If there is one word that describes Rotary's purpose, it is the word "service". Service is a word that has many definitions. They include working as a servant, the process of serving food and drink, maintenance on a vehicle or machine, a religious gathering, starting a tennis match and working in the military to name a few.

I could not help but notice that the definitions share a common theme. They are "the act of helping or doing work for another or for another community," "work done this way," and "assistance or benefit given to someone." "Rotary International is an international service organization whose stated purpose is to bring together business and professional leaders in order to provide humanitarian services, encourage high ethical standards in all vocations, and to advance goodwill and peace around the world."

The second truth is that a service offered has an inherently selfless basis that springs from a genuine desire to help others. The third truth is that service has to involve effort. These truths are summarized in Rotary's long-standing motto, "Service above self" and its primary objective of encouraging and fostering the ideal of service as a basis of worthy enterprise.

Rotary is more than a group of business and professional people helping their communities, it is a family of clubs based on friendship and fellowship. As Rotary Founder Paul Harris once said; "Friendship is a natural and willing servant...There is no reason.....why the great power of friendship should not be harnessed to do its part in the world's work.

For years, Rotary Clubs in this District have been supporting projects both locally and throughout the world. Your commitment to our Rotary Foundation enables us to provide



support in times of crisis and to the six areas of focus. I would like to see the Rotary Clubs of District 7150 become more proactive in utilizing the Rotary Foundation by partnering with other rotary Clubs and Districts to address the many challenges that still face us in the six area of focus. WEB SITE WELLNESS

Hows is your web site doing? Does it need a little work? Let's evaluate! Is the branding for Rotary up to date on your site?

Make sure you are using the proper logos, which we reviewed in the last edition of the newsletter. All logos you would need are available for download on the public image page (link at the end of this article).

Is the content on your site current, accurate and fresh?

Make sure any meeting information is current, that the names of club leadership is updated and the content on the site is factual. This should be checked on at least once a month and, if possible, fresh information posted each month.

Who does your web site speak to?

Club web sites should speak to their community and potential members, while providing pages with information for members as well. The first thing people should see on the homepage should assume the reader is NOT a Rotarian. Make sure your site serves as a snapshot of who your club is and an invitation to outsiders to join you. Check out www.BaldwinsvilleRotary.org for an example.

Is your site easily viewed on any device?

It's 2017 and online information is consumed in so many ways - on desktop computers, laptops, and tablets and smartphones of all shapes and sizes. If your site isn't readable on a phone, people won't read it. Make sure your site is responsive, meaning it conforms to fit any size or shape screen. If you have a ClubRunner web site, there are new layout options you can change your pages to that make them responsive. If the system you use to make your page is too outdated for this feature, consider switching to a new one. This is REALLY important.






