Rotary membership worldwide has been stagnant for quite some time, remaining around 1.2 million members. We could come up with a number of reasons why we haven't been attracting new members, and why we are not retaining the members we've worked so hard to bring into our clubs. However, instead of making excuses we should start by looking at our own clubs and asking ourselves, would I join this club today? If I answer this with a "no", then I need to ask why and what am I going to do about it?

If we enjoy Rotary and want to see it not just survive, but thrive, we must address this issue head on. Think about it for just one moment. Consider what Rotary stands to look like 10 or 20 years from now, if we do not get serious about bringing new members to our clubs.

Paul Harris wrote, almost 80 years ago; "This is a changing world; we must be prepared to change with it. The story of Rotary will have to be written again and again." I want all of you to follow his advice. The traditional way of doing things may very well result in strong and dynamic Rotary, however, if it doesn't, then perhaps it is time to be doing something different. If club traditions, or club rules, are holding us back, we must make the necessary changes to move forward. We will not be walking away from tradition we will be doing exactly what Paul Harris intended.

Rotary's strength is in its members. When our membership is growing, both in size and strength, our clubs are more vibrant, we have more to show the world, and we have more resources to help Rotary flourish. If you look at what we have achieved in the past with 1.2 million members in 37,000 clubs, just imagine what we could do with 40, 50, or 60 thousand clubs with 2-3 million members. We would be able to attract more partners, take on more humanitarian service projects, and our abilities and resources would have an even greater impact on our communities and on the world.

It is important for all District 7150 Rotarians to realize that we do not have to



work alone when addressing our membership goals. The District Leadership is prepared to assist with accomplishing our membership goals. The District Bylaws establish that the Immediate Past District Governor serve as the chairperson of the Nominating Committee. Therefore, IPDG Peter F. Cardamone is the Committee Chair. 

RIBS & BLUES REIGN IN AUBURN

Emerson Park, more specifically Deauville Island in the heart of the park located at the head of Owasco Lake near Auburn, was the site of the Auburn Rotary Club's successful Rotary Ribs Rhythm and Blues over the weekend of July 15th & 16th.

Lead by President-Elect Bob Edmunds and an active team of Auburn Rotarians working since last November, the club's initial festival had over 5,200 in attendance and raised, "north of \$40,000 in net proceeds."

A total of 25 amateur and professional BBQ teams competed for \$4,000 in prize monies. Competitors came from multiple states as well as from Canada. Good Smoke BBQ of Rochester took Grand Championship honors as well as top prize money in the competition.

The Auburn Club secured the festival as a Kansas City Barbeque Society (KCBS) event early in planning, setting up the Jack Daniel's invitation. Feedback from KCBS representatives and society-sanctioned judges in attendance rated the event a 95 out of 100 points. "This is unheard of for an initial year competition" stated Edmunds. "In terms of quality and event organization, we hit it out of the park."

Despite the success of the event, it did have its challenges: the weather and manpower. The needs of the event required "all hands on deck" to meet jobs ranging from ticket sales and money handling to beverage sales, with security and vendor relations in between. Club members were asked to work six hour shifts to allow for shift changes and to reduce disruptions in service delivery. Many club members worked both days of the event, with several working double shifts both days.

The wet weather leading up to the event hampered attendance to an extent, and drove unplanned changes to vendor sites due to puddling. Improving dry weather on Saturday and bright sunshine on Sunday helped bring in people. Other Rotary Clubs participating with volunteers and as a participating vendor at the event included the Skaneateles Club and the Cato Club, respectively. The event held other positive outcomes for the Auburn Club. In stretching to provide the manpower for the event, new relationships outside the club were forged, and those within the club were strengthened. Club President Tim Kelly commented, "It was wonderful to see our Rotary family come together and get to know each other better. This event strengthened us in so many ways that its positive wave will continue well into the future."
