




## **DISTRICT GOVERNOR 2017-2018**



### CNY BOOKS FOR THE WORLD





CNY Books for the World, Inc. (CNY BFTW) is an all volunteer, Rotarian-managed, collaborative effort working with Central New York Rotary Clubs and The Second Wind Foundation. Together, they provide K - 6th grade picture/story and K - 12th grade textbooks to needed regions of the world to create opportunities for a better way of life.

CNY BFTW also takes other library and professional books if funding and space is available.

This program provides general book types and descriptions, packing specifications and delivery information to a central marshaling warehouse to the Rotary Club. The Rotary Club



purchases from CNY BFTW, at cost, all the required packaging materials, organizes and manages the project from the pick up of the books at their project location, and supports cost of transportation from their site to The Second Wind Foundation in LaPorte, Texas. At the CNY BFTW central warehouse, pallets of books are weighed and stored until there are sufficient numbers for a shipment to Rotary Books for the World (The Second Wind Foundation) in LaPorte. The pallets of books from all Rotarian-run collection centers in the USA are co-mingled, containerized and sent to third-world distribution centers - also run by Rotarians.

Textbooks - are to be in groupings of 10 or more (same title) with instructor's material, if available. Where are these books currently hiding? Closets, book shelves, storage areas of homes, libraries, schools and churches. They are all looking for a

homes, libraries, schools and churches. They are all looking for a home, and for children to read, learn from, love and cherish them. By combining our resources we have given these books a fresh start and are making a significant difference in the lives of the children of the world.



Additional ways to support this project: If you are unable to support the project with books, but want to aid in support, we need funds to move books from Central New York to Houston

TX. These funds will also go to help purchase sea containers, which may be converted to classrooms or libraries in Africa once they are unloaded of their book contents.

The Texas end of the process is coordinated and managed by The Second Wind Foundation, a 501-c-3 organization set up and managed by Rotarians. The receiving destinations are managed by Rotary district and clubs.

## **DISTRICT 7150 YOUTH EXCHANGE**

#### **About Our Program**

Rotary Youth Exchange is a distinct program within Rotary District 7150, which seeks to promote world peace and understanding through a series of exchanges where we send our students to foreign countries to immerse themselves in a different language and culture, and where we, in turn, host students from those same countries so that they may learn our language and culture.

We adhere to high standards set by Rotary International and the United States of America's

Department of State. All of our volunteers go through a background check and must take-and pass--a series of comprehensive tutorials and examinations in working with youth.

Our program has been recognized with awards from the North American Youth Exchange Network (NAYEN) for the past several years. Still, we are constantly striving to improve the quality of our program so that our youth may receive the best possible exchange.

We offer both an academic (school year) and summer student exchange.

The Rotary Clubs of Central New York sponsor area high school students to study abroad and live with host families in a foreign country for one academic year. In return, we host students from those same countries to come to District 7150 to study in the United States. Annually, students from all area high schools apply to be part of this exciting experience that will always be remembered.

The summer exchange is called the Short Term Exchange Program, or STEP. It is a six to eight week program, where the student from New York spends three to four weeks abroad, then returns with his/her exchange partner who stays here in New York for three to four weeks. It is a straight family-to-family exchange, with a simplified application process and is a very affordable exchange experience that does not interfere with school.

#### **ROTARY YOUTH LEADERSHIP AWARDS**

Rotary Youth Leadership Awards (RYLA) is a Rotary International program designed to recognize and enhance leadership skills among selected young people. In Rotary's District 7150, RYLA hosts a weekend leadership seminar that focuses on teens who have just completed their junior year in high school.

The seminar is held every year in July at Cazenovia College located in Cazenovia, NY, and includes skilled presenters who offer the keys to refining a participants' skills and knowledge in the fields of leadership, decision-making, time management, ethics, goal-setting, responsibility, self-assurance, communication skills, service, and teamwork. Students also participate in team-building exercises, hands-on activities and a service project to benefit a local organization.

