HOW NEW CLUBS WILL HELP GROW ROTARY

We spend a lot of time working on ways that our clubs can be appealing to new members – by being active in our communities, flexible in our meeting times and affordable, among other things. Another great way to grow Rotary membership is by forming new clubs. It takes 20 people to start a new club or 8 people to start a satellite club, sponsored by an existing club. It is a focus of Rotary International to expand the number of clubs as a way to grow our membership and do more good in the world. SHELTERBOX PARTNERSHIP RENEWED

ShelterBox was founded by a Rotary Club. Their staff and volunteer base are primarily comprised of Rotarians. In 2012. they became the first Rotary International Project Partner for global disaster relief. The decision to deploy and the partnership with Rotary helps them to reach the poorest countries where disasters seldom get international media attention. Ninety percent of their responses to natural disasters involve Rotarian assistance in the affected areas. 2019 was also the 12th year in a row where ShelterBox provided shelter to over 10,000 households and they were nominated for a Nobel Peace Prize for work in areas of conflict.

MEETING IDEA: THINK TANK

Looking for an interactive and fun meeting program? Consider hosting a discussion or "Think Tank!" What exactly is a Rotary Think Tank? It is an opportunity to take on a subject as a club, discuss the subject in depth and learn a little more about your fellow club members. For over a year now, the Baldwinsville Rotary Club has hosted one of these discussions the first Tuesday of each month. Here's how they do it:

-A club member steps up to be the moderator and selects an article for the group to read (or it could be a video to watch online)

HINT: The Rotarian Magazine can be a great source for articles! -Share the article or video with the club a month before the Think Tank event and send a reminder the week before

-The moderator should prepare a list of questions or important quotes from the article to start and keep the discussion moving.

TIP: The moderator is also responsible for keeping the discussion neutral if the debate becomes heated for any reason.
