



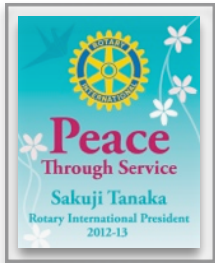

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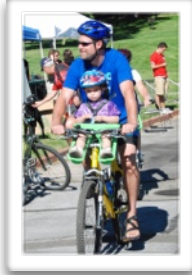


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## From the Woodshed

### Consider your vocation as another opportunity to serve...

Well, September rolled by in a flash, and Kim and I visited 12 more clubs in this fantastic District of ours. We visited several clubs that were pretty close to home in the Reno and Lake Tahoe areas, then we headed to the far northern reaches of the District to be amazed by the great clubs in Alturas and Cedarville. After that we headed to the "south pole" of the District, and visited the venerable Tonopah Club (chartered in 1924!) and a couple of our new clubs in the Bishop and Mammoth Lakes area. Again we were so impressed by all that these clubs do for their communities, and beyond. It is so moving to see the flame of the Rotary movement burning brightly in our clubs!



October is Vocational Service Month, one of the bedrocks of Rotary service. I remember when I was Club President; I wanted to make sure that my club had a program of service in each of the (at that time 4) Avenues of Service. When it came to setting goals and developing a program of Vocational Service, I had a problem: I had no idea what it was!

Interestingly, it was probably the second area of service that Rotary settled into. First was, of course, the development of friendships and

fellowship through "Club Service". Heck that was the driver to form Rotary in the first place. Our founder, Paul Harris, was lonely for friends in the big city of Chicago. I believe that the very next way that these early Rotarians found to serve others was through their vocations. Viewing our vocation as an "opportunity for service" was, and still is for some, a powerful paradigm shift in the way we view the world. When we see our careers as an Avenue of Service to humankind, high ethical standards in business naturally follow. The Four Way Test is our keystone here.

So, if vocational service is part of the foundation of Rotary, why did I not even know what it was as I sat at my desk, scratching my head to come up with a plan for my club? I really don't know the answer. I think it is partially the fact that sometimes something becomes so ingrained in our experience that we take it for granted, and eventually start to forget its value in our lives. I know many parents who might attest that their children sometimes take parental love and service for granted, and may at times forget how wonderful and important it is. So it may well be with Rotarians, and Vocational Service.

But think about this: consider all the vocations that are represented in your club. Now think about all the vocations that are represented in District 5190. Now add all the various vocations represented in the entire world of Rotary.

Literally, Rotarians can accomplish anything, in any area of expertise, through their vocations.

But we as Rotarians do more than just provide a “service” through our vocations; we model and reward the highest ethical standards in doing so. That is a powerful force for good in the world!

So, looking back on myself, as a President - Elect I struggled to figure out how my club could give some focus and energy to Vocational Service. It seems easier for me today. First, I would ask one of my fellow Rotarians to be my Vocational Service Chair. I would ask that person to develop and oversee a Vocational Service Program. That program might include an award for local businesses and merchants who demonstrate high ethical standards and community support through their business activities. It could include a project that would spotlight the Four Way Test, and make it relevant to current events in the community and my club. Perhaps we could also assist the local schools with “career day” activities, mentor students or young professionals, and give vocational scholarships to graduating seniors. I would hold one meeting each quarter at the place of business of one of my fellow Rotarians and celebrate the service that person provides for their clients or customers. I would also ask for Rotarians in my club to give programs about their careers and accomplishments in their professional lives. Some of our best programs are sitting right across the table from us at our meetings!

I would showcase the ability of members to network with each other in their jobs to enhance our service to the community. Networking is a key element of Vocational Service, and may be a key piece of the puzzle of attracting new members to our clubs. I actually joined Rotary to enhance my professional relationship to the local community. By networking with club members who represented a core group of community leaders, I was able to enhance my ability to serve the community through my vocation.

