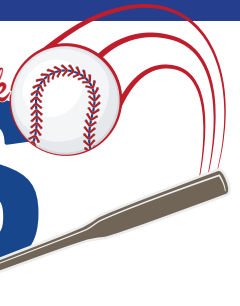

The involvement with our youth programs, a local Farmer's market, benches and tables put in at the community park, Rotarians providing a lot of man hours at their county fair; and the amazing projects go on and on. GET READY...OUTBOUND EXCHANGE OPPORTUNITY

As fall nears, we are on the lookout for high school students with a spirit of adventure. The Rotary Youth Exchange (RYE) program is opening up Preliminary Applications for high school students between the ages of 15 ½ and 18 ½ years old when they leave on their exchange. What we see in every student that undertakes this journey proves the study that claims young people living overseas for extended periods of time improve their life chances and choices by 40%. That is, they have a 40% better chance to find more success in college, career, relationships and decision-making than those who have not had a multi-cultural experience. Not a bad benefit.

District 5190 RYE would like to send out 24 to 30 young students for 10 to 11 months to be educated and explore the culture in their host country in our 2019-2020 exchange year. This is a priceless opportunity to live in Europe, Eastern Europe, Asia, South America or Mexico and gain the confidence that living abroad under the safe umbrella that Rotary will provide. The education of living abroad far exceeds what a young student can learn in a standard high school program.

WHEN TO GO?

Many students who would rather graduate from high school with their fellow classmates, knowing that they usually return to the grade they missed on exchange, will wait to go on exchange until their "gap" year between high school and college. Like all choices in life, there are upsides and downsides. In this case, going out on exchange during the gap year will reduce a student's choices of countries because there are some countries that will not take a graduated student. On the other



hand, without some careful planning with school officials and taking extra advance courses, a student who leaves during their junior year, for example, will have to enroll as a junior upon return from exchange. However, many students have managed to take upper level classes online or additional advanced studies that allowed them to enroll in the next school year upon their return (in this example, their senior year of school).

All in all, we think that the student and their parents know what will work best for them. Some students are more mature at an earlier age and others value a standardized approach to their education so wait until high school has ended. Some students just aren't interested while others are chomping at the bit for the opportunity. At our Exchange Briefing Orientation for parents and students (October 20, 2018 to be held at the Atlantis Casino Resort Spa in Reno) we explain the program, parent responsibilities and clarification of student expectations.

In the meantime, Preliminary Applications are available at www.rye5190.org from the Downloads & Forms tab (download the Preliminary Long-Term Application). This form will give us background on the family and information on the potential outbound student. In this application there is a section to identify which Rotary Club in District 5190 will sponsor the student. If the student does not have an association with a club, contact RYE Executive Secretary Jon S Greene (ryeexecsec@rye5190.org) for information on how to submit the application. The instructions are specific and clear and will let us know more about student expectations and whether this is a realistic program for them

at this time. Remember, this Briefing is designed to answer all the basic questions that help a family determine whether RYE is appropriate for the family.

After the Briefing, the family is better able to decide whether or not the student will continue with the Long-Term Application. The District RYE Committee will schedule one-hour interview times with each applicant and their parents the weekend of December 7 – 9, 2018. Both parents and students will be interviewed and selection of the final group of outbound RYE students will be announced in January 2019.

We want our students to have a successful exchange and this is made more likely by holding three Outbound Orientations in the five months prior to the student's departure. We have resources beyond that as well. For example, the District has purchased Rosetta Stone software for use by the students. After all, success will depend on the student's ability to speak the language of their country. The Rotary Club sponsoring the student will also be a tremendous resource for the student as they learn about Rotary as an organization.

ROTARY CLUB RESPONSIBILITIES

RYE is one of District 5190 best programs, supported completely by most clubs. So how can our members step up and attract high school students to take part in this program? Our clubs generally associate themselves with schools in their communities, providing Youth Services support through our many programs. RYE is a program that takes some planning and effort, but the outcome is more than worth the effort. Connect with your high schools, talking to the language teachers, career counselors or even giving a presentation to the school. Make sure you have a presence at the PTA meetings and in the school newsletters. Remember, in order to make this program available to potential outbounds, they have to know the opportunity even exists.

Once you have heard back from the candidates, interview them and select the student you wish to sponsor. If you have more than one student interested, advise your other students that they will be considered as alternates although you will only submit your first choice for the program. It is understood that this first step with an outbound student brings your club into the full RYE program and you will be hosting an inbound student if your outbound is selected. Now is the time for all Rotarians to learn about this wonderful program and share its value with your community and the schools in the community. If students don't know about the program, this opportunity will simply pass them by.

