(NEW) NEW GENERATIONS CONFERENCE

Over 100 Rotarians took part in Rotary's first international conference on New Generations Service Exchange. The event was held in Frankfurt Germany in February. Tom Taylor, Onondaga North Rotary, attended on behalf of District 7150. New Generations Service Exchange is a program for those 18-30 years old who wish to travel to a foreign country and experience how his or her craft or profession is practiced elsewhere.

Unlike Youth Exchange, which is a mutual, reciprocal exchange (that is, for every student we send out, we take one in), the New Generations Service Exchange can be a one-way exchange (although it can be mutual as well).

Unlike Youth Exchange, which must take place during the school year, the New Generations Service Exchange May take place at any time, lasting anywhere from 2 weeks to 4 months.

DeWitt Rotary and 3 other Club partnered together for a CNY Books for the World Project. The Fayetteville-Manlius school district informed DeWitt Rotarian Tom Heister that they had boxes and boxes of library books to dispose of. DeWitt Rotary already had it's philanthropy giving planned for the spring, but had volunteers to pack the books. So, DeWitt Membership Chair Cheryl Matt contacted a handful of clubs and found sponsors for these pallets of books in Moravia, Onondaga North and Skaneateles. Two full pallets of books were packed up, labeled and shipped. DeWITT ROTARY says THANK YOU to these three clubs!

The club also made a \$1,000.00 donation to The DeWitt Food Pantry. This organization went into operation July 2013 and today provides emergency food to over 300 pre-qualified families monthly who are residents of Dewitt. This is a volunteer organization with 100% of all contributions used to purchase food and pay a monthly utility bill. Food purchases are economically made from the CNY Food Bank (on occasion purchases of eggs, etc. from Price Rite and/or Aldi). Supplies are supplemented with food drives and weekly food donations from Trader Joe's. Space is donated by Springfield Gardens.

At a recent Fulton Sunrise Rotary meeting, Rotarian Patrick Waite introduced Martha Sturtz PAWS of CNY (Pet Assisted Wellness Services of Central New York) certified evaluator and her Adirondack Golden Retriever, Princess Fire Fly aka Flyer the therapy dog. Flyer was originally Martha's own therapy dog as she battled cancer. PAWS started as a Sunshine Friends organization incorporating in 1999. They are a non-profit organization run by volunteers. Their name was changed to PAWS of CNY, Inc. in 2013 and their mission is to provide pet-assisted wellness services to hospitals, nursing homes, schools, colleges, libraries, airport travelers and community partners in Onondaga, Oswego, Cortland,

Madison and Cayuga Counties. They welcome community members to apply for pet therapy certification by completing a volunteer application, passing an initial evaluation, and completing a facility evaluation over the course of 3 months. They are in need of more certified cats.
