#### HIT THE MUTE BUTTON IF YOU'RE NOT TALKING

This gives whoever is speaking the space to be heard. It also means you can say 'ooh big stretch!' when your dog wakes up from their nap... and no one will hear it.



#### WAVE AT PEOPLE AS THEY ENTER THE CHAT

A friendly wave and a smile is a non-interruptive but welcoming way to greet people as they enter the video chat, especially if someone else is already speaking!



#### BE KIND TO ONE

This one probably seems a bit obvious, but it's important to recognise that some people are more confident with technology than others and for some, your gathering may be their very first. Be patient, gentle and kind. But probably don't blow kisses.



#### TAP YOUR EAR IF YOU CAN'T HEAR SOMEONE

There's a high chance that someone might forget they've muted themselves at some stage, so a gentle, non-intrusive way to remind them that they're muted is to tap your ears. Hopefully they won't hink you're initiating a game of Charades.



#### RAISE YOUR HAND IF YOU WANT TO SPEAK

If there are quite a few of you on a video chat and the conversation is booming, it might be handy ("scuse the pun) to raise your hand when you have something to say. A bit like an invisible talking stick.



#### PROP YOUR SCREEN UP IN ONE SPOT

The last thing you want to do is cause your fellow video-buddles some sea sickness by moving around too much. We recomment propping up your phone or laptor in one spot so you reduce the amount of motion and hopefully avoid seeing these kinds of faces looking back at you.

### SYRACUSE ROTARY SUPPORTS LOCAL POOLS

The fundraising campaign to open two city pools reached its \$100,000 goal. The money will be used to open the pools at Thornden Park and Onondaga Park. Mayor Ben Walsh announced a fundraising campaign by the Syracuse Parks Conservancy to pay for the lifeguards and other staff needed to open two city pools. The pools were to remain closed as part of budget cuts caused by the COVID-19 pandemic. Walsh also had to furlough 104 employees earlier this year, including those who staff the pools.

In under a week, the fundraiser reached its goal. More than 450 people and organizations chipped in to raise the money needed to open the pools. The Rotary Club of Syracuse donated \$6,000. The Club took great pleasure in backing the City of Syracuse's efforts to open the two additional swimming pools. We felt that having two additional pools open will greatly assist the youth of Syracuse to have a fun and safe summer. In this COVID-19 pandemic era, it is vitally import to provide as much support as we can muster to help all facets of our community. We especially wanted our youth to enjoy this recreational opportunity. To that end, the Rotary Club of Syracuse raised a total of \$6,000 to support the reopening of the pools. The Club donated \$3,000 which was matched with an additional contribution of \$3,000 by one of our club members

When pools do open, the city will enforce strict distancing rules and require swimmers to make reservations in 40-minute time blocks. Swimmers will be eligible for only one time slot per day. The city will enforce state guidelines on public gatherings, limiting the number of people at each pool to no more than 50 at a time. Swimmers can make reservations by calling direct lines for each pool location. Masks will be required for people over the age of 2 while on the pool deck and in restrooms. Staff will take temperatures for each swimmer before they are allowed to enter. Happy swimming Syracuse!



#### SKANEATELES REPLACES PANCAKES & CARVES WOOD

Following the cancelation of their traditional (52yrs) Father's Day Pancake Breakfast, Skaneateles Rotarians took to the internet, personal appeals and local papers to raise the funds needed to continue their efforts to provide food to those in need. They met and exceeded the funds they typically raise at the Breakfast, plus collected over 2 tons of non-perishable food for their two local food pantries. The IMPORTANT lesson here, is that our communities are exceeding generous and when called upon in these times of need, they will step up to the plate. Typically we just need to be creative and "get our ask in gear" and ask. Don't let COVID-19 get in the way of service to our communities. They need us now more than ever!