So, I highly recommend that you give some added emphasis to how your club can improve its projects and programs in the avenue of Vocational Service. You will probably find many individual projects or activities that you already do, and you may discover that these in aggregate make a

The 3 clubs have a strong foundation supporting each other and partnering on community projects, events, and marketing. Each club sponsors the other clubs major fundraising events. Each club works individually and together with Area 4 to implement the Rotary Eighth Grade Leadership Experience (REGLE) which occurred in September this year. The Rotary Clubs in Area 5 combine leadership and resources to put on an area-wide Speech and Music contest. Gold Country Rotary Club takes the lead in the Speech contest and Auburn Rotary Club takes the lead in the Music contest. The clubs together provide the cash prizes and participate as judges. Our area has also taken leadership roles at the district level for the Speech and Music contests conducted at the District Conference for the past several years. Auburn Daybreak past President Stacy Pedersen is the current District Vocational Service Chair.

**AUBURN DAYBREAK ROTARY CLUB** – meets Wednesday mornings at 7 a.m. at the Sierra Smokehouse Grill. They have said, “They get up early and they like it!” Founded in 1995, our dearest PDG Gene Albaugh was a charter member of the Daybreak Rotary Club. ### *Meeting Makeup*

*Striving for perfect attendance through regular attendance and makeup meetings*

The Standard Rotary Club Constitution defines when a member’s attendance is sufficient to be considered to be in good standing and what constitutes a valid make-up. Make-ups are defined as if, within 14 days before or after the regular time for a meeting, the member:

1. attends at least 60 percent of the regular meeting of another club; or
2. attends a regular meeting of a Rotaract or Interact club; or
3. attends an RI or District meeting as more fully defined in the Constitution; or
4. is present at the usual time and place of a regular meeting of another club for the purpose of attending such meeting, but that club is not meeting at that time or place; or
5. attends and participates in a club service project or a club-sponsored community event or meeting authorized by the board; or
6. attends a board meeting or, if authorized by the board, a meeting of a service committee to which the member is assigned; or
7. participates through a club web site in an interactive activity requiring an average of 30 minutes of participation.

Members who are “Rule of 85” (65 years of age and age plus years in Rotary equals or exceeds 85) are exempt as are Officers of RI and make-ups are not required. Members on a Leave of Absence are

excused from attendance requirements but are considered absent for the purposes of calculating attendance percentages unless they attend or make-up a meeting.

### *Taking Your Vocation to the Next Level of Service*

The Rotary Foundation Cadre of Technical Advisers is a group of volunteer Rotarians who provide technical expertise and advice to Rotarians planning and implementing projects around the world. Cadre members support Foundation programs by reviewing, monitoring, and evaluating projects and ensuring the proper stewardship of grant funds.

Cadre member eligibility requirements

- Be current, active member of a functioning Rotary club
- Be in good standing with The Rotary Foundation and Rotary International
- Possess professional experience in at least one of the technical sectors
- Receive endorsement from district governor

## Polio Score Board

### Wild Poliovirus (WPV) cases – As of 25 Sep 2012.

On 27 September, UN Secretary General Ban Ki-moon hosted a high-level event on polio eradication, in the margins of the UN General Assembly in New York. The event, 'Our Commitment to the Next Generation: The Legacy of a Polio-free World' is bringing together leaders of the remaining endemic countries, donor governments, development agencies, spearheading partners and representatives of the media, to draw attention to the urgent need for focus and commitment to eradicate the remaining 1% of polio cases worldwide.

The event will be followed by a global civil society festival on 29 September, bringing together top artists with an audience of 60,000 to a concert in New York's Central Park, to catalyze further action to

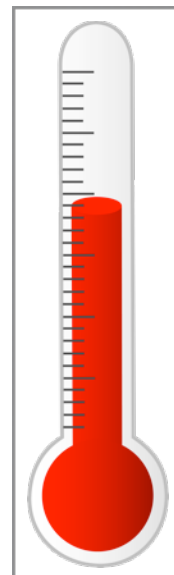
their name? Or perhaps a new member's first fine, or first "Happy Bucks" could be routed to Polio Plus?
