with World Understanding and Peace Day, Rotary's 112th anniversary, February 23rd, as an opportunity for Rotarians to support the mission of the Rotary Foundation, "Peace Through Service." Since 1905, Rotary clubs have worked locally and internationally to make the world a better and more peaceful place one person, one family, one community at a time. In 1945, Rotary made a significant contribution to peacemaking, calling for "freedom, justice, truth, sanctity of the pledged word, and respect for human rights" that became the United Nations' Declaration of Human Rights.

Please consider what your club can do to promote peace and foster understanding::

- Participate in the Youth Exchange Program,
- Combat the underlying causes of conflict and violence through community-based service project,
- Support Rotary service projects for world understanding and peace by helping families afford food, clothing, rent, utilities, medications, and other necessities,
- Build peace by supporting Rotary's single largest and most significant humanitarian project: PolioPlus,
- Support the Rotarian Action Group for Peace giving Rotarians resources and support to advance world peace and turn ambitious ideas into life-changing realities,
- Seek out and support international Global Grant humanitarian projects by taking action to address the underlying causes of conflict: poverty, inequality, ethnic tension, lack of access to education, and unequal distribution of resources, This is the month to expand your club's efforts to "Promote Peace and World Understanding" and to embrace: •Facilitating conflict resolution workshops and conferences,
- Educating youth on preventive measures to avoid conflict,
- Training local leaders, including emerging youth leaders, on mediation strategies,
- Improving the quality of life through a variety of international humanitarian service projects,
- Supporting peace and conflict prevention and resolution through fellowships and scholarships for career-minded professionals. District 7150 Syracuse University Associate Professor, Dessa Bergen-Cico has been awarded an intensive, three-month professional certificate fellowship in peace & conflict studies at Chulalongkorn University, Thailand.

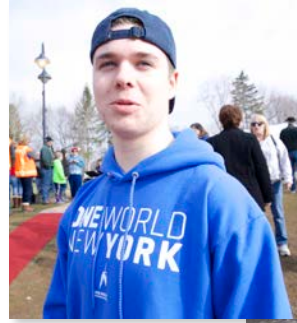

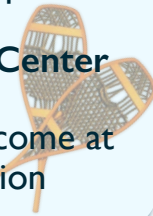