Rotary clubs throughout the district are responsible for selecting individual teen applicants. Perspective applicants are chosen based on their leadership potential and a willingness to serve others. A RYLA applicant must fill out and submit an application form, which is then reviewed by their supporting Rotary club. Once an applicant is selected, the club endorses them and pays tuition for that person to attend the RYLA seminar.

Following their weekend of leadership training, students are expected to implement a community service project. This gives them an opportunity to be a leader while helping others. They will also have to share with their sponsoring club what they learned at the weekend and the result of their service project. Overall it's a great resume builder and skills training for young, budding leaders in our region!

#### **ADIRONDACK FOOTHILLS**





Adirondack Foothills Rotary Club (AFRC) activities are primarily devoted to promoting youth development, international understanding and assistance, and community outreach through service and financial support.

Youth Development: As charter and 20 year sponsor of Remsen Boy Scout Troop 175, AFRC members provide active support for Eagle Scout projects. For the next 5 years, through Dolly Parton Imagination Library, AFRC provides books to children 0-5 years old in local communities. Annually the club donates dictionaries

to local third grade students. For 30 years 4 graduating seniors received scholarships at graduation with a 5th one recently added. Students in 2 local school districts have been honored at Club meetings and sponsorship of students of each quarter will soon resume. Starting in 2016, AFRC sponsored to students to RYLA (Rotary Youth Leadership Awards) to Cazanovia College. The RYLA experience was very positive and will continue!

International Understanding and Assistance: For more than 25 years, AFRC served as hosts for foreign students, while sponsoring students studying abroad. Lifelong relationships are formed and many students return to live or visit. We are actively raising funds for a water, sanitation and hygiene project in Rajasthan, India, raising for 5 schools under RCPI (Rotary Club Prague International) and RC Udaipur Heritage, India, the sponsoring clubs. In addition, large contributions to Rotary International Polio eradication program have been made since 1988. Every member contributed funds to the Rotary Foundation and many members contribute to RI international projects providing bicycles, well construction and literacy items.

Community Outreach: In the past AFRC members built and installed park benches, trees, and memorials in Barneveld, Prospect, Holland Patent and Remsen. We built a boardwalk at the Remsen Depot, a replica of the original train station built by community members with the not for profit Remsen Development Corp. Our service to Unity Hall Foundation of Barneveld included building a boiler room and staffing refreshment stands at seasonal music events. We routinely seek out and respond to community projects in need. A proud sponsor of the Foothills Rural Community Ministry (food pantry), we support their services and networking, as well as the "Christmas Basket" Program. We donate to Unity Hall, community libraries, fire departments, FFA chapters, and local cancer research through Relay for Life teams, and other worthwhile organizations that seek help including local, state and national relief efforts. We have adopted a local highway Route 365 and pick up litter twice a year. Our club, along with the Lions club, has honored two local individuals each year.

Ours is a low key and casual club that always welcomes guests and new members. We have many interesting and informative programs. We meet at 6:15 at the Train Depot in on Wednesday evenings. #### **AUBURN**



The Auburn Rotary Club is a diverse organization that has focused their efforts on giving back to the local community and the international communities. In 2016, the Warm the Children new coat drive exceeded in giving over 1,000 children in Cayuga County new coats to make it through the winter. This program has been a flagship program for the Auburn Rotary and has been supported by the community in an exemplary way. In 2013, the program helped only 80 families in Auburn. This year, over 1,200 children applied for the program and no child went away from distribution day, without a coat.



In addition, the Auburn Rotary Club has impacted the

local community with two sought after scholarships, a vocational education program, and doing health screenings in the neighborhood for no charge. The Club has also been an integral part in giving back to the community by supporting other events such as a community leadership class, YMCA camp, Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts, and several veterans programs.

