotary Clubs (with sponsorship of 5 middle schools) qualified for, and received Searles Foundation Grants awarded through the Sparks Community Foundation.

Program Delivery:

- 36 Rotary Clubs in District 5190 sponsored 44 Middle School groups.
- 200 Eighth Grade Students from throughout District 5190 enjoyed a REGL experience.
- 44 Rotarians served as REGL Coordinators and provided a Rotary interface with their middle schools.
- 22 Rotarians and volunteers were Adult Mentors for the two sessions.
- 27 RYLA graduates from this summer's RYLA programs volunteered as Counselors
- 15 Rotarians were actively involved in preparing and delivering the program.

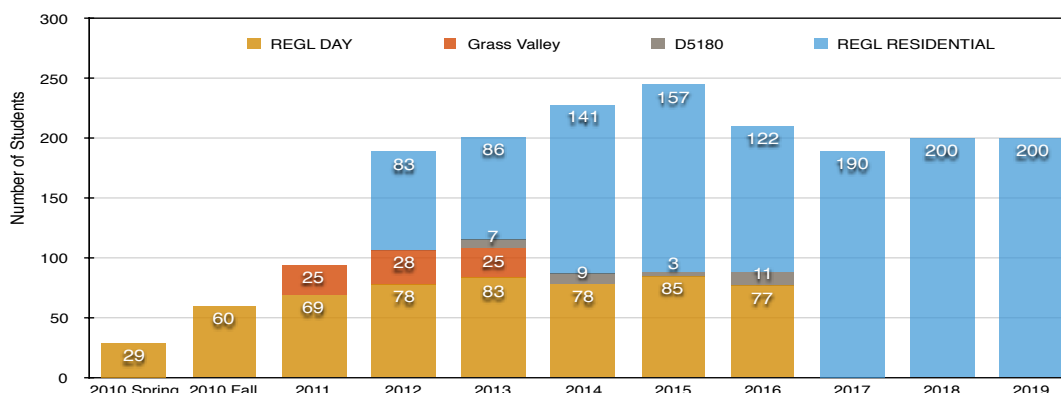

Hi friends

As your Paul Harris Society Chair for District 5190, I've been musing over what way(s) could I inspire my fellow Rotarians to consider giving to the Rotary Foundation at the annual level of \$1,000 that would include them in the Paul Harris Society. There are a number of "heart" responses that quickly come to mind:

- I want to be a part of doing good in the world.
- I know that the Rotary Foundation puts nearly every donated dollar to work on projects.
- I have been blessed with resources that I want to bless others with.
- I appreciate the value of being a partner in something much bigger than myself.
- I enjoy being invited to the annual D5190 Rotary Foundation Donor reception and recognition dinner each spring, where I enjoy great fellowship and inspirational speakers.

Are you getting the warm fuzzy feeling yet? Well, let me tell you that in spite of all the aforementioned reasons one might want to be a Paul Harris Society member, there is one stumbling block that can play havoc with all our good intentions: coming up with the actual \$1,000 annual donation. I've been there, struggling, conniving with my finances, hoping, praying that the money would be available by the time I wanted to make my annual donation.

It all began in the Rotary year 2002-2003. I was the president of the Rotary Club of Alturas, and Paul Lumos was the District Governor of District 5190. During Paul's visit to our club he mentioned a newly formed Paul Harris Society in the Rotary world that would give special recognition to those who supported the Rotary Foundation with \$1,000 annually. I've always responded well to recognition, but the clincher was when the late PDG Joe Coffin, my Rotary mentor, friend, and club-mate, said he wanted to be a charter member of the PHS in our district, and wanted me to do the same. How do you say no to a PDG? That's right, you don't.

Records may prove me wrong, but I can't recall ever missing my annual donation to TRF at the Paul Harris Society level since that charter year. I'm not here to brag, rather I'm here to tell you that it's been a real struggle at times over the course of these years. Jeanne and I always prayed that our Federal Income Tax refund would be big enough, and for a while it was. But eventually the feds decided they needed us to pay more instead of getting refunds, and my PHS scheme was upside down.

Enter Rotary Direct! Like the proverbial knight on the white horse, my dilemma was solved. I'm here to tell you that, although I prefer to control my donations myself, Rotary Direct has proven to be the best kept secret for annual support of the Rotary Foundation. For a mere \$85, and change, a month (yes, the cost of Direct TV for a month, or dinner out for you and your sweetie!) you can become a Paul Harris Society member. It's a no-brainer. The good folks at TRF/ Rotary Direct get you set up and every month they quietly, and gently, remove the money from your checking account. No more agonizing over the shortage of funds when I want to make the annual donation.

I could go on, but Editor Elizabeth gave me a word limit, which I've fairly exceeded. Bottom line, folks, don't be hard headed like I was for many years, go to Rotary Direct now, get signed up to support TRF at \$85+ a month, and I'll give you a big hug at this year's dinner on April 23rd. See you there!

Participants are free to secure their own air reservations using their frequent flyer mileage, or individual purchase. Howard Tours will be



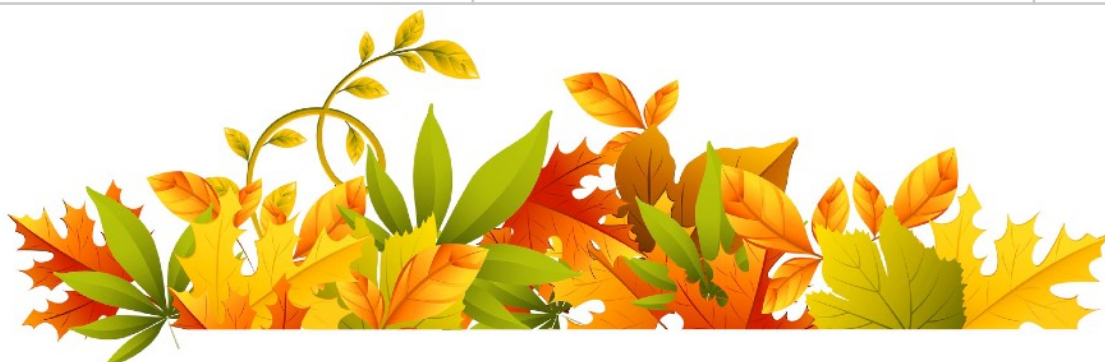
happy to help you purchase airline tickets, which can be requested on the trip application.