PREVIEW OF COMING ATTRACTIONS

Our inbound students are here, and they are already making their impact on our schools, our communities and our clubs. We didn't want this newsletter to seem as if we forgot them - next month we'll share more about these students. Watching them grow over this coming year while in the US is astounding. In fact, we just had our Rebound Orientation (returning outbounds) and I can assure you, seeing the growth in both inbounds and outbounds is what makes all the work worthwhile. Get involved with RYE – you won't be disappointed.

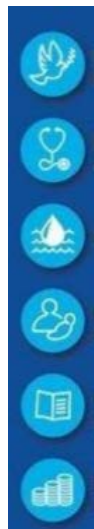

WATER AND SANITATION GUIDELINES FOR GLOBAL GRANT FUNDING

Rotary is dedicated to six areas of focus to build international relationships, improve lives, and create a better world. Through global grants, awarded by The Rotary Foundation, clubs and districts participate in strategically focused, high-impact activities in these areas. All global grant activities are required to align with the goals of an area of focus. For water and sanitation, the goals are:

1. Provide equitable community access to safe water, improved sanitation, and hygiene systems
2. Strengthen the ability of communities to develop, fund, and maintain sustainable water and sanitation
3. Support programs that enhance communities' awareness of the benefits of safe water, improved sanitation, and hygiene
4. Support studies for career-minded professionals related to water and sanitation

Use this document as a guide when applying for a global grant. You'll learn how to make your projects sustainable, what information is required for specific project types, and where to find additional resources.

A. Elements of Sustainability

Sustainability means different things to different organizations. For Rotary, sustainability means providing long-term solutions to community needs that the beneficiaries can maintain after grant funding ends. Pay careful attention to the following items to ensure your project's long-term sustainability and increase the likelihood of being approved for global grant funding.

1. COMMUNITY ASSESSMENT

Community assessments identify where support is most needed, and the role Rotarians can play in making a difference. Project sponsors (often with a cooperating organization) need to conduct a community assessment before submitting their application. An assessment can reveal a community's strengths and weaknesses and help you work on solutions. If an assessment has already been conducted, the relevant data to design your project.

Dear Fellow Rotarians

Global Grant #1978580 is about bringing a medical Maternal Health Vocational Training Team to Jaltenago, Chiapas, Mexico.

This will be our second time to bring a medical Vocational Training Team to Chiapas, Mexico and we are building on our success. Our goal is to leave behind a **SUSTAINABLE MATERNAL HEALTH CARE SYSTEM** in the region.

The **Community Needs Assessment done in July 2018** indicates that the Jaltenago area has the highest maternal death rate in the state of Chiapas. It was determined that there is a need for training Community Healthcare Educators and Professional Medical personnel.

There are three phases to this Train the Trainer Maternal Health Vocational Training project:

- 1. Equipment:** Purchase operating room equipment for the hospital (serving approx. 27,000 residents) and basic medical equipment for the Community Health Educators.
- 2. Education:** Curriculum development, Obstetrical emergencies, Prenatal care, Breastfeeding, Birth Control, Ultra Sound training, Curriculum development, and identification of pelvic floor medical problems. A selected local medical team from the Jaltenago region will travel to Bishop, CA to continue their training with the VTT from the US.
- 3. Surgery:** Gynecological surgeries

HOW FAR WE HAVE COME

When I was born in the early 40's the polio epidemic was about to raise its ugly head in the U.S. We lived through that threat and fear for many years. When I joined Rotary in the early 80's the threat had disappeared from this part of the world, but was still raging throughout a good part of the rest of the world. Rotary had started the process of going into direct combat with its partners against this dreaded disease. After I was elected president of the Rotary Club of Reno I attended the International meeting in Philadelphia where they announced the successful initial major fundraising effort. We not only met our goal, but virtually doubled it. What a proud moment when they released thousands of balloons when the announcement was made. Little did we know at the time it would take us into the next century to accomplish our goal and fulfill our promise to eradicate polio.

