



Kids are back in school; summer is nearing an end; the fairs and special events we celebrate in so many communities are slowly coming to an end; attendance at our meetings is increasing as members return from vacations; and I am so proud of all the club presidents who are leading our clubs with hearts for service.

It is so important for us to maintain contact, and to create a relationship, with the young people who are beneficiaries of our Youth Service programs. Not just RYLA, but all our youth service programs such as scholarship programs, other leadership programs, mentoring and vocational programs, literacy programs, youth exchange programs, Interact and Rotaract clubs. We have

such an investment in our young leaders and many times we do not reach out our hand in friendship to them and encourage them to consider a lifelong relationship with Rotary. Our youth programs span ages from birth to 30 years of age—there is so much benefit to be gained by young people through our Rotary programs—if they just knew what was available!

We are working at the District level to create ways to make staying in contact with these youth service beneficiaries easier. In the process of a focus group discussion with past RYLA graduates, we found that those who lost contact with their Rotary club had never been invited back to speak to the club after RYLA camp.

This is an easy first step you can take, while that student is a high school senior in your community and it goes a long way to creating an awareness and appreciation of Rotary that is priceless.

My wife and I met RYE Chairman Bob Edwards from Quincy at the 1976 District Conference and we were impressed with the Rotary Youth Exchange (RYE) program. I was President Elect and wanted to initiate the program ASAP in our club. It wasn't long before I was inducted into the RYE Committee. Something this radical and new was difficult to sell and recruiting kids to go oversees for a year was a challenge.

Our first high school graduate was a pianist that often entertained our club who went to Belgium. She now lives in England. At the same time our club welcomed a girl from Holland. Both had a rewarding year. Since then we have sponsored 44 students from Susanville and received 36 during my 30 year tenure.

Students are alike no matter what country or culture they are from.

My advice for an exchange students is to learn as much as possible about the country before going oversees. Learn basic words in the language you'll be speaking so you can communicate. Our boy from Italy was asked what language he spoke. The exchange student looked puzzled and before he could respond the student asking the question answered, "Is it English with and Italian accent?"

We are fortunate to have visited the homes of students we housed in Brazil, New Zealand, Philippines, Holland, Belgium, France, Switzerland, Germany and Denmark. At last count my wife Joan and I have hosted 17 RYE students and a few others from China and Japan.

In 1978 our oldest son crashed his Marine jet fighter practicing night dive bombing. This was of course devastating, but the RYE program was our lifesaver getting involved and doing something rewarding for both the students and ourselves.

Registering Made Easy

Registering for district events is easy on the Rotary District5190 Clubrunner website www.rotarydistrict5190.org:

- 1. If you are not already logged in, login with the upper right button.
- Find and click on your event on the right side panel, "Upcoming Events," which lists all district events.
- This takes you to the specific event page where you will click on "Members" on the left under the "Online Registration" heading.

IS IT FAIR TO ALL CONCERNED?

FAIR IS NOT ALWAYS EQUAL

Fairness is central to the 4 Way Test. We consider actions, processes, and consequences fair that are morally right, honorable and equitable. When decisions are fair, we base them on criteria that ensure people get what is due them.

When I was growing up with my 4 brothers, when given a drink to share, I was meticulous in lining up the glasses to ensure that we all received an equal amount. I considered that fair. As a mother, my 9 year old daughter complained "That isn't fair" when tasked with doing the dishes while her 3 year brother was not. I considered that fair. As a manager at the Sheriff's Office I interviewed and evaluated people to hire and promote. The selection of one person over another I based on the skill level, work ethic, dedication, accuracy, and work history. I chose the person through a series

of impartial tests and interviews. Only one person got the job or promotion. I considered that fair.

The Thesaurus defines words similar to equitable as reasonable, impartial, just, unbiased, evenhanded, justifiable, and


rightful. Sometimes fairness is determined on the basis of need and other times on the basis of merit. In making decisions, there may be a variety of factors that determine fairness. Equality may be factor in making some decisions I consider fair, but FAIR IS NOT ALWAYS EQUAL.


CHARTING A COURSE ON COMMON GROUND

Born and raised in Northern California, Shawn Dunning has a B.A. in Speech Communication and Psychology from California Polytechnic State University and a M.S. degree in Conflict Analysis & Resolution from George Mason University. He then served on the roster of certified mediators for the Supreme Court of Virginia before entering the field of international conflict resolution.

In this capacity, he leads projects throughout the United States, Middle East, Balkans, Africa, and Southeast Asia that develop the capacity of political and civil society leaders to lead from a basis of "common ground" principles.

A seasoned trainer, facilitator, mediator, leadership coach, and public speaker, Shawn has served thousands of women and men around the world to help them resolve conflict and develop their collaborative leadership skills. His clients include senior government officials and elected leaders, executives of fortune 500 companies, gifted youth, young international scholars, and nonprofit organizations.

Recent and ongoing engagements include leadership development for members of parliaments in Indonesia, Pakistan, and Zanzibar; leadership training and coaching for Israeli and Palestinian political, business, and religious leaders; "common ground talk" skills for television journalists in Kenya; and racial reconciliation efforts with members of the U.S. Congress.

joined the Rotaract Club of Reno when I was 18 years old. I had never heard of Rotary, however my mom told me "you better join that club Courtney, it will benefit your life!" I didn't think much about it at the time; but it soon turned out to be true. I joined the club, and after my first year, I got involved. I became the Community Service Director, and then the following year became Vice President.

I was going into my last semester of college at UNR in January 2011, and began to think about how I was going to start my career. We were at one of our meetings, when Sparks Rotarian Paul Kiser, asked me what I was planning on doing for my career. I told him that I wanted to get into Human Resources, but had no clue how to get that started. He told me that Jim Annis, the founding President of Reno Centennial Sunset Rotary was the owner of a HR company and he would be happy to give me his contact information to help me out.

A few days later I got an email from the Human Resource Director of Applied Business Solutions asking me to come in for an interview. After reading through the chain of emails, I



saw the email that Paul had sent to Jim. He had indicated to Jim that I was the current Vice President of the Rotaract Club of Reno and had been in the club for the last three years. He said that I was very interested in getting into the Human Resource field, and it would be great if Jim could give me some advice on how to start that career path. Based on what Paul said about me, Jim wanted me to come in and talk to the director about a potential position with his company. I couldn't believe that I was actually being called in for an interview! When I met with the managers, they told me that Jim had asked them to talk about a potential internship opportunity. I was beyond ecstatic! I started as the first HR Intern at **Applied Business Solutions in January** 2011.

I worked there three days a week during my last semester of college gaining more experience and knowledge than I could have imagined. About three weeks before my graduation, my manager called me in to tell me that they wanted to hire me as a full time HR Partner if I was interested. Of course I was interested! I have since been at Applied Business Solutions for two and a half years. I just obtained my Professional in Human Resources (PHR) designation from the Human **Resources Certification Institute** (HRCI) in May 2013. I am so very blessed for the amazing opportunities



that I have received, and I owe it all to Rotary.

I am still heavily involved in Rotaract.
I have served as Community Service
Director, Vice President, and
President for the past two and a half
years. I am now currently serving as
International Service Director, Past
President and DRR (District Rotaract
Representative).

Rotary and Rotaract has changed my life in so many ways. I would not be where I am today if I did not joined Rotaract five years ago. I hope that you enjoyed my story and will be able to pass it along to all young people you may know, because it could change their life as well.
