ARE YOUR GOALS IN?

It was the responsibility of each club president to set goals in My Rotary for their

club's foundation giving. If you did not set them, you will receive a notification that they have been set for you. You can still go in and change them. Here's how:

HOW TO ENTER FOUNDATION GOALS

Rotary Club Central is the tool for clubs to input their foundation foals and to track their contribution progress.

- 1. Go to <u>www.rotary.org</u> and log in to My Rotary with your email address and password.
- Click "Forgot Password" if you need to retrieve your credentials and they will email
- you the information you need to log in.
- 2. Once logged in, click on *Manage* and proceed to *Club and District Administration*. Under *Club Activity* you find **Rotary Club Central**.
- 3. Along the top you will see three tabs: Your Club, Service, and Foundation Giving. Click the **Foundation Giving** tab.
- 4. You will first see a trend graph for annual giving. Scroll down to the **Goals and Progress** section.
- 5. You should see three tabs labeled with last year's, this year's and next year's dates. This year's date (2015-16) should be already selected. Click **Edit** to enter your club's data.



WHY GIVE TO THE ROTARY INTERNATIONAL FOUNDATION?

Sign up for auto payments to your bank or credit card, so you never forget to give. You choose the amount & frequency of your contribution.





FULTON NOON LEARNS ABOUT NATURE & NURTURE

Dick Drosse, left, of the Friends of Great Bear organization spoke to the Fulton Noon Rotary Club at a recent meeting. Dick w a s introduced by Rotarian Charrise Kidd.



The Great Bear Recreation Area is composed of 432 acres of nature and trails about four miles south of Fulton. The 432 acres is actually owned by four entities: the City of Fulton, the Town of Volney, the New York State Canal Corpoation, and a private owner. The Friends of Great Bear are actually in the process of kicking off a \$150,000 campaign to purchase the 150 acres owned by a private owner, which, when completed, will be managed by the Town of Volney. Dick passed out a brochure that explained the history of the land. The Great Springs waterworks at one time, in the early 20th century, shipped natural spring water by railroad throughout the Eastern United States. In 1910, a thousand apple and cherry trees were planted on site and a commercial fruit operation sold fruit, apple cider, and other farm products. In addition to this fund raising initiative, the Friends of Great Bear is busy acting as stewards of the multiple trails and have built numerous bridges and bog bridges over watery and muddy sections of the trails. One of the trails is even one of the original towpaths of the 1828 Oswego Canal. The Friends of Great Bear does great work maintaining this area for all of our use.

FULTON SUNRISE LEARNS ABOUT LATEST EPIDEMIC

At a recent Fulton Sunrise Rotary meeting, Rotarian Linda Eagan introduced Steve Bourgeois who is the Senior Investigator for the State Police based in Fulton. He has been with the Police for 32 years and



works with four other Investigators throughout Oswego County. Steve talked about the top most investigated areas which revolve around heroin and other substance abuse and sex crimes. The crimes and victims involve both youth and adults from all walks of life, although much is generational. There is a heroin epidemic and the arrests and convictions for drug involvement have increased greatly in the past ten years.

SYRACUSE ROTARY DISTRIBUTES GRANTS
