Thanks to the conversations members have with their District Governor, we know you have questions about what's happening with the future of our districts. What exactly is CNY Rotary? Why the term "CNY?" Are there people from my district involved in the CNY committee? What is the committee doing?

The answers to those questions and more were shared at virtual town hall meetings in January. Steering committee and action group members from all across our region presented updates on the work they are doing and fielded questions from members. One consistent question we have heard is "Why does CNY Rotary matter to me as an every day Rotarian?" That's a great question with many, many an-

swers! The way our new district operates will have very little impact on your club's day-to-day activities. You will remain autonomous groups and plan your own meetings, projects and activities just as you have always done. The district will continue to serve as a resource to clubs with leadership training, support foundation giving, provide guidance on your public image, and help your membership recruitment and retention efforts. CNY Rotary is seeking to provide even better support from a broader leadership team that will be poised to serve our larger region starting in July 2024.

In truth, CNY Rotary can be whatever you want it to be for you. It can be an entity you continue to only interact with when your Assistant Governor pays a visit or you go to our annual conference. It could be the people that provide you with excellent training and networking opportunities because you are a club leader. If you are an experienced member, it could be a team you join to lend your expertise in service to your fellow Rotarians. If you are a newer member (or maybe



a newly engaged member), it could be a place to further develop your skills in a variety of areas, from project management, to event planning, to graphic design and more. If "the district" ever felt like a place for elites or some kind of exclusive club, please put that notion aside. Members with talents to share are welcome, regardless of how long you've been in Rotary or if you have ever volunteered at this level before. Now is the time to step up and be of service in a way that makes Rotary better for your fellow members, more accessible to new ones, and more widely recognized for our good work around the world.

The Club donated \$ 1000 to their efforts and every elementary student in the SCSD received a new hat and new gloves. The DeWitt group was assigned to Salem Hvde elementary on the north side of the city. The students were very talkative and very welcoming. They also appreciated getting new hats & gloves for the winter ahead.

DeWitt Rotarians volunteered at the **Samaritan Center** in Syracuse five times in 2022. They prepared nutritious meals and served food to 150 – 200 guests each time. After, they washed dishes, swept floors and cleaned the kitchens.

Before the holidays, DeWitt Rotarians sold special edition Syracuse papers at the Fayetteville and Manlius Dunkin' Donuts shops, collecting over \$ 1700 in donations for the Syracuse Christmas Bureau. The annual **Old Newsboys** project helps ensure that less fortunate families and children have food, books, and toys for the holiday season. •

TRAINING FOR CLUB LEADERS IS STARTING SOON GET INFORMED!

It's the time of year that we start to prepare your club leadership for the 2023-24 Rotary year with several training events. The first of these is meant to prepare your incoming club president (aka president elect) for their official training with a series pre-training sessions held virtually (see adjacent schedule). The zoom link for Pre-PETS will be emailed to club presidents, secretaries and president elects, with the same link used at all four sessions that will cover a variety of topics. Other club leaders are welcome to sit in on these sessions as well.

The next big event is the Multi-District President Elect Training Seminar (MD-PETS) at the Sheraton at SU, March 17-19, 2023. We bring together the four upstate New York districts for a day and a half of training that includes networking, inspiring speakers, informative break out sessions and some fun sprinkled in. All clubs pay for this training and should have someone

attending on their behalf. If your president elect is unavailable or still TBD, consider sending an emerging leader, board member, foundation chair, membership committee member or anyone interested in learning more about being a leader. All attendees must register at www.RotaryEmpireMDPets.org.

If you wish to stay overnight, discounted rooms are available at \$132/night (plus taxes and fees) and the link to book one is also on the registration web site. The room block is only held through February 13th, so availability and rates are not guaranteed if you procrastinate. Other club leaders, Rotarians and guests are welcome to register for and attend this event with the purchase of a meal package at \$135/person. That includes Friday evening's social event, Saturday breakfast, lunch and dinner, and Sunday breakfast. Choose the appropriate option in the registration if you wish to join us!

And finally, we encourage all club leaders to save

the morning of Saturday, April 1 to attend our District Training Assembly. This half day of condensed training is free for all to attend, with courses on various topics and special training for club secretaries, treasurers, membership chairs, foundation chairs and public image chairs. This is also open to any member to attend if you want to learn more (and you will learn a lot!). Watch your email and our district Facebook page for the announcement when registration is opened. THERE'S STILL TIME TO SUPPORT BUILDING A SCHOOL IN TANZANIA

An update from from Fulton, Missouri Rotarian **Bob Hansen in Tanzania:**

I recently returned from Tanzania where my team of nine were monitoring our projects, explored new opportunities, and strengthened relationships with our partners. I'm happy to report that all of our projects are exceeding our expectations. We have an outstanding staff there that makes my job so much easier.

I did spend time at the Oltepeleki village that is needing a classroom, latrine, and rainwater-catchment system. I had not been there before and was surprised with how remote it really is. I can see why the families want their own school since the distance the children need to walk each day is not only long but hilly and quite wild.

It is no surprise that they frequently come into contact with threatening animals. We learned that the children that died last year while on their way to school were killed by cape buffalos. We weren't sure, since lions and poisonous snakes are often found in that area. The people of this village are determined to keep their young

kids close and they will succeed in building not only a preschool, but also a small primary school for 6-9-year-

They think that between the mud/stick classroom that they built and a more sustainable block classroom (hopefully funded by your district), they can achieve this goal. The one-room school concept is not uncommon in remote areas. I saw their attempt at digging a pit for a latrine and was surprised at how deep they were able

I was glad to have visited this village and their school since it gave me firsthand understanding of the situation and their future challenges. Their need is real, so I hope that your district can rally the clubs to construct what they need. Here are a few photos taken from that visit. We gave kids polio vaccine, vitamins, deworming meds, and other vaccine shots.

All new moms brought their kids to this grove of trees where we set up our mobile clinic. In the future, we will use the new classroom.
