As the sentiment of the poem above points out about our holiday spirit, Rotary too, should not be something we share or engage in only during our scheduled meetings. One way to keep the spirit of your Holidays and the productive joys of Rotary alive year round is by sharing the opportunity of Rotary with our non-Rotarian counter parts in our communities. I believe in doing so we truly do··· Become a Gift to the World.

Rotary International gives us the tool to do so and provides us with a template to Join all Leaders, to Exchange Ideas and Take collective Action by forming community based partnerships. Here's how:



A Rotary Community Corps (RCC) is a group of non-Rotarians who share our commitment to service. RCC members plan and carry out projects in their communities and support local Rotary Club projects.

There are more than 7.500 corps in over 80 countries. Some examples of their work: -The RCC of San Miguel in Guadalajara, Mexico gives scholarship to high school students from poor families.

-Disabled volunteer members of the RCC of Keon in Cortlandt Manor, NY, USA plan service activities at a food pantry and dog rescue facility.

-The RCC of Cura Village in Nairobi, Kenya provides education funding and equipment for a local orphanage.

HOW DO I JOIN OR ORGANIZE AN RCC?

By joining or organizing an RCC you can make a tremendous impact in your community. RCC's can exist anywhere there is a local club sponsor. If there isn't a community corps, discuss the idea of starting on with your local Rotary Club president.

HOW DO I SPONSOR AN RCC?

By sponsoring an RCC you are giving a large segment of your community the opportunity to proactively address issues where they live. Community members with a vested interest in a project are more likely to make sure that the project lives on. You can form an RCC anywhere non-Rotarians are interested in working with Rotary. Here are some guidelines: -Assess your community needs. Find out where an RCC could have the biggest impact and what kinds of projects would be most effective.

-Promote the RCC to your club. Make sure you have buy-in from members and outline vour club's role as a sponsor.

-Recruit RCC members. Start with a core group of members. Community organizations and non-governmental agencies are a good place to recruit.

THE POLIO CHALLENGE FOR DISTRICT 7150!

The Adirondack Foothills Club's Jack Scott, a Rotarian of 40 years, challenged every member of his club to contribute \$30, \$60 or \$90 (or more) towards End Polio Now. If they got 100% participation from their members, then the club would double the contribution – AND THEY DID! They sent in \$1,840, which will turn into \$5,520 with the contribution from the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation. That's all from one club.

DeWitt Learns About SU Med School

Recently, Rotarian Mel Rubenstein introduced University Professor Sean O'Keefe at a Monday luncheon. He spoke about the concept of a new medical school in Syracuse. Doctors who graduate from this school would serve a specified period of time at a Veterans Administration hospital somewhere in the US. This is greatly needed and would have national significance. Professor O'Keefe was speaking to DeWitt Rotary about his role as Chair of the University Committee, which was created to assess the feasibility of establishing a medical school at SU. He told us that the program would be designed so as not to overlap with other area medical schools, and that he feels that this program can be transformational for both for SU and the military. However, the financial risks are enormous. Hopefully, a final model will integrate resources and faculty across the university, with the result of sharing programs and expertise that will benefit all involved. Professor O'Keefe is only the 17th person in Syracuse University history to hold the title of University Professor.
