And of course, our world—wide Rotary network of "People of Action" giving us the strength and will to persevere for more than 30 years, to "reach for the stars to change the world" and eradicate Polio! That fight continues, and even though we are "this close" we must have the patience and the commitment to see that project to its completion!

So where do we find the next group of "dreamers" who will help grow Rotary's impact locally and worldwide in the coming decades? Jeffry Cadorette, RI Director 2018–2020 for Zones 24 & 32 (we are in Zone 32), offers this answer in his February "Beyond Borders" letter. Following the District 7150 20/20 Conference, as a demonstration of their commitment to support People of Action, the District 7150 Leadership officially authorized an Environmental Sustainability Rotary Action Group (ESRAG) Task Force.

The Task Force's Mission is to keep the Conversation started by R.I. President Barry Rassin alive!!! In the April 2019 Rotarian Magazine President Rassin challenged all Rotarians with these words. "LET'S START THE CONVERSATION" and "WHY CLIMATE CHANGE IS ROTARY'S BUSINESS, (And what Rotarians Are Already doing about It)." As of the January 2020, the Task Force consists of over 150 individual Rotarians from 15 Clubs. We have made presentations at several clubs, with over a dozen more scheduled in the coming months.


