HAMILTON SUPPORTS ORAL HEALTH PROGRAM

The Hamilton Rotary Club has donated \$200 towards 'The Bigger Smiles Project: Oral Health Promotion across Different Ethnic Communities in Kosovo'. This initiative is being led by Colgate student Oneida Shushe.

Oneida's interests in dentistry and oral public health have brought her to champion this initiative to travel to Kosovo and hold oral health education 'clinics' with three partner organizations to educate children and parents who may not have the know the importance or have knowledge of good oral health habits.

She also has plans to distribute a goal of 3,000 oral hygiene packs consisting of toothbrushes, toothpaste and dental floss. Some of these packs will be funded by a Project for Peace grant, others from donations from Colgate Alumni and other community members and interested organizations. At the end of the Bigger Smiles Project, Oneida will evaluate the experience and report the findings to one of her partnering