On the international stage, the Club was very successful in helping a community in Argentina to bring four fresh water wells to the schools in the area. This provided much needed clean drinking water, as the schools were in danger of closing regularly due to the lack of water. In addition, over the last year, we were a key part in providing books for the world and helping third world countries increase literacy with text books.

Our Auburn Rotary Club prides itself on being able to directly affect the community and is always looking for ways to continue that mission In July 2017 the Club will host a nationally sanctioned Bar-B-Que competition officially recognized by the Governor's office. The event



will enable us to expand our greatly philanthropic efforts even further. We plan on continuing to look for ways to positively affect our community and to support our core values of education, childhood

development, and community outreach. We also look to swell our ranks in the upcoming year with

folks who want to give back, like we do. We are constantly looking for help and, if you are interested, encourage you to join us for lunch on Tuesday at the Holiday Inn, in Auburn, to see what we stand for.



#### BALDWINSVILLE





The Baldwinsville Rotary Club is a growing group of fun and active members. We invite anyone to visit us at our Tuesday evening meetings at 7pm or Wednesday afternoon lunches at 12pm at the Red Mill Inn, in the heart of Baldwinsville, and see for yourself!

Now over 50 members strong, our club keeps busy with fundraising. We have a fun polar plunge in the winter, a family festival in the summer we call Seneca River Day, and



a 5k walk/run in the fall to fight hunger. All three fundraisers create opportunities for fellowship among members, are fun and rewarding to be a part of and give the club the ability to fund many different projects. Even more time is spent putting together programs that serve young and old alike. We welcome a Youth Exchange student to our community each school year, help elementary students at risk of hunger with our weekly Backpack Project, provide all third graders with a dictionary, give out three scholarships to high

For our local seniors, we host an annual luncheon to entertain and host hundreds of senior citizens with a meal and social time. ## **CAMDEN**



The Camden Rotary Club is over 60 years old. We meet every Monday evening at the Grape and Grog Bar at 6:15PM. We call ourselves small but mighty!

We have a few annual things we do and are very successful, such as: a Christmas basket project for the needy where we help approximately 300 families with food for the holiday. We also partner with the Marines Corps Toys for Tots program in our



area and they provide toys for the children of these families. We also hold an annual auction which is quite successful. We provide a food stand, hot dogs, hamburgers, etc., for the annual home coming parade, road pickup.

These are but a few of the things we do and do well. Some of our past major projects were renovating the bandstand in the village park, adding a room portraying to be a one room school house to the Carriage House Museum in Camden, building a skating rink for the community, a little ball field for the community, the list goes on. ## **CAMILLUS-SOLVAY-GEDDES**



In February 1966, the Camillus Rotary Club was birthed through the Marcellus Club. At that time, Stan Monroe and Tom Dyer, Marcellus Rotarians, contacted Ernie Larter and Jim Connell about the possibility of organizing a Rotary Club in Camillus. Why? Marcellus had completed an extensive survey as to potential members in the Camillus area.

And so, Camillus was charted as a full-fledged Rotary Club on October 18, 1966 with twenty-two members. The club's first step into community service was to send three children with disabilities to camp Goodwill, at that time operated by the Syracuse Rotary. The next opportunity for service arose when the Cerebral Palsy Center moved from Elmcrest Children's Center to Van Dyne Hospital. Dewitt Rotary asked the club to take over the monthly birthday party and gift program for the patients.

Community service requires some funds. In 1967, the Camillus club adopted "The Hole in One Contest" which continued through 2004. We are now sponsoring the annual Muleskinner 5K race along the Erie Canal which raises needed funds for community outreach. Ongoing club projects include the Meals on Wheels program, delivering food for the needy on Thanksgiving and bell ringing for the Salvation Army each December. In 2016, we also held our first annual club garage sale, which raised several hundred dollars.

In 1972, we became involved with the Rotary student exchange program. Over the years, the club has sponsored dozens of foreign exchange students.