By the time I was District Governor in 2005-06 we knew we still had a long way to go, but we never wavered. A few years later, just as fund raising fatigue was about to set in, a new partner arrived on the scene and in an announcement to the International Assembly, the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation, agreed to a match for future monies raised by Rotary. They have continued to do that with higher and higher match amounts. We

are so close with three endemic countries while one of those, Nigeria, hasn't had a case in over two years. Pakistan and Afghanistan continue to account for the last remaining active cases currently at 14 for 2018. There is also a need to continue vaccinations in other parts of the world as well. The cost of eradicating in these final countries is enormously high. Geographic, terrorism, religious objections, and transportation challenges must constantly be overcome. Despite that we are making great progress.

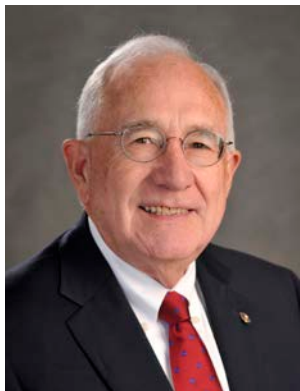
We have two events coming up to help you understand the history, our current situation and how you can help. First, on September 8 during the Avenues of Service session mentioned in this newsletter you can spend a half an hour with me as we discuss all of the above in more detail. Secondly, World Polio Day is scheduled for October 24 and we hope that all clubs will participate – Walk/Ride to End Polio, join the Ride to End Polio (www.ridetoendpolio.org) Pints for Polio, community screening of our Rotary Foundation's World Polio Day event in Philadelphia, Pennies for Polio, Purple Pinkie...More ideas and resources can be found at www.endpolio.org.

The Rotary Foundation is asking clubs to raise \$1500 each this year, hopefully, through projects in their communities that bring awareness of the problem and create opportunities to be part of the solution. And, of course, there is Governor Tina's basket challenge that many of you have already participated in so be ready when she visits your club to give generously.

ROTARIAN *DOING GOOD IN HIS COMMUNITY*

RESCUE, REHAB AND RELEASE OF BARN OWLS IN AMADOR COUNTY

Austin Ford, Jr. Rotary Club of Plymouth-Foothills

Noting a serious unemployment problem in his adopted Amador County, Fiddletown, CA- resident and member of the Rotary Club of Plymouth-Foothills, Austin Ford, Jr had a need to create jobs. "No No" his wife said; "You're retired." When one nearby family lost their home, there was no more discussion. Ah well. "I looked to see how cash flowed into the County," Austin told us. "Economic growth was in the wine and vineyard industry, the question was how to tap into it."

HOW IT STARTED

Gophers are a huge agriculture problem, particularly given increasing environmental pressures on vineyards and farms to be 'organic' by reducing pesticide usage. "When a friend mentioned Barn Owls as a natural solution, I called Dr. Martin Cody, UCLA Professor Emeritus, who had also retired to our area and spoke at our Rotary Club about owls. He said the Barn Owl is the most efficient hunter of small mammals but their old nesting environments were going away and the population was shrinking." However, he said, "if you build a safe home, they will nest in it and the population will increase...and gopher populations will decrease." Hmmm.

With neighbor, Jack Vining, a life-long woodworker, and Martin as science advisor, Austin formed the Amador Barn Owl Box Company in October, 2011. The demand was immediate. And now, 7 years later, the company's products are sold in over 32 Cal communities. In addition to 5 models of Barn Owl Boxes, the product line now includes Screech Owl and Bluebird boxes, Bat Houses, Wood Duck boxes, Raptor Roosts and more. "We've shipped all over the country. Austin said. So much for retirement, but a number of good folks are deriving income. Now to get the Honey-do list under control."

UNEXPECTED REWARDS

There are related rewards. Six weeks ago, the company was asked to relocate a Barn Owl Box that had been abused by a vineyard tractor. Lo and behold, even this late in season, there were small owls in it. They were lethargic and slow to react; no sign of the parents. A local partner who rescues and rehabilitates raptors-in-need was called. She removed 6 (yes, six) babies and took them home. "Monday of this week, she called me, that it was time to release them – at dusk that evening. We actually released 9. What a sight! Nine very healthy high-energy young Barn Owls had their freedom and went for it.



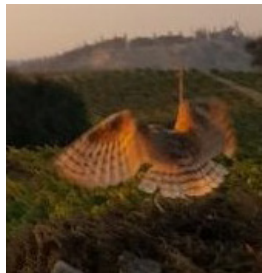

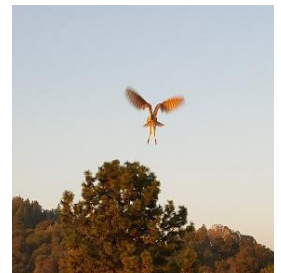
