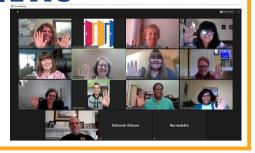

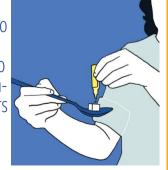




WHAT IT'S LIKE TO SURVIVE TWO PANDEMICS

ENGAGING VIRTUALLY

This is the third post in a series from your District Membership Committee to help clubs with virtual meetings and making online connections. You will find this valuable information in this newsletter, on the Membership page on the district web site and it will be shared with your club's membership chairs each month! Achieving engagement from your audience, especially online, takes practice and experience. Even if you're new to leading your club — or just new to leading in a virtual format — you can make your online meetings interesting and memorable with a few fresh ideas.

MAKE IT RELEVANT

To earn people's attention, make sure the content you're delivering is useful. How do you learn exactly what your club wants out of your meetings? Ask them. Send out a free Doodle Poll or SurveyMonkey survey, or even just ask for emails with ideas. Consider a committee that fields club suggestions and books speakers that match the topics and activities your club is interested in.

When a meeting starts, kick-off by giving a brief overview of what attendees are going to learn and get them excited. In order to do this, you need to be knowledgeable of your club's programs, which requires team effort

DITCH THE TRADITIONAL PRESENTATION

People learn in different ways. Some of us are visual learners who prefer pictures, videos, and diagrams, while others respond to spoken and written word, music, logic, or even physical activities. To create an inclusive online environment, try to combine just plain talking with audio and visual presentations, PDFs, and interactive tasks. You can do any combination of these things within one meeting, but try not to just show a PowerPoint the whole time or just talk the whole time.

CHANGE YOUR BACKDROP

Take advantage of being virtual to have a great background (not a virtual one, a real one!). Challenge convention and surprise your attendees by showing up on-screen in front of interesting artwork, outside in a gardened area, or in a space that's more dynamic and inspiring than a lamp on a side table. As long as your internet connection and audio won't be compromised, don't be afraid to get creative with your location.

USE PROPS

Props can make your meeting even more engaging. Invite speakers to show off items that tie into their subject matter. Props liven up your session and will help people remember what they learned.

PLAY GAMES

Need to keep your members focused? Tap into their competitive sides. Puzzles or riddles, memory games, ordering tasks — all are great ways to keep your attendees engaged and on-task. For added drama, impose a time limit. Try introducing a quick quiz, helping recap on what you learned at the last meeting or what people think they will hear about at the current meeting, and offer a small prize for the winner.

TELL A STORY

Whatever the subject, don't be afraid to ask your speakers to try to make it relatable to everyday life by using real examples, case studies, and creative metaphors. People will sit still for hours watching a movie — why not steal some cinematic tricks? It's also helpful if they can relate their area of expertise to Rotary, since that's what we are all doing here! Stories are central to the way memory works. Even if we don't realize it, we're always searching for the narrative. If you can find a way to weave information into an overarching story, attendees will be more engaged and more likely to remember the new information well after the meeting has been ended.

KEEP IT SHORT

One of the best ways to keep your audience engaged is to avoid overloading them with information. Give them too much and their brains will shut off. Either make your online session a maximum of two hours or, if it's taking place over the course of a day, allow short breaks. Give attendees a chance to get up, walk around, and grab a cup of coffee.

PROVIDE RECOGNITION AND SHOW GRATITUDE

Members will be more motivated to attend and stay at your meetings if their efforts are recognized and if they have something to show for it at the end. Thank people for their time and attention, give special thanks to guests or contributors, and follow up with more information from the speaker or on what's coming up next for the club.

UTICA HELPS PREPARE FIREFIGHTING EQUIPMENT DONATION

The Rotary Club of Utica, along with several Rotary Clubs located in Western Pennsylvania and Rotary International, recently met to gather and sort firefighter gear from local area Fire Departments to send to the country of Kosovo. Over the last 16 months, 90 sets of jackets and pants as well as boots, helmets, suspenders, etc. were collected locally and stored in Waterville. On Thursday, September 24th, the gear was loaded by volunteers into several trucks and delivered to CABVI in Utica, to then be boxed, placed on pallets, wrapped and weighed for international shipment. A total of 1,750 pounds of firefighting gear is being shipped. The Rotary Club of Utica is continuing a successful event that was started back in 2014, when they sponsored a Matching Grant project to locate, sort and deliver approximately 500 sets of firefighter turnout gear to the country of Chile.