In 2016, the club celebrated its 50th Anniversary and held a special banquet and

Every nickel is spent on dozens of organizations who need help with a wide variety of projects. The Club has purchased freezers for a local soup kitchen, signs for DAV transport vans, music equipment for a city high school, summer camp scholarships for disabled children, and many other items.

During the year, Dewitt Rotary's service projects address community needs and Dewitt Rotarians donate hundreds of volunteer hours to local organizations. Members sell kindling wood bundles made by the disabled workers at Monarch Industries and return the money collected to Monarch Industries. Members participate in the Christmas Bureau Giveaway, sell newspapers for "Old Newsboys", help distribute hats and gloves to city school children, "bell ring" for the Salvation Army, and serve food at the Dewitt Fire Dept. In May 1919, a group of Fulton business, industrial and professional men had their first meeting of what was to become the Fulton Rotary Club.

The Rotary Club of Fulton was awarded Charter No. 549 on November 1, 1919 with twenty-five members under the sponsorship of the Rotary Club of Syracuse. The group of enthusiastic Fulton men, through their contacts with members of the Syracuse Rotary Club, worked closely with Syracuse to obtain the charter. With only 15,000 residents, Fulton was one of the smallest cities in the world to receive a charter at that time. In turn, Fulton sponsored both



the Rotary Club of Oswego in 1922 and the Fulton Sunrise Club in 1999.

The Fulton Club gained the reputation of being a noisy club with their loud singing, laughter and habit of playing jokes on each other. This lead to cash fines which was controversial when started but dutifully accepted when established rules were breached. These monies collected helped support the club's projects. One of the projects in service was to provide necessary medical treatment for handicapped or crippled children who could not afford it otherwise. The Rotarians also provided transportation for the patients to Syracuse to be treated by specialists that required surgery. This was paid for by the Rotarians on many



occasions until government welfare finally took over starting in the 1930's.

Today the Fulton Rotary Club has a local endowment of over \$80,000. The income from the money is spent in the greater Fulton area manly for educational scholarships and Rotary Youth Leadership Awards. The Club now has 27 active members and still continues to support the local community and Rotary International projects.

The container is shipped to third worlds countries who distribute the books to local schools. We have also partnered with other local Rotary Clubs on this project. Our Youth Exchange Program is very strong, and we have hosted high school students from all over the world. This is a once in a lifetime experience to spend



time in another country as an exchange student and learn different cultures living with host families. Our club in average sends two local students out to other countries and takes in the same each year.



The most recent endeavor is the Dolly Parton Imagination Library of Herkimer and Oneida Counties. This program provides books monthly to children ages 0-5 for 5 years. This literacy program is available at no cost to families. The child enrolled will receive up to 60 books to help prepare them for school. 




## **ONONDAGA NORTH**





The Rotary Club of Onondaga North is one of the newest clubs in District 7150 and meets every first and third Wednesday night at 6pm, at Just One Bite Too in North Syracuse. Our second project is the Syracuse Nationals picnic held the Thursday prior to the massive car show on the weekend. We cook, serve, and sell raffle tickets, in conjunction with the Lions Club and the Knights of Columbus, for which we receive a donation from the 50-50 raffle and from the Syracuse Nationals.

With the funds received, we have been able to award several grants to Honor Flight, Clear Path for Veterans, the American Legion, the Kyle Schneider Memorial Foundation, Gigi's Playhouse for autistic children, the Boy Scouts, and various other groups. Although currently a small club, we are looking to grow with age in order to do more in our communities. We have a Facebook page, website, and the video of our flag display is posted on YouTube by putting in Onondaga North Rotary. Our first meeting of the month features speakers while the second serves as our club assembly to conduct business and review reports. local Little League, the youth Civil Air Patrol





## **SYRACUSE**



The Rotary Club of Syracuse, Inc. is really comprised of two entities; the Club which was chartered on June 1, 1912 as Club Number 42 in the Rotary world, and the Syracuse Rotary Foundation, Inc., the not-for-profit philanthropic arm of the Club founded in 1957. Together, the Club and the Foundation have served the Greater Syracuse community with



uncommon distinction and vigor, leaving a long trail of accomplishment in the best of Rotary's traditions, all of which has contributed to giving The Rotary Club of Syracuse an honored position in our community.

The Club's charter application was approved on June 1, 1912 which recognized Syracuse Rotary as the 42nd club in the Rotary world, among the earliest. That day charters were also granted to Rotary Clubs in Pueblo CO (#43) and Toledo OH (#44). At the same time Paul Harris was just completing his third and final year as the initial president of the National Association of Rotary Clubs which

later that year became the International Association of Rotary Clubs, later shortened to Rotary International in 1922. Membership in the Club peaked in 1962 at 485 during the term of president, Forrest Witmeyer. Syracuse Rotarians have been involved in many other humanitarian efforts as well. For example, long time Syracuse Rotarian, Dr. Robert Laubach, son of the founder of Laubach Literacy International, helped to inspire Syracuse Rotary to address the problems of illiteracy right here in Central New York beginning in the mid-1980s. The Club continues its involvement today.

At the Club's 100th Anniversary Gala in 2012, Syracuse Rotary presented a gift of \$20,000 to Syracuse based, ProLiteracy Worldwide. In the context of Rotary's four avenues of service, over the years, following in the traditions of Rotarians George Goldstein and Ray Castle, our Club has earned its place as a leader in the field of international service in such activities as sponsoring Rotary International Foundation scholars for study in other lands, supporting New Citizen Luncheons, arranging high school student exchanges, sponsoring group exchange programs, hosting hundreds of foreign students— many of them at SU-and otherwise supporting and working with a number of international organizations devoted to international peace and good will.

Syracuse Rotary has annually presented agencies and organizations with grants totaling \$35,000, funded through its philanthropic arm, the Syracuse Rotary Foundation, at a presentation ceremony at The Syracuse Area Landmark Theater. This annual round of giving is in line with the over 100-year-old Syracuse Rotary tradition of giving to the community. We meet every Friday at 12:10pm for lunch at Drumlins Country Club, Syracuse.




## **SYRACUSE INNER CITY**

In recent years, we have served by going into classrooms to donate dictionaries in both English and Spanish to third graders in the Syracuse City School District; ringing bells for the Salvation Army; hosting or partnering with programs such as Hoops For Peace and Junior Hoops for Peace basketball programs for middle school children, the Duck Race to End Racism, and the PEACE Health Extravaganza, during which we promote literacy, handson science activities, conflict resolution and educational opportunities; sponsoring students to the Rotary Youth Leadership Award; donating school supplies to OnPoint for College and the Shonnard Boys and Girls Club; sponsoring the high school Youth Unsung Heroes awards at the Dr. King Community Celebration; gathering neighbors for "Community Chats" at Grace Episcopal Church; and hosting an annual summer trip for youth to a 1000+ cow dairy farm in Homer, New York.



We raised funds for our work by selling Rotary chocolates, and were able to sponsor club founder Theardis Martino as a Paul Harris Fellow. We have hosted hundreds of speakers from all walks of life representing diverse areas of interest. • Ringing bells for the Salvation Army during the holidays, participated in WCNY's Telethon on-air fundraisers, and even painted the exterior of a group home.

Fundraising is a continual effort, with all monies raised going to support our projects and to give direct contributions to many worthy organizations in our community, including OnPoint for College, Person to Person Citizen Advocacy, Clear Path for Veterans and others. We raise money by selling programs and sponsoring a 50/50 raffle at the Syracuse Nationals car show, and selling SaveAround coupon books at the New York State Fair. Since 2014, we have put together an annual Youth Music Festival to connect young musical acts with professional music mentors and judges. Youth
